AUSTRALIA.
THE FRENCH COMMUNISTS APPEAL FOR ENGLISH SYMPATHY.

REPORT OF A TERRIBLE EPIDEMIC AT FIJI.

LONDON, June 8.—Noon.—The Standard publishes a letter forwarded from Australia by Madame Bastard, and signed by eight French Communists who escaped from New Caledonia. It appeals for English sympathy in behalf of the prisoners on the Isle of Pines. It declares that the authorities are endeavoring to starve them, and in support of the charge, official regulations are appended, according to which only the necessities of life are provided for those who refuse to work.

MELBOURNE, June 8.—Noon.—Reports from the Fiji Islands state that 50,000 natives have died of epidemic measles.

GOTHAM.
A DESPERATE BURGLAR AND A DYING MAN.

CENTENNIAL OF THE OLDEST MINISTER IN THE UNITED STATES.

THE JEROME PARK RACES.

New York, June 8.—Night.—Early this morning burglars entered the house of Aaron Shute, in Brooklyn. Shute heard one of them in his room and seized him. While he had the burglar down the latter fired twice, both balls going through Shute's neck and one touching his brain. The burglar escaped. It is thought that Mr. Shute will die. The room shows every evidence of a desperate struggle.

The one hundredth birthday of Father Henry Boehm, of Newark (N. J.), Methodist Episcopal Conference, and seventy-sixth of his ministry, was celebrated to-day in Trinity M. E. Church, of Jersey City. The Church was crowded, including many ministers. The venerable Father arrived some time after the commencement of services, and remained until the close. Addresses were made by Bishop Simpson and others. Father Boehm is said to be the oldest minister in the United States. He was born in Lancaster county, Pennsylvania.

New York, June 8.—Night.—In the fourth race, purse \$500, for all ages, one mile and a half, two started and the race was won by Springbok, under a pull, three lengths before Mateo; time 2:43. In the fifth race for the grand National handicap, steeple chase, over the usual steeple course, about two and a half miles; six starters; won by Diavolo, the favorite, by a length; Resolute second, Daylight third, Moonstone fourth, Austine fifth, and Biba Kiba last; time not announced by the Judges. Buller and Trouble were withdrawn from the steeple chase on account of a malady for \$5,000 a side, made to-day, and which will be decided next Thursday, over the usual steeple course of two and a half miles.

On the second day of the meeting the first was a mile dash for purse. Six horses started; won by Madge in a half length, Spirit coming in second, Risk third, Harry Felton fourth, Warrior fifth, and Burgos sixth. Madge was the favorite at five to one against the field; time 1:45.

Berlin, June 8.—Noon.—Wiesinger, who attempted to extort money by implicating parties in a plot to assassinate Bismarck, has been committed for trial on the charge of fraud.

A grand banquet is to be given here to-day to Carl Schurz, by the American residents of Berlin and members and professors of the Berlin University.

LONDON, June 8.—Noon.—The Pall Mall Gazette says the Persian Railroad concession to Falkenberg has not been fulfilled.

The Ascot meeting began to-day. The race for the Ascot stakes was won by Organist; Lillian came in second and Bertram third.

a general advance in prices of from 1 to 2 shillings. The London market is as dull as ever.

The weather for the Ascot races was favorable and the attendance of spectators was unprecedentedly large, including the Prince and Princess of Wales, Duke and Duchess of Edinburgh, Prince and Princess Louis, of Hesse, and other members of the Royal family. For the Ascot stakes, ten horses started, the winner being Organist, who was made the favorite at two to one, immediately before the race. Lillian, who was rated at twelve to one, came in second; and Bertram, with ten to one against him, third. The race for the gold vase, in which four horses ran, was won by the mare Marie Stuart, Correction running second and Kaiser third. For the Prince of Wales' stake, twelve horses started; Resolute was the favorite at twelve to one. The Earl of Dartry, against whom fourteen to one was laid before the start, came in first; the Bay of Naples was second, and Balfain, the favorite, the sixth.

NEWFOUNDLAND.
A TALE OF HORROR FROM THE SEA.

QUEBEC, June 8.—Night.—The Captain of the bark Tororo reports that while off the banks of Newfoundland on the 16th of May, at 9 P. M., it being very dark and a thick fog prevailing, he ran into a two-masted vessel with no sails set and no lights burning. Heard cries of the people on board at the time of the collision, and put back twice in the hopes of finding the crew, but failed; the sea being very high and the night dark could not see the vessel. Had a look-out at bow and one on each side. It is his opinion that the vessel sank at once.

ELECTRICISMS.

Wm. Parmenter and two other men named Thompson and Healey, who were fishing by flashlight from a boat on Raquette's river, near Fortdan, N.Y., Saturday night, were carried over the dam by a current and all drowned.

Hugh J. Jewett has been appointed Receiver for the Erie Rail Road in New Jersey, with a bond of \$150,000.

The order corresponds with that ordered by the New York Court.

At Harmony, Mo., the body of Ada Marshall, of irreproachable character, who took a walk last Sunday, was found in the river. Indications of outrage and murder.

The attorney for the defence in the recent civil rights case, in Galveston, Texas, made a motion for a new trial before Judge Woods or Justice Bradley of the Supreme Court. Judge Morrill took the motion under consideration.

HEADQUARTERS.
PACKAGES FROM THE SCHILLER AT THE DEAD LETTER OFFICE.

WASHINGTON, June 8.—Noon.—Two packages, mailed by the wrecked steamer Schiller, has been received at the Dead Letter Office. The addresses have been effaced by the water. Most of the letters are written in foreign languages.

MISSISSIPPI.
CROSBY, THE VICKSBURG NEGRO SHERIFF, FATALLY SHOT BY HIS DEPUTY.

Vicksburg, June 8.—Noon.—Crosby, the negro sheriff of this county, while drinking with his Deputy, a white man named Gilmor, was shot under the left eye. He was made an affidavit against Gilmor. Crosby's wound is supposed to be mortal.

GEORGIA.
A FATAL AFFRAY.

AUGUSTA, June 8.—A difficulty occurred yesterday at Benecola, Columbia county, between Ras Beale and Claude Lettner. Blows were passed and the parties were separated. Beale renewed the fight this morning by firing a pistol at Lettner, who fired a load of buckshot into the breast of the former, killing him instantly.

NEW HAMPSHIRE.
THE SUPREME COURT SUSTAINS THE SENATE.

CONCORD, June 8.—Night.—After a long argument, the Court was of opinion that when the Senate adjudge Messrs. Priest and Proctor duly elected Senators, their action was final and conclusive as to their right. The opinion was based on the assumption that at the time of the action of the Senate a constitutional quorum was present. The opinion is signed by Chief Justice Cushing and Associate Justices Ladd and Smith.

TEXAS.
SUIT FOR CONTEMPT AGAINST THE GALVESTON NEWS.

GALVESTON, June 8.—Night.—In the United States District Court this A. M., in the case against the proprietors of the News, the attorneys for the defendants presented a motion to quash the indictment on the following grounds: First—The Court had no jurisdiction in such manner in contempt, and such procedure on the part of the Court was contrary to all law and practice of the United States. Second—That while the proprietors of the News claimed the right and privilege to disseminate all questions before the Court in which the public was interested, yet in the article referred to on law and

higher law, no disrespect was intended to the Court, as intimated in the orders for arrest, nor any attempt made to influence the case then pending in the Court, nor bring it into disrepute. Judge Wm. B. Haining, of the counsel for Richardson, Riolo & Co., expressed his desire to state the legal points involved, but Judge Morrill decided not to hear him, saying that he would take the papers under advisement until to-morrow morning. The question in his mind first to be settled was whether an answer was sufficient to show cause why an attachment for contempt should not be issued. If it was further proceedings would be unnecessary.

Another American schooner has been seized by the Spaniards, on the charge of being loaded with arms and ammunition for the insurgents in Cuba.

They have had a race in England from which it seems a fair inference that the English horses are improved in bottom by an infusion of Arab blood.

The last issue of the German official history of the war may correct the habit that is becoming common of regarding the battle at Sedan as a mere massacre of the French. It reports the German loss in that fight at 460 officers and 8,500 men.

The word "put," meaning the right of delivery of stock in the future at a price named, is generally supposed to have originated in Wall street, but it was in use in London in the same sense during the "South sea" excitement.
