Rome, May 25.—Noon.—The Pope is seriously ill.

ST. LOUIS.
IMPORTANT QUESTIONS TO COME BEFORE THE ASSEMBLY.

PROCEEDINGS IN THE ASSEMBLY YESTERDAY.

St. Louis, May 25.—Noon.—In the Southern Presbyterian General Assembly yesterday almost the entire session was taken up in the discussion of what is known as the Wilson case, it being a complaint of J. J. Cook and others to the Louisville Presbytery regarding Rev. S. R. Wilson and his congregation, of the First Presbyterian Church of Louisville. Without definite action the Assembly adjourned until to-morrow, when the case will be taken up next to the question involving the relations between the Northern and Southern Churches.—This is the most important case before the Assembly.

St. Louis, May 25.—Night.—In the Presbyterian General Assembly to-day, the Special Committee to whom was referred the matter of friendly relations between the North and South Churches, reported that while they greatly regret that the conference at Baltimore last January was unsuccessful in bringing the two great bodies together in friendly and cordial relations, they heartily endorsed the position of their committee as the only one they could have taken under the circumstances.

CUBA.
THE SKULL AND CROSS BONES IN CUBA.

Havana, May 25.—Noon.—The Vose de Cuba publishes a strong editorial, replying to one in the Independence, of New York, which advocates the continuance of the burning of haciendas and settlements for the purpose of driving the Spaniards out of Cuba.

The Vose accuses Signor Aldania of advocating this plan, and says that the triumph of the insurgents could only produce another Haiti, and that notwithstanding the quantity of African blood in Aldania's veins, and the dark color of his face, he would not be accepted as a recruit by the negro insurgent chief, Cecilio Gonzalez, because he would be considered as belonging to another race. The Vose further says the Independence cries: "No delay, no hesitation!" The Spaniards must do the same. Instead of conquering this band they must assassinate it; because it no longer displays a political but a criminal flag, evoking the memory of scenes in St. Domingo. The article has produced a profound impression. The sympathizers with hesitation pronounce the article of the Independence naive.

ELECTRICISMS.

Eight hours rain has quelled the mountain fires throughout the Mauch Chunk region. The miners are gradually resuming work.

Hon. John Vail, formerly Member of Congress and Consul to Glasgow, died yesterday at Morristown, N. J.

The real estate of Lawrence, the alleged New York silk smuggler, to the amount of \$125,000, has been seized.

Justice Bradley, of the U. S. Court, and District Judge Erkinie, yesterday refused to enjoin the sale of the Macon & Brunswick Railroad or to appoint a Receiver, as petitioned for by John P. Branch, of Virginia.

A Nashville dispatch says that the Supreme Court has decided that the State is not bound for the payment of the new issue, known as the war issue, of Tennessee money, amounting to \$800,000.

A post mortem examination of dead horses, at St. Louis, shows that the disease cerebro spinal meningitis malady, is not spreading.

UNINTERESTING MISCELLANY.

WASHINGTON, May 25.—Night.—From this date the bell will strike at intervals of 15 seconds at Horn Island light station, and at the head of the passes and at the light house stations on the Mississippi river, two blows and one blow alternate, during the ten and twenty seconds, during the foggy weather.

A vinegar establishment, with complete distillery apparatus, has been seized in St. Louis. They are discharging gangues and arresting traders everywhere.

Embroidered buttons and fancy crocheted styles are used on silks and similar goods, and smoked pearl, metal, horn, wood and tortoise shell are used on costume material.

Forest Fires.
Forest fires are of annual occurrence in this country. A spark from the pipe of a tramp may light a conflagration that will sweep over thousands of acres, and destroy tens of thousands of dollars' worth of property. Hunters, not infrequently, are careless of their smoking arrangements, and fires originate from that source. In these and other ways the forests are ignited and fanned in wide billowy oceans of devouring flames. Autumn is commonly the season of the year when forest fires are chronic in the woods are dry and crisp, and take fire like tinder. But this year, in the green leaf of early spring, the country has been visited by the flaming torch of forest conflagration. In almost all directions the sun has been shrouded by palls of smoke. On the line of the Worcester and Nashua Railroad, in Massachusetts, along the Lake Superior and Michigan road, in the neighborhood of Fort Jay, New York, in the pines of New Jersey, in more than one location in the far Northwest, and in the interior of this State fires are raging at the present time, or have left their tracks in ruined houses, prostrated fences and devastated forests. Along some of the railroads in Pennsylvania the smoke is so dense and blinding that objects cannot be distinguished the distance of one hundred yards, and engineers have to run slowly and with the utmost caution. At night the hill sides are illuminated by tongues of flame shooting in every direction. In the day a canopy of smoke hangs over the valleys and gives the landscape a spectral and unnatural appearance. All obstacles of an insurmountable nature have been swept away from the path of the fiery visitant. Houses, trees, buds, blossoms and fruit have been consumed, and where once fertility and verdure met the eye is to be seen only desolation. The earth seems to have been smitten by the sword of the avenging angel. To make matters worse there has been no rain for some time, and everything is uncommonly dry and dangerously combustible. The underbrush in the woods is fit food for the flames, and all kinds of buildings stimulate the fiery current. The loss of property in running into high figures, and to that must be added loss of life in some quarters. These are some of the sad effects of our spring fires. The destruction of our forests by flames is a matter of deep concern at this time, when they are fast giving way before the axe of the logger and the saws of the mills. The supply of timber cannot stand all these attacks upon the native forests, and hence the necessity and importance of adopting some general means to supply the loss annually caused by such fires as those now raging, and which often occur in the autumn months of the year. A heavy fall of rain is now desirable, as it would refresh vegetation, force the crops with greater rapidity, and quench the fires which are now raging in this and other States.—*Phila. Times.*

Forest Fires.

Trade is much depressed in Austria. One of the largest industrial establishments in Vienna—Sigi's engine factory—is about to be closed. Several thousands of workmen will be thrown out of work by the disaster, and their families, numbering, it is estimated, about ten thousand souls, will be left destitute. Only last year this factory made about four hundred locomotives, which were sent to Russia and Italy. Herr Sigi now has orders from Russia for about four hundred railway locomotives; but it is said he cannot obtain the necessary capital for carrying out these orders. The prospect of the now already large number of destitute workmen in the Austrian capital being increased by so many thousands has produced a regular panic among the inhabitants, and earnest efforts are being made to induce the government to advance the necessary sums to Herr Sigi to enable him to keep his factory at work.
