Forest fires are of annual occurence in this country. A spark from the pipe of a tramp may light a con-flagration that will sweep over thou-sands of acres, and destroy tens of thousands of dollars' worth of property. Hunters, not unfrequently, are careless of their cooking arrange-ments, and fires originate from that source. In these and other ways the leaves and brush and dry wood of forests are ignited and fauned in wide billowry oceans of devouring flames, Autumn is commonly the season of the year when forest fires are chron cled, when the woods are dry and crisp, and take fire like tinder. But this year, in the green leaf of early spring, the country has been visited by the flaming torch of forest conflagration. In almost all directions the sun has been shrouded by palls of smoke. On the line of the Worcester

New Jersey, in more than one location in the far Northwest, and in the interior of this State fires are raging at the present time, or have left their tracks in ruined houses, prostrated fences and devastated forests. Along some of the railroads in Pennsylvania the smoke is so dense and blinding that objects cannot be distinguished the distance of one hundred yards, and engineers have to run slowly and with the utmost caution. At night the hill sides are illuminated by tongues of flame shooting in every direction. In the day a canopy of smoke hangs over the valleys and gives the landscape a spectral and unnatural appearance. All obstacles of an inflammable nature have been swept away from the path of the firey visitant Houses, trees, buds, blossoms and fruit have been consumed, and where once fertility and verdue met the eye is to be seen only desolation. The earth seems to have been smitten

by the sword of the avenging angel. To make matters worse there has been no rain for some time, and everything is uncommonly dry and dangerously combustible. The underbrush in the woods is fit food for the flames, and all kinds of buildings stimulate the flery current. The loss of property is running into high figures, and to that must be added loss of life in some quarters. These are some of the sad effects of our spring fires. The destruction of our forests by flames is a matter of deep concern at this time, when they are fast giving way before the axe of the logger and the saws of the mills. The supply of timber can-not stand all these attacks upon the native forests, and hence the necessity and importance of adopting some gen eral means to supply the loss annually caused by such fires as those now rag-ing, and which often occur in the autumn months of the year. A heavy fall of rain is now desirable, as it would refresh vegetation, force the crops with greater rapidity, and quench the fires which are now raging in this
