THE WAR CRISIS PAST.

ENGLAND'S FRIENDLY OFFICE.

PRINCE NAPOLEON ON THE IMPERIAL SUCCESSION.

LONDON, May 14—Noon—The youth O'Connor who, on the day of thanksgiving for the recovery of the Prince of Wales attempted to shoot the Queen, was again arrested on the 5th inst, the Queen holding drawing room at Buckingham Palace and O'Connor was found in the same place in front of the railings from which he, on the former occasion, presented a pistol at the Queen. He was arrested quietly and sent to the Hanwell Asylum by order of Sir Thomas Hoey, Chief Magistrate of the Bow Street Police Court, on certificate of physicians that the prisoner is subject to suicidal and homicidal impulses.

The Times this morning says that there could hardly have been a more critical situation than existed in Berlin upon the arrival of the Emperor of Russia. The German Government may be able to declare that a hostile movement was never officially entertained, but a few days since there was serious danger that war like counsel would prevail. We may suppose that Prince Gortzchakoff courteously expressed his determination to treat as an enemy the first State disturbing the peace. In spite of England's attitude of reserve, we believe the government thought it a national duty in the recent crisis to express its opinion very decidedly in regard to the maintenance of peace. The communication was amicably received and a most satisfactory reply returned.

WISCONSIN.

THE DISTILLERY SEIZURE.

MILWAUKEE, May 14—Noon—The four distilleries which had been released by the court on special bonds resumed operations yesterday. A dispatch was received from Washington ordering the officers to stop them until they had given new bonds in place of those given on the first of May. The distillers here have telegraphed to the distillers at Chicago, St. Louis and elsewhere proposing to unite with them in testing the constitutionality of the Internal Revenue tax. A favorable supply was received from Chicago, and the distillers have resolved to proceed. They have retained ex-Senator Carpenter to take the question into the courts.

By request of the District Attorney, who stated that there were extenuating circumstances, the lowest punishment, which was a sentence to six months imprisonment and a fine to the amount of money abstracted, was imposed.

ANOTHER SEA HORROR.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 14—Night—The New South Wales Parliament has included in a supply bill recently passed, \$5,000 for the representation of New South Wales at the Centennial Exhibition at Philadelphia.

The Honolulu Commercial Advertiser of May 1st, says: In January last, Z. S. Spaulding arrived from San Francisco and made a proposition to a sugar planter to enter into a contract with the San Francisco colonies for the entire crop of the coming year. The proposition was disapproved.

Sydney, New South Wales, advises that the bark St. Margon Adelaide, from Brisbane, entered Monston Bay and took a pilot on board, when the wind chopped around, giving her a lee shore, and the bark stood out to sea again. The next day she was discovered bottom up, and a steamer searched unavailingly for survivors of the wreck. The bark was owned and sailed by Capt. Eastbrook, a Bostonian, but for many years a resident of Adelaide. His wife and family perished with him.

ANOTHER FIGHT AT THE MINES.

TRENTON, May 14—Night—Fifty men went to work at Sterling mines this morning. About 11 o'clock a light took place between the few police and the strikers and two of the latter were arrested. There is no police force sufficient to protect willing workmen, and the Sheriff is dictatorial. L. G. Conroy, editor of L'Italia, who, on Monday, was captured by the strikers, is at Trenton with forty Italians, determined to put them at work with proper protection. Affairs in Chesterfield county are in a bad state, and nothing short of military force will suppress the outrages. This is the opinion of the most intelligent portion of the community.
