In pursuance of Section 16 of "An 'Act to Raise Revenue," ratified February 14th, 1874, and Section 17 of an act known as the "Machinery Act," ratified the 12d day of Macch, 1875, the Board of County Commissioners of New Hanover county met to-day at the Court House in the city of Wilmington for the purpose named in said acts, and have taken a recess until Monday, the 24th day of May, 1875 at which time the Commissioners will proceed to revise the fax lists and valuation reported to them and complete the lists by computing the tax psyable by each person and affixing the sume opposite his name. The session of the Board will continue for the space of

The Board will hear all persons objecting to the valuation of their property or to the amount of tax charged against them. The Board has a right to also valuations of property that may be unreasonably low and for that purpose are empowered to summon and examine witnesses.

After the tax lists are made up and placed in the hands of the Sheriff it will be almost impossible to make corrections. All featles reuse
