GOTHAM.

SEMI-CENTENNIAL RELIGIOUS CELEBRATION.

New York, May 17—Noon—Rev. Dr. Hall's new church, on 6th Avenue, was dedicated with a large congregation yesterday evening, it being the Semi-Centennial of the American Tract Society, Justice Strong, of the U. S. Supreme Court, presided. Addresses were delivered by Rev. Drs. M. B. Anderson, of Rochester, Wm. S. Plumer, of Columbia, S. C., G. MacLennan, of Princeton, N. J., S. M. Manning, of London, England, William Gilie, of Edinburgh, Scotland.

ALABAMA.

MOTION TO SET ASIDE THE SALE OF THE WESTERN R. R. REFUSED.

Montgomery, May 17—Noon—The Chancellor denied and overruled the motion of Branch Sons and others, to be made parties to the proceedings for the sale of the Western Railroad and have the sale set aside. He said that any right they had could be asserted quite as well in a separate bill, and that he could not delay the proceedings by sustaining their petition.

EUROPE.

ARREST OF THE PRINCIPAL IN THE BISMARCK CONSPIRACY.

THE CARLISTS AT PAMPOLUNA.

DEATH OF GEN. BRECKENRIDGE.

Berlin, May 17—Noon—The alleged principal in the late conspiracy against Bismarck's life is named Dunin, and it is asserted that he has been arrested in Cracow.

Madrid, May 17—Noon—The Carlists made an attack upon Pampoluna yesterday and threw twenty-four shells into the town, but no casualties resulted. The insurgents were finally repulsed by Alfonso's troops.

Lexington, May 17—Night—Gen. John C. Breckinridge is dead.

KENTUCKY.

THE LOUISVILLE RACES.

Louisville, May 17—Noon—An extra race was arranged for the opening day of the Jockey Club. At the Spring Meeting to-day, for which 16 horses were promptly entered, 43 horses will start during the day's races, being a larger number than ever started on one day.

Lexington, May 17—Noon—The condition of Gen. Breckinridge remains unchanged. He is still cheerful and seems to be much less concerned at his condition than those around him. He has the papers read to him and converses with his few chosen friends who are admitted. Some of his more hopeful friends entertain hopes of his remaining among them for some time, but experienced persons see he cannot remain much longer and is liable to be called away at any moment. His pulse is very weak. Many of his relatives and friends from abroad are here to be with him in his last hours.

ELECTRICISMS.

Alderman John Meagher's residence at Houston, Texas, has been burned. Three men perished in the flames.

The St. Louis Democrats elected the Mayor of that city.

San Francisco Lick has made a new deed in which he pinches some and swells others.

Five hundred packages, valued at \$200,000, have been seized at Boston and will be held during the investigation. The government gives no security for leakage, through bungs, spigots or similar holes.

The drying house of the Meridian Woolen Company, at New Haven, has been burned. Loss \$50,000.

Hon. Thos. Biddle, U. S. Minister at Grayson, Va., is dead.

It is said that the filibuster steamer Gen. Sherman, recently sold by a U. S. Marshal's sale, at Key West, has been purchased by Cubans as a war vessel.

The President yesterday morning appointed Otis H. Russell Collector of Internal Revenue for the Third District of Virginia, vice Rush Burgess, resigned.

The jury in the Gerdegan case, at Philadelphia, came into Court at 12 o'clock yesterday when they stated that they could not agree, and were discharged.

A boat with two husbands and their wives and two children each went over a dam at Zanesville, Ohio. Both of the women and two children were drowned.

THE EAST.

COLLISION AND LOSS OF LIFE IN CHINESE WATERS.

San Francisco, May 17—Night—A collision occurred on the 4th of April on the coast of China, between the Chinese steamship Fu Sing and the British steamship Ocean. The Fu Sing foundered almost instantly, causing the loss of fifty lives. The Ocean was seriously injured but succeeded in reaching Wa Sing. An investigation is proceeding.

HEADQUARTERS.

AN INTERESTING WAR CASE IN THE SUPREME COURT.

Washington, May 17—Noon—It is thought that Auditor Shonts' leave of absence to the first of July means an *admission*.

Irish and Attorney-General Pierce had a prolonged consultation to-day about the whiskey *fiasco*, and it is understood that the elephant has been placed upon Commissioner Pratt's shoulders.

The Court of Claims to-day delivered an opinion in the case of Alexander L. P. Green, who in 1864 was domiciled in Nashville, but just before the capture of that city went further South, carrying with him a large amount of money of a firm for whom he was an endorser, and when leaving was possessed of certain buildings in Nashville which, in 1864, were seized by Supervising Treasury Agents as abandoned property. The claimant avers in his petition that he was always a loyal citizen, but this (the Court said) did not strengthen his case, as he voluntarily entered the enemy's line. The act of the seizure of the property was a war measure and it made no difference whether it was seized by the army or by a Treasury agent. The claimant sought to recover on the grounds of an implied contract and the liability of the government for the acts of its officers. The Court says no action can be maintained on that ground, and that if the claimant was entitled to recover he ought to have prosecuted his case under the abandoned property act, which he failed to do. The case was dismissed.

The Court also decided the case of the Coville Steam Engine Company. The claimant had contracted with the Navy Department for the construction of steam engines. Subsequently the Department decided not to complete the engines, and in accordance with a written agreement, the Company delivered the boilers, engines and appurtenances, at the Boston Navy Yard in their unfinished condition. The Court, through Chief Justice Drake, said that the agreement between the claimant and the Navy Department was singularly clear and altogether free from latent. It was the duty of the Government to comply strictly with its obligations to the contractor. Judgment was given in behalf of the claimant to the amount of \$257,688.

A motion was made by the Assistant Attorney-General for a new trial in the Edge cotton case.

The opinion in the Pacific Railroad transportation cases will not be announced before next Monday, to which time the Court has adjourned.

WILMINGTON, N. C., May 17th, 1875.

In pursuance of Section 25 of "An Act to Repeal Revenue," ratified February 14th, 1874, and Section 17 of an act known as the "Machinery Act," ratified the 22d day of March, 1875, the Board of County Commissioners of New Hanover County met to-day at the Court House in the city of Wilmington for the purpose of naming in said acts, and have taken a recess until

Monday, the 24th day of May, 1875,

at which time the Commissioners will proceed to revise the tax lists and valuation reported to them and complete the lists by computing the tax payable by each person and adding the same opposite his name. The session of the Board will continue for the space of

THREE WORKING DAYS.

The Board will hear all persons objecting to the valuation of their property or to the amount of tax charged against them. The Board has a right to also visitations of property that may be unreasonably low and for that purpose are empowered to summon and examine witnesses.

After the tax lists are made up and placed in the hands of the Sheriff it will be impossible to make corrections. All faults must be considered "the fault of the taxpayer." There is no time for corrections after the lists are made up, and notice is hereby given that alterations will be made after the time expires except in accordance with the strict letter of the law.
