THE FIRE FIEND

DESTRUCTION OF A FRENCH CATHOLIC CHURCH.

HORRIBLE SCENES.

SEVENTY-FIVE PERONS PERISH IN THE FLAMES.

SPRINGFIELD, May 28-Noon-The French Catholic Church at South Holyoke has been burned. A candin on the altar fired the drapery. Most of those in the body of the church escaped, while those in the gallery mostly perished. Services had nearly closed, and vespers were being sung There was but one exit from the gal lery which extended around the build There were 700 worshipers present, 75 of whom perished. The efforts of the people to get into the church to

rescue friends, increased the confusion and added to the disaster. Personal violence had to be used to keep women from rushing into the flame to save children. The church was established seven years ago. The parish included all the French Catholics in

the vicinity, numbering 2,500. The Church was built in 1870; was 100 by 60 feet. It was two stories and entirely of pine. The galleris on the sides and North end were about 25 feet wide. There were two doors in the North end and vestibule from which two doors opened in the body of the Church. The galleries opened into the vestibule and at the rear end there was another door by which a few persons escaped. Immediately upon the breaking out of the flames all the occupants of the galleries rushed to the east door and crowded so that they fell upon one onother and choked up the doorways with their bodies piled in all ways, some 7 or 8 feet deep and here most of the lives were lost. From this mass Chief Mullin rescued one young woman after taking off two dead bodies from above her. It dead bodies from above her.
