After holding out for five months and maintaining a bold front to the last, the men have concluded that there is no possibility of success for them, and are coming to operators all over he region and offering to work on any terms. The Miners Union has suddenly dissolved, and its members are coming, not as branches nor in any official capacity, but as individual members, seeking work. On Tuesday and yesterday colliers had either started or arranged to start, at Mahnary City, Gelbertson, Ashland, Shenandoah, and in the western part of this county, and more will follow to-day.
