SOUTHERN GRAVES IN AR-
LINGTON TO BE DECORATED.

IMPORTANT DECISIONS IN THE
COURT OF CLAIMS.

WASHINGTON, May 24.—Night.—The Secretary of War has given formal permission to the Southern Memorial Association to decorate the graves of the Confederate dead at Arlington on the 1st June.

Washington, May 24.—Night.—The Court of Claims to-day confirmed the reports of Special Commissioner Evelett, with several amendments. These cover a number of claims involving large amounts of cotton.

Washington, May 24.—Night.—The first large consignment of Vicksburg and Natchez cotton which was so intermingled as to destroy its identity, was ordered to stand at the sum of three hundred and forty eight thousand three hundred dollars.

Washington, May 24.—Night.—In addition to the above judgment was rendered in about thirty-eight separate cases, covering 5,510 bales of cotton, which, at the sum fixed by the court, gives a total of nearly \$100,000,000. Col. Robt M. and Stephen A. Douglass, sons of the late Stephen A. Douglass, of Illinois, receive an award for 1,457 bales of cotton, or about \$253,000, seized in the State of Mississippi on the maternal plantation.

Washington, May 24.—Night.—The new Attorney-General, Pierrepont, on the first of June will inaugurate the following Bureau: Supreme Court, Court of Claims; Legal Inveigilators, Official Correspondence, Chief Clerk, Criminal Law. Each Bureau will be designated.

Washington, May 24.—Night.—Thomas Simmons is appointed Assistant Attorney-General, vice Goforth.

GEORGIA.
THE AIR LINE ROAD IN COURT.

DEDICATION OF A SYNAGOGUE
AT ATLANTA.

ATLANTA, May 24.—Night.—Judge Brady, of the 8th Court, to-day in the Air Line Railroad case, John H. Fisher, against L. P. Grant, receiver appointed by Judge Hopkins, at Fulton Superior Court, decided not to interfere, as Grant was in possession.

Atlanta, May 24.—Night.—The cornerstone of the Jewish Synagogue was laid by the Masons to-day with imposing ceremonies. Remarks were made by Grand Master Butler, Past Grand Lawrence and Rabbi Henry Gersoni. The Synagogue will cost \$18,000.

EUROPE.
ANOTHER CRISIS THREATENED
IN FRENCH AFFAIRS.

DREADFUL ACCIDENT ON THE
RIVER MUR.

ENGLAND'S PART IN THE LATE
WAR TALK.

PARIS, May 24.—Night.—The recent decision of the Left Centre to vote in favor of the retention of the present system by which the Deputies to the Assembly are elected by a vote of the whole department instead of adopting Minister Buffet's plan for the separate election of a Deputy by each arrondissement, will lead to a disruption of the majority and a ministerial crisis in the present session of the Assembly. If the Left Centre adheres to its resolution, there will be a strong majority against the government, and President McMahon will be obliged to form a coalition legitimist and Bonapartist Ministry.

London, May 24.—Night.—A special dispatch to the Times from Vienna, says a dreadful accident has occurred on the river Mur, at the town of Indenburg, Province of Tyrol. A ferryboat having on board a number of Catholic pilgrims en route to visit Sprines on the other side of the Mur from Indenburg, sunk in the middle of the stream, and fifty-nine pilgrims are known to have been saved, but seventy-six are missing, all of whom are believed to be drowned.

London, May 24.—Night.—In the House of Parliament to-day Diaruchi in reply to a question put by the Marquis of Hartington, said that it was true that the government had advised the Queen to make representations to Germany respecting the relations between that power and France. These representations had been made and were of such a nature as to correct misconceptions and insure the peace of England. A satisfactory reply had been received but it would not be to the public convenience to lay a copy of the correspondence on the table of the House.

THE FIRE FIEND.
 PITHBURGH, May 24.—Night.—The lightning fired a twenty thousand barrel oil tank at Karns City, Pa. Efforts were made to draw the oil out but it is feared that the tank will explode.

SCRANTON, PA., May 24.—Night.—
 The drenching rain has subdued the forest fires in this section, saving a half dozen towns.

LEXINGTON, May 24.—Night.—A fire
 originated in Davis & Adams' fire engine stable. The block was burned and the fire spread to the adjoining square. But one engine and a bucket brigade saved the town. Loss \$100,000.

LACKAWANNA, May 24.—Night.—
 The fire is raging in the counties of Pike, Wayne, Monroe and Lazerie, Pa., and Sullivan, Delaware and Orange, New York. It was checked by Friday's rain but is again gaining strength.

ELECTRICISMS.

Edward Hope, an old merchant and respected citizen, was found dead in his room yesterday at Columbia, S. C. The male spinners at Lowell have returned to work. They will join no union which intends to control wages or hours.

KANSAS.

THE GRASSHOPPERS ON THE
WAR PATH.

KANSAS CITY, May 24.—Night.—The grasshopper has penetrated the heart of the city, and are moving in a vast army, going North. Trenches are being dug and millions are slaughtered in this way, but nothing can stop the red-legged pests in their march. Many persons drive them from their grounds with water from the hydrants. Their depredations are becoming serious, the lawns being stripped of grass and truck gardens destroyed. Nothing can be raised except in greenhouses.

ST. LOUIS.

SESSION ON THE GENERAL AS-
SEMBLY.

St. Louis, May 24.—Night.—In the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church South to-day the report of the Trustees of the Assembly was read and referred to a special committee.

The Trustees have elected James Hamphill President, Rev. John Douglas Vice-President, and Jesse H. Lindsay Secretary and Treasurer.

WEST VIRGINIA.

CONSECRATION OF BISHOP
KAIN.

WHEELING, May 24.—Night.—The consecration of Rev. J. J. Kain as Bishop of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Wheeling, took place yesterday in St. James' Cathedral, which was filled to its utmost capacity. A large number of delegates from this and adjoining States were in attendance. The ceremonies were the most imposing ever witnessed here. The procession included in its train twenty-four diocesan priests, thirty emminent clergymen from other dioceses, Bishop Rosazza, of Ohio, Bishops O'Hara, Shamahan, and Domino, of Pennsylvania, Bishop Gibbons, of Richmond, Va.

VIRGINIA.

QUEEN VICTORIA'S BIRTH-DAY
IN RICHMOND.

RICHMOND, May 24.—Night.—The British Association of Virginia is celebrating Queen Victoria's birth-day with great success, in Richmond. The annual sermon was preached by Rev. Dr. Wall, in Monumental Church, yesterday, to a crowded congregation. Eight Episcopal clergymen, fully robed, took part in the services. The annual business meeting is now in session, Major-General Barton, late of the British Army, presiding. The banquet for this evening will be attended by Governor Kemper, Mayor Keiley, of Richmond, and other distinguished citizens. To-morrow night a grand concert and ball will close the festivities. Fraternal messages have been exchanged with Englishmen in Georgia and elsewhere, celebrating the occasion.
