HEADQUARTERS.  
BISHOP HAVENS SELECTED AS ONE OF THE COMMISSIONERS TO TREAT WITH THE SIOUXS.

THE NATIONAL BANK REDEMPTION AGENCY TO CLOSE FROM THE 25TH OF JUNE TO 1ST OF JULY.

WASHINGTON, June 12—News—Among the Commissioners selected to treat with the Sioux Indians, for the alienation of the Black Hills, Bishop Havens, of Georgia. He has not yet accepted.

WASHINGTON, June 12—Night—The following notice has been issued by the National Bank Redemption Agency: "In order to facilitate the examination of the cash upon the retirement of the present Treasury, this Agency will be closed for redemptions from the 25th day of June to the 1st day of July next, both days inclusive. Correspondents are specially requested not to send remittances of bank notes for redemption so that they will arrive during that period, but to hold up their remittance until the 1st of July. Remittances of National Bank notes, U. S. notes and certificates of deposit for credit for the five per cent, will be received as usual.

A telegram to the Treasury Department announces that the first case of illicit distillation under the recent seizure was tried yesterday at Evansville, Ind., being that of Benjamin Bros., who were tried only on one charge; that of running their distillery in the absence of a store-keeper. The verdict was in favor of the Government, and a fine of \$1,000 was imposed.

By direction of the President, Col. John G. Barnard's corps of engineers has been assigned to duty according to his commission as Brevet Major-General. This assignment makes Col. Barnard the ranking officer of the Light House Board, of which he is a member.

The President has signed the commission of Benjamin Cooley as Postmaster at Atlanta.

ARREST OF COUNTERFEITERS.  
HAVANA, June 12—Night—News by the way of St. Thomas reports a terrible earthquake in New Grenada. The destruction was greatest in the Valley of Cochiba. It is stated that 16,000 lives were lost.

The police arrested to-day, six persons in the act of preparing counterfeit tax receipts and lottery tickets.

THE VICKSBURG.  
TWELVE MORE OF THE PASSENGERS AND CREW OF THE ILL-FATED STEAMER VICKSBURG RESCUED.

MONTREAL, June 12—Night—The following telegram has just been received: St. John's, New Foundland. To David Torrance & Co., Montreal: Nine of the crew and three passengers of the Vicksburg were brought here by an American fisherman.

EUROPE.  
A CRISIS IMMINENT AT ATHENS.  
THE SHIP NIAGARA GOING TO PIECES.  
A PORTION OF THE CARGO OF THE BARK RUNNER SAVED.

LONDON, June 12—Night—The Daily News reports that a crisis is imminent at Athens which may result in the abdication of the King. Five Turkish men of war have been ordered to cruise the Greek waters. The Russian Minister has advised the King not to abdicate without securing the rights of his heir to the throne. The probability is that the Convention will be dissolved at Athens.

The hull of the ship Niagara, which went ashore off Holy Head, is breaking up, the stern having fallen away. Three hundred bales of cotton have been recovered from the wreck.

Of the cargo of the bark runner, from Savannah, for Finland, which stranded in the Gulf of Bothnia, five hundred bales of cotton, slightly damaged and seven hundred seriously damaged, have been recovered. There are two hundred bales still on board the vessel.

PARIS, June 12—Night—The Workmen's societies of this city have opened a national subscription to provide for the sending a delegation to the Philadelphia exhibition.

Marcel, the Communist editor who urged the shooting of the Archbishop of Paris, died in New Calcedonia.

## SOUTH AMERICA.

### TERRIBLE EARTHQUAKE AT SALAZAR.

SEVERAL CITIES MORE OR LESS DESTROYED.

### IMMENSE LOSS OF LIFE AND DESTRUCTION OF PROPERTY.

PERU, June 4—The royal mail steamer Baliza, which arrived at Aspinwall to-day, from Savinillo, brings the following particulars published in an extra of the Barrangula Shipping List, of May 29th, of the terrible earthquake in the Andes:—The steamer Isabel, which arrived yesterday from the interior, reached our city with her flag at half mast indicating that she was the bearer of unwelcome news and while there were various conjectures as to its import, none had for a moment pictured the colossal magnitude of the awful calamity which had taken place. The information which has reached us on the subject is contained in a letter dated Salazar, seven leagues from Cuzco, the 19th of the present month, from which we extract and translate the following: At 11:10, A. M., yesterday, the 18th, a severe earthquake visited this city and region. In this city a large part of the church fell and several houses were destroyed and some people killed. The city of Cuentilla is entirely destroyed, only a few families being saved. A German drug store was set on fire by a ball of fire which was thrown out of a volcano, which is constantly belching out lava. This volcano has opened itself in front of Santiago in a ridge called the El Alto de la Giracha. San Cayetano was destroyed, also a large part of Santiago. In Gramolote there was great destruction. Arboleda, Cuzco and San Cristobal are nearly destroyed. The population in those towns is estimated by persons well acquainted in that region, more or less, as follows: San Cayetano, four thousand, Santiago, two thousand, Gramolote, three thousand, Arboleda, five thousand, Cuentilla, five thousand, San Cristobal six thousand. The section of country above referred to embraces the regions around about where Columbia and Venezuela join, the Columbian portion embracing the State of Santander. It is in some respects the most productive part of this Republic, and the coffee of this section is famous the world over. One of the destroyed cities—San Jose de Cuzco—the city of the most importance of any in that section, was situated on the boundary of the Republic, in latitude 7 degrees 30 minutes north, longitude 72 degrees 10 minutes west, and was founded by Juan de Marton, in 1534. It was a port of entry, if an inland town can be called a port, and here was established a custom house. The population of the city at the time of the disaster was estimated at about 18,000. It had a large commercial business, was a great depot for coffee and cocoa for shipment either through the Venezuelan ports or down the Magdalena to this city.

The shock was felt sharply in Bogota and the adjacent region.

A gentleman who was at the time in Facatavaya says that the movement lasted for three-quarters of a minute. It was slightly felt in Barranquilla.

The above particulars are all we have been able to obtain for this mail.

## SOUTH CAROLINA.

### DEPARTURE OF THE WASHINGTON LIGHT INFANTRY TO PARTICIPATE IN THE BUNKER HILL CELEBRATION.

CHARLESTON, July 12—Night—The departure of the visiting detachment of the Washington Light Infantry, with fifty muskets, for Bunker Hill at noon to-day, on the steamer Charleston, was the occasion of a marked popular demonstration of patriotic feeling. The State colors given to the corps by Gov. Chamberlain, were presented by Hon. W. D. Porter in front of the Charleston Hotel in presence of an immense concourse and detachment. They were escorted to the pier amid great enthusiasm. The steamer was covered with a display of bunting. By order of General Vodges, U. S. A. Commanding Post, a light battery of the First Artillery in full uniform, were drawn up at the head of the pier, and as the steamer moved out from the dock her parting gun was answered by a national salute of thirty-seven guns from the battery. The visiting corps include several ex-rebels whose last visit to New York was as wounded prisoners en route to Elmira.

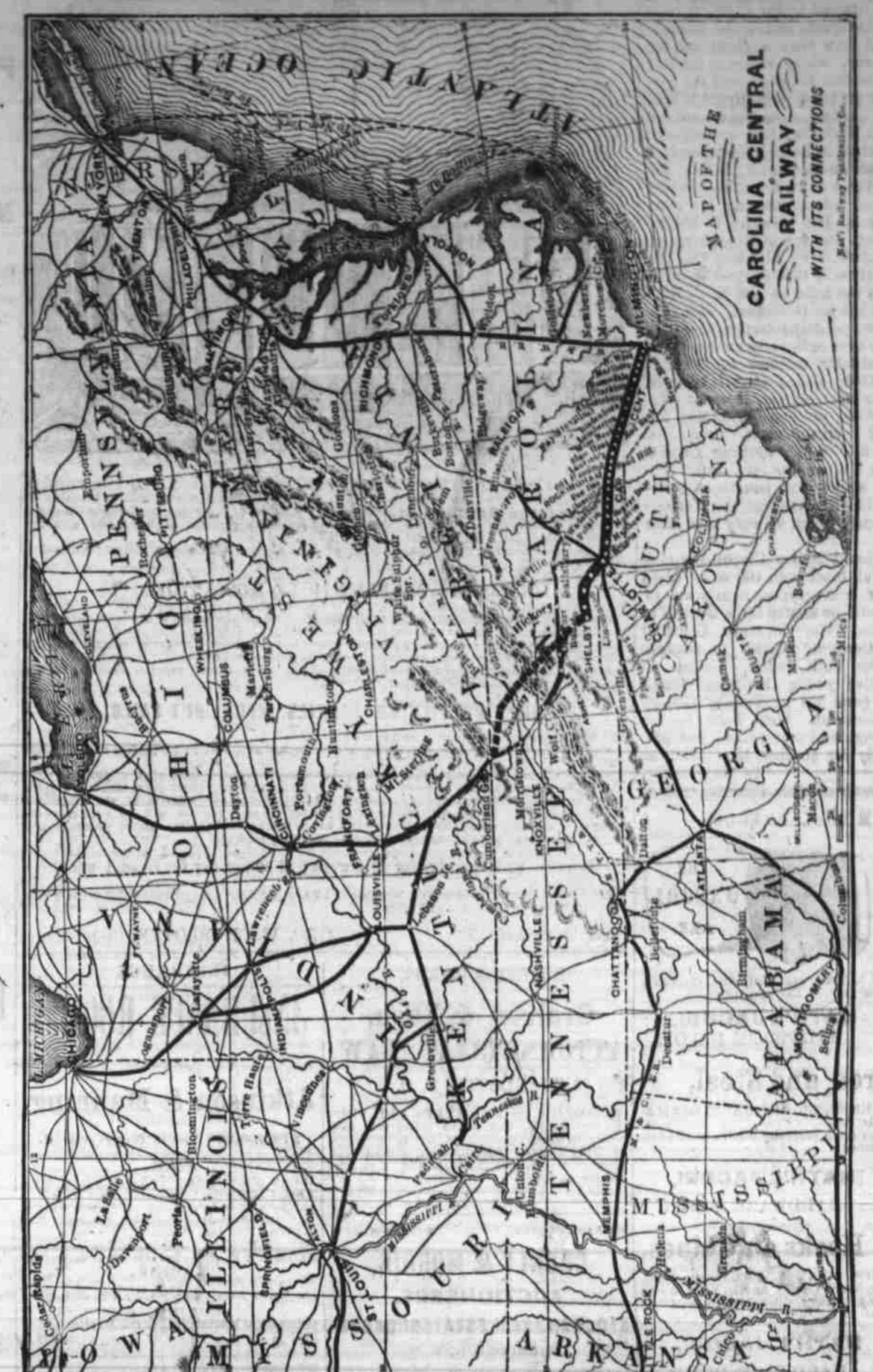
### THE LIBEL SUIT AGAINST THE PITTSBURG POST DECIDED.

The cause of the suit was an article published in the Post, in February, 1874, wherein Moore, then Chairman of the Democratic County Committee, was accused of abandoning his trust as Chairman and being a traitor to his party.
