EUROPE.

THE CZAR OF ALL THE RUS-
SIA'S AT BERLIN.

PLOTS AGAINST BISMARCK'S
LIFE.

THE CZAR AN AMBASSADOR OF
PEACE.

PLO NONO'S EIGHTY-THIRD
BIRTHDAY.

BERLIN, May 11—Noon—The Czar arrived to-day and was received on alighting at the railway station by Emperor William and all the Princes and the Emperor's family. General von Moltke and Manteuffel and other distinguished personages were present. The Emperor's greeting was exceedingly cordial. An immense crowd gathered around the station and cheered enthusiastically. The city is decorated with flags. The Czar, accompanied by Prince Gortschakoff, visited Prince Bismarck.

The bill for the suppression of religions' orders passed its third reading in the Lower House.

The Berlin Post says there are reasons to suspect that certain Polish priests have conspired against the lives of Prince Bismarck and Dr. Falck, Minister of Ecclesiastical Affairs, and that three persons whose names are already known to the police, were hired to carry out the plot.

The rumor that Germany and Russia intend addressing a representation to France in relation to armament is false.

PARIS, May 11—Noon—The feeling here is more hopeful. The La Liberté says that the Czar will propose a general disarmament which Germany will support.

LONDON, May 11—Noon—The Times, in a leading editorial, says: We believe that the Czar is resolved to hold the most decided language in favor of the maintenance of peace, and to use every effort to put a stop to the alarm. A few days will probably bring forth official disclaimers of the recent reports. It is possible that it will be said that there is nothing to justify French apprehensions, but if there should be a mistake on this point as long as the present condition remains there must be uneasiness and even danger. An unforeseen incident, an outbreak of jealousy, may precipitate a rupture. The Czar is unable to guarantee that France will not attack Germany within a few years. Gigantic armaments are a mutual menace, and while they exist it is beyond the power of even Imperial peace makers to allay apprehension.

A special dispatch to the Pall Mall Gazette from Berlin, says a Catholic Assembly has left Mayence for Rome, to present the Pope with an address congratulating him upon the anniversary of his birth-day, which occurs on the 18th inst; when he will be 83 years old. The address, which is said to have one million signatures attached to it, is couched in terms of the deepest devotion and allegiance.

In the House of Commons this afternoon, Mr. Burke, under the foreign Secretary, in response to the inquiry of Sir Charles Duke, as to the continental situation, said the Government has received to-day the most satisfactory assurances from Berlin of the maintenance of the peace of Europe.

HEADQUARTERS.

BREAKING UP WHISKY DISTILLERIES IN THE NORTH-WEST.

THE FLORIDA ISTHMUS CANAL SCHEME.

WASHINGTON, May 11—Noon—The best planned and most skillfully executed campaign ever made by the government against the whiskey ring distilleries culminated yesterday in the seizure of more than thirty of the largest distilleries and rectifying houses in St. Louis, Chicago and Milwaukee.

WASHINGTON, May 11—Night—Senator Conover, of Florida, has announced that the execution of the following clause of the River and Harbor bill which he championed through Congress, is progressing favorably: For surveys to ascertain the most eligible line on which a canal across the Isthmus of Florida can be constructed, and whether a safe land-locked navigation between the waters of the Mississippi and the Gulf of Mexico, along the coasts of Alabama, Louisiana and Florida and through the latter State to the Atlantic coast, can be had. To estimate the probable cost and practicability of the construction of such works and of any artificial water routes found necessary to provide a safer inland navigation between the Mississippi river and one of the seaports on the east coast of Florida.

The value of the distillery property seized yesterday was over \$1,000,000. Detectives are hunting up the consignments from the illicit distilleries. Broken packages are seized. Other distillery seizures have been ordered at Pickens, Illinois, Cincinnati, Ohio, and elsewhere, and the Secretary to-day directed that legal steps be taken at all points where frauds have been discovered, and that arrests be made where evidence is sufficient to justify them. The officers have already ascertained that great quantities of this rickety whiskey have been distributed throughout the country, especially in the South, but the form of the packages in which it was originally shipped had been changed in many instances, and it will now be impossible to detect much of it.

THE SCHILLER.

CONTINUED RUSH TO THE
AGENTS' OFFICE.

New York, May 11—Night—The rush of people to the agent's office still continues. Mr. Leonhardt, of this city, called to-day to ascertain the fate of his brother, George Leonhardt, of Augusta, Ga., who had left in the Schiller with his wife and children for Stuttgart, taking a large amount of property with him. No news could be given to the distressed gentleman, who left the office in tears.

PENNSYLVANIA.

NO ABATEMENT OF THE MINE
TROUBLES.

WILKESBARRE, May 11—Night—About 30 men went to work in Hutchison's mine this morning. They marched from their homes in a body and were armed with rifles and revolvers. A crowd of men, women and boys followed them with threats and imprecations and were only deterred from acts of violence by the weapons of the workmen. The women were particularly bitter with invectives and at one point in the mine march nearly precipitated a conflict.

ELECTRICISMS.

At Philadelphia the cross-examination in Gardemann's case for alleged defalcation indicates that the Church owes the Priest nearly \$500.

The situation in the Schuylkill mining region is growing daily more critical. Men who are willing to work are compelled to abandon the mines under threats of death.

Reports from two hundred counties in Pennsylvania indicate scarcely a half crop of winter wheat.

The Planet Carpet Mills at Brooklyn have been burned. Loss \$330,000. Employed four hundred.

Col. D. K. Anthony, editor of Leavenworth Times and Postmaster at that place, was fatally shot by William Embo, editor of Appeal, on the stairway of Opera House. Ill feeling existed between the parties.

STATE NEWS.

Because of bad weather the Memorial Services in Raleigh were postponed until to-day.

The Raleigh Sentinel says: One of the convicts Saturday at the brickyard slipped the guard and ran away, the guard firing at him three times and missing every time. Still at large and free as a bird.

The Toisnot Transcript says: A Mr. Petway, who lives near this place, has thirty-two good, healthy looking rams on one arm, and Mr. G. W. Griffin, who has only one arm, has been carrying that member in a sling for some days, with some less than a dozen from the size of a silver dollar to a five cent piece.

The Reidsville News says: "We witnessed one of the most striking and at the same time brutal effects of 'bust-head' whisky on last Monday it has ever been our misfortune to see. A teamster by the name of Evans, in the employment of Mr. A. F. Fair, of Prestonville, Stokes county, struck one of his horses on the head with an axe several times. The skull of the horse was mashed in several places. A Burgh is needed up in that burgh."

The Raleigh News says: We learn from a private letter that three negroes, who lately escaped from the Penitentiary, are creating much excitement in the Battleshoro and Rocky Mount neighborhood. They have been seen and identified by parties who know them. They were seen in a negro house on Capt. T. W. Battle's plantation, a few nights ago, and Hamp Austin has been shot by Tom Coker who saw him lurking around his premises, and when hailed refused to stop. At night the party visited Mr. Coker and tried to gain admittance in the name of a respectable colored man, but a trick was suspected and they failed to carry out their purpose of robbery and perhaps murder; they however administered a sound cursing to Mr. Coker.
