ARREST OF A SOUTH CAROLINA MURDERER.

THE RECENT ROBBERY IN THE TREASURY.

WASHINGTON, June 7—Night—Detectives Sargeant and McElfresh, of this city, arrested to-day a colored desperado from South Carolina, named Abraham Johnson, alias Dial, charged with the murder of Dr. E. C. Shell, a wealthy citizen of Lawrence, S. C. Johnson was turned over to the officers from that State to be taken back for trial.

The Secretary of the Treasury to-day made a visit of inspection to the cash room of the Treasury Department and other rooms where money is handled, with a view of making some alteration in the construction of the desks, etc., for the better protection of Government funds. The Secretary gave notice to-day that from and after this date visitors will not be admitted to the Bureau of Engraving and Printing, the vaults of the Treasury or to any rooms in the building in which money is kept and handled.

The detectives have not yet obtained a clue to the robbery. There is some talk of the Treasurer offering a reward for the arrest of the thief and the recovery of the stolen funds, but Secretary Bristow has not yet decided to do so.

The following was received from the Signal Service Observer at Cape May: A box containing the following writing on a small piece of paper, was picked up on the beach near this city this evening: "Wm. Jones, of York, Pennsylvania. Come out and help us, we are in danger of going under. Tell my wife and children good-bye. June 5th, night."

THE FIRE FIEND.

HAMILTON, ONT., June 7—Noon—An incendiary fire here Sunday destroyed Hill's cabinet factory, Herald Bros.' piano factory, North's tin shop, two storerooms connected with Capps' foundry, two dwelling houses and a large quantity of lumber and moulder frames. Loss \$50,000.

OTTAWA, ONT., June 7—Noon—A fire at Hull yesterday morning destroyed Gilman's large steam saw, the engine house only being saved. The loss is estimated at \$75,000—insurance \$75,000.

ST. ALBANS, VT., June 7—Noon—The house of Henry C. Greene, a farmer, was destroyed by an incendiary fire yesterday. While the house was burning Greene was shot twice by C. S. Weeks, a neighbor who subsequently committed suicide. Disappointed love and the belief that Greene had influenced the object of his affections against him led to the tragedy. Greene's wounds are slight.

ELECTRICISMS.

There was a heavy wind and rain storm in the vicinity of Richmond, Va., on Sunday night, during which a negro man was instantly killed by lightning, and a woman severely shocked.

A dispatch from Winnipeg says the first end of the main line of the Canada & Pacific Railway, at the Red River crossing, was turned on Thursday.

Two men were drowned in attempting to cross the river during the storm. During the last few days the weather has been the severest of the season. The latest reports confirm the destruction of the grasshoppers by cold rain and snow.

A negro, named John Simmons, who committed a terrible rape, found temporary safety yesterday in the Annapolis jail.

Madame Bastorel, wife of a French Communist, has written a letter saying that her husband and his companions have escaped from New Caledonia, to show to the world the manner in which the Communist prisoners were doomed to death by starvation, in New Caledonia.

CHICAGO.

THE WHISKEY QUESTION IN THE WEST.

TWENTY-TWO ALDERMANIC POLITICIANS FINED.

CHICAGO, June 7—Noon—In the U. S. District Court, held before Judge Blodgett, the question of the Government seizing the books and papers of those persons whose distilleries have been seized, on the charge of defrauding the revenue, was argued on Saturday. The defendants were represented by Hon. Matt Carpenter, Sidney Smith, Leonard Swift and Edmund Jensen, and the prosecution by District Attorney Wirt, Dexter and others. The Government claims that these books and papers are parts of the personal property of the distillers, and are therefore liable to seizure and forfeiture. The defence claimed, on the other hand, that the books and papers are private property and exempt under the law, they not being compelled to furnish evidence for their own conviction. Mr. Carpenter closed for the defence when the Judge took the matter under advisement.

CHICAGO, June 7—Noon—The twenty-two Aldermen who have been before Judge Williams during the past week for contempt of Court, in having violated an injunction restraining them from counting the votes cast at the last municipal election, were this morning each fined \$100 and costs and their counsel were fined \$300 and costs. They immediately took an appeal.

CUBA.

A FATAL DUEL AT HAVANA BETWEEN TWO INTIMATE FRIENDS.

HAVANA, June 7—Night—A duel took place yesterday between Dr. Algernon Sydney Curtis, of New York, and Salvador Contreras, a tobacco merchant of Havana and New York. The combatants had been intimate friends for many years and lived together in New York. Dr. Curtis arrived here two weeks ago, and was stopping at Contreras's house. He states that yesterday morning he was awakened by Contreras slapping his face and accusing him of illicit connection with his wife. This Curtis denied and hot words ensued, which resulted in a challenge to fight and its acceptance. That afternoon both men proceeded in a carriage to Mariano without witnesses, and on arriving there dismissed the carriage. Five shots were fired by each contestant, beginning at a distance of twenty feet and firing as they advanced. At the fifth discharge Dr. Curtis was seriously wounded in the hip and fell to the ground, fainting from pain and loss of blood. Upon recovering consciousness, he says he saw Contreras reload his revolver and place it at his temple and fire, killing himself. Contreras's body has been brought to this city. It is thought he believed his opponent dead when he killed himself. Dr. Curtis is confined to his bed by the severity of his wounds, and is under police surveillance.

EUROPE.

EMIGRATION SCHEME FOR THE MISSISSIPPI VALLEY.

THE MUTINEERS OF THE JEFFERSON BORDEN.

LONDON, June 7—Night—Messrs. Odger and Wicks, delegates appointed by the Federal Union of Agricultural Laborers, to make an examination of the Mississippi Valley for the purpose of ascertaining its suitability for the settlement of emigrants, will leave for the United States in about two weeks.

Three members of the crew of the American schooner Jefferson Borden were brought up at Bow Street Police Court to-day. Miller, the Russian Fin, made a statement in which he attacked the seamanship of the Captain, and reiterated charges of cruel treatment of the crew by the officers. The Magistrate ruled that sufficient evidence had been adduced to send the prisoners to the United States, which will be done at the expiration of fifteen days.

Edward Welby Pugin, the English architect, is dead.

MORE ABOUT THE MINING TROUBLES.

ALL QUIET YESTERDAY.

ASHLAND, PA., June 7—Noon—This morning a number of miners were arrested and arraigned before the Justice General, on the oath of Jno. Degrant of Donaldson, for making riotous demonstrations around his premises. Degrant was working at a colliery up on terms to suit himself, but not the M. & L. B. A., and hence the demonstration and threats.

POTTSVILLE, June 7—Night—All is quiet and the troops have been withdrawn from the several points.

NORFOLK.

PICKED UP AT SEA BOTTOM UPWARDS.

NORFOLK, June 7—Night—Capt. Chase, of the schooner S. S. Lewis, reports an hermaphrodite brig ashore on Chincocombee beach, bottom up. Her name was not seen. The beachers have taken charge of her and claim that they towed her in five miles from sea. It is rumored here that the captain of the brig and one seaman were saved, but it is not known positively whether any of the crew were saved. The beachers were cutting the wreck up yesterday afternoon.
