Lord Derby replied that the government had no right to interfere in the Coolie question. An assertion made by the me-morialists, that the Cuban war was fast culminating in favor of the insurgents, was at least premature. He did not think Spain would would view any pro-posal of mediation favorably. She would doubtless answer: "W must first finish the Carlists then we shall have all our ferces disposable for finishing the war in Cuba." At the same time, continued Lord Derby, the British government would be very glad to avail itself of any prospect that was offered for putting an end to the existing state of things in Cuba.

The emancipation of slaves would, be accomplished by itself, but must form part of a complete scheme for the pacification of the Island. The present time, therefore, was not favorable for English interfecence. He believed that the United States had no desire to annex Cuba, but, at the same time, the American Government and people would receive any attempt on the part of England to interfere be-tween Spain and Cuba with considerable suspicion, and be apt to put a wrong construction upon it.

DEMOCRATIC OFFICERS ARE ELECTED AND THE RADI-CALS WITHDRAW.

THEY GO INTO THE LEGISLA-TIVE BUSINESS ON THEIR OWN HOOK.

CONCORD, June 2-Night-The Legslature met to-day smid great excitement. Twelve Senators who were elected qualified. John Sanborne was elected President of the Senate, re-ceiving seven Democratic votes—the Republicans declining to vote. Five Republicans then withdrew in a body. The Senate then completed its organization under Democratic auspices.—
