EXPLOSION IN A DRUG STORE AND LOSS OF LIFE.

A STOCK COMPANY FOR THE BOSTON POST.

Boston, May 27-Noon-An explosion in Dow's drug store, on Washington street, caused the walls to fall. Two dead and three fatally hurt were taken out. Twelve have been sent to the hospital. The street were crowded with people and vehicles. A street car was thrown on its side by the explosion. A horse and buggy was found under the ruins. Adjoining build ings were shattered. The cause of the explosion is unknown.

Rev. Duncan McGregor, of England, was elected Honorary Vice-President. Beveral satisfactory addresses were made. The afternoon session was occupied by reports. The Washington Echo says: The total valuation of real and personal property, in Washington Township, for 1874, was \$567,324, while that of 1875 is \$612,285, showing an increase of about \$45,000. If the other townships increase proportionally, the in-creased valuation of real and personal

property in this county will reach \$150,000. The Charlotte Observer says: On Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of last week, Mr. Eccles, of the Central Hotel, fed 500 persons at each meal, and at each meal on Thursday a frac-tion ove that number. On Wednes-day, Thursday and Friday nights he furnished sleeping accommodations for between 350 and 400 guests. The like of this was never before accomplished by any hotel in North Carolina. Not

only were 1,500 people a day fed for three days, but they were fed well. The Raleigh News says: Among the pleasant incidents which relieved the painful accidents at Charlotte of some of their suffering, was the prompt and unremitting attention of the ladies of the place to the wounded. None were more assiduous in attention than Mrs. Stonewall Jackson. One of the wounded was Mr. Bingham, well known to have been a Federal soldier, and an artilleryman during the war. This was known to Mrs. J., yet she sent him a bouquet, accompanied with a kind note inclosing ten dollars, re-gretting that her circumstances prevented a larger donation. She after-wards visited the wounded man in person, sitting at his bedside, and ministering to his wants with the most tender concern. And she has repeated her visits daily, and will probably do so as long as Mr. Bingham remains in Charlotte.


