HEADQUARTERS.

DEDICATION OF A NEW CATHOLIC CHURCH.

WASHINGTON, June 14—Noon.—The St. Dominic new Catholic Church was dedicated on Sunday. A vast crowd was in attendance. Archbishop Bagley, assisted by Bishops Gibbons and Becker, attended by a large number of priests, officiated. Bishop Gibbons, of Richmond, preached at night.

WASHINGTON, June 14—Night.—John S. Haines, Attorney General of Mississippi, is here.

The 5th Regiment Cavalry post, four years on duty in New Mexico, has been ordered to relieve the Ninth Regiment in Texas, and the latter to New Mexico.

Pierpont has gone to New York. He will be absent a week.

It is expected that the London Syndicate will early next month make another call on the Treasury Department for an additional number of the new United States bonds, the money market being favorable to such investments.

The Treasury Department is confident that the proofs already obtained are sufficient to convict all the crooked whiskey distillers. The action of the government officers entrusted with the prosecution of the alleged offenders is entirely satisfactory to the Department. Indictments have already been found against some of the distillers in the West. Trials will necessarily be delayed by the adjournment of the Courts, but in the meantime the government will fully prepare itself to make the prosecutions effective.

THE WATER FAMINE.

THE CASE OF CLAFLIN & CO.

RAILROAD ACCIDENT AND SEVERAL PERSONS INJURED.

NEW YORK, June 14—Noon.—The Express train which left Boston at 8 o'clock Saturday morning ran off the track. Vice President Wilson was not injured. Blaine was hurt inside. Miss Anna Louise Cary, opera singer, had her right shoulder bruised. There were no other persons killed.

NEW YORK, June 15—Night.—There is a water famine in the lower part of the city the water being stopped. The Croton Engineers are looking into the matter.

In the U. S. Circuit District Court to-day members of the firm of Claflin & Co. and Field, Morris, Tanner & Co., together with Col. Desanges and Chas. S. Lawrence, were arranged to plead to indictments found against them by the Grand Jury for complicity in the silk smuggling frauds. They all plead not guilty with the exception of Lawrence, whose counsel asked for time, which was granted.

EUROPE.

QUEENSTOWN, JUNE 14—Noon.—The steamship City of Chester, from New York, with the American Rifle Team on board, arrived here to-day.

BERLIN, June 14—Noon.—Count VanArmin is seriously ill.

THE FIRE FIEND.

OMAHA, June 14—Night.—A dispatch from Fort Russell, Wyoming Territory, says that one of the 400 tons of hay piles was discovered to be on fire early this morning, and while the command was at that fire the commissary store house was also discovered to be burning, but the latter was extinguished with but slight damage. The loss will prove a total loss. One of the cavalry stables was also burned.

THE VICKSBURG.

FURTHER PARTICULARS OF THE TERRIBLE DISASTER.

St. Johns, N. F., June 14—Noon.—Parker Greenwood, a seaman, made the following statement on the night of May 31st: We got in the scattered ice; we were steaming slow, expecting to get through when the sea-ice struck the Vicksburg's quarter, knocking a hole and breaking the propeller. The sea-ice then knocked a hole near her bunkers. At 6 A. M., June 1st, we found the vessel sinking fast and we got the boats out. The first boat, with four men, was swamped alongside; and our second boat, with twelve men, got stove, and we stopped the leak with a blanket. A quarter of an hour afterwards the vessel sank. We tried to save the men who were floating on spars and hay, but could not get near them for the sea and ice. We saw one boat with fifty men and another with the first officer and six men. Afterwards saw her bottom up with the first officer and three men on her bottom. The Captain told us we were 120 miles from St. Johns, to steer northwest. We saw the Captain on the bridge a moment before the steamer sank.

St. Johns, June 15—Night.—The sealing-boat Commodore has also gone in search of the missing Vicksburg. The boats with the survivors of the Vicksburg disaster which reach here Saturday, were brought in by the American schooner Burnham. They report that six boats were lowered from the Vicksburg and that two of them capsized alongside and one capsized two hours after leaving the vessel and one, their own, was picked up. The one of the two boats unaccounted for was thought to contain the six men who arrived in New York. The Captain and officers are said to have behaved well but the seamen acted badly. The Captain and two of the crew were seen to be in the water.

OHIO.

ASSASSINATION OF A NOTORIOUS DESPERADO.

CINCINNATI, June 14—Night.—Tom Melgehan, a notorious desperado, issued famous by the tragic end of his cousin, Hon. C. L. Vallindingham, who lost his life in explaining some points in the trial of Melgehan for the murder of a man named Myer, was assassinated in his saloon at Hamilton last night. From the appearance of the room and position of the body the supposition is that some one entered the saloon and called for a drink and while Melgehan was serving his customer, he was shot by some one through a window, as a pane of glass in the window was shattered into fragments, although he was shot with several bullets in the right temple and side of the face. Melgehan had strength enough to get his revolver to defend himself, but fell dead on reaching the end of the counter. No clue to the murderer.

BUNKER HILL.

NORFOLK BLUES AND RICHMOND KNIGHTS AND THE CENTENNIAL.

NORFOLK, June 14—Noon.—The Norfolk Light Artillery Blues left for Boston this afternoon on the steamer Wm. Lawrence. They were escorted to the steamer by the Battalion of United States Marines, headed by the Naval Band and by the City Guard. The flags of the shipping in port were displayed, and a number of steamers accompanied the Wm. Lawrence to Hampton Roads. As the Wm. Lawrence swung out from the wharf they were saluted by the United States receiving ship New Hampshire, which was returned by the Blues amidst the wildest enthusiasm. Salutes were exchanged with Gen. Barry, at Fort Monroe. A number of distinguished gentlemen accompanied the Blues, among them Gen. Fitzhugh Lee, Col. Walter Taylor, who was Adjutant General on Gen. R. E. Lee's staff, M. Glennan, of the Virginian, and others.

RICHMOND, June 14—Noon.—Richmond Commandery, No. 2, Knights Templars, left at 3 P. M., via York River route and Boston, to participate in the Bunker Hill Centennial Celebration. The visiting Knights number fifty, but will be joined by others on the route, and expect to number seventy-five upon their arrival at Boston. The Commandery is in charge of that eminent Commander, Wm. E. Tander, and will be the guests of DeMolay and the Commandery of Boston. They will be absent about ten days.

MARYLAND.

LYNCHING OF THE NEGRO SEMMES AT ANNAPOLIS.

HE IS TAKEN OUT OF JAIL BY A MOB AND HUNG.

ANNAPOLIS, June 14—Noon.—A mob, composed principally of residents of Anne Arundel county, in which the recent outrage upon Miss Jackson was committed by the negro Semmes, came into this city at a very early hour this morning, and proceeding to the jail, demanded the keys from the jailer with a view of taking Semmes out and executing him. The jailer was searched, and the keys having been found, a large number of visitors went to the jail, and finding him chained, dragged him away without releasing him from iron, and taking him a short distance from the city and near the railroad track, hung him to a tree, where he still hangs. A large number of citizens and others have visited the place to-day to view his remains. The mob was well provided with pick-axes, crow-bars and other instruments for gaining admission to the jail, had they met with forcible resistance. The negro did not say a word when he was taken. Some of the lynchers proposed taking another negro who was in the jail awaiting trial for rape, which he committed on a colored woman, but others demurred, and the mob was pacified with taking Semmes. A coroner's inquest will be held upon the remains to-day. Many of the lynchers were painted black and some were masked.

ELECTRICISMS.

There was a heavy frost in New York and Pennsylvania last night. Four crews of the College regatta have arrived at Saratoga and are practicing.

At Philadelphia the Athletics scored 12 to the Washington's 2 in a match game of base ball; at Chicago the Boston's made 24 to 7 for Chicago, and at Louisville, the Philadelphia's scored 13, the Louisville Eagles 5.

Joseph B. Gardines, a wealthy Boston merchant, was found dead yesterday in the woods near that city with a revolver by his side. It is supposed he committed suicide.

The Fifth Maryland National Guard left Baltimore this morning for Boston to attend the Bunker Hill Centennial.

Dr. Louis P. Rogers, of Louisville, is dead.

The Brilliant Oil Works, in the Alleghany Valley, have been burned with forty thousand barrels of oil. The loss is estimated at \$50,000.

Dispatches from Maine, New Hampshire and other States, report considerable damage from frost. The frost was quite severe throughout New Jersey.

The Governor of Georgia has appointed a Board of three Directors for the Mason & Brunswick Railroad.

A dispatch from St. John's says that the steamer Virgo is a total wreck.

The Grand Jury of Louisiana, this morning presented four indictments against State Auditor Chas. Clinton; two for misdemeanors in office, one for extortion under color of office, and one for embezzling \$20,000 of State funds. Bail has been fixed at \$23,500. The Auditor was served with a capias and paroled by the Sheriff until 3 p.m.

THE GRASSHOPPERS.

OMAHA, June 13—Night.—Immense clouds of grasshoppers made their appearance, flying northward, over this place about 11 o'clock to-day but none alighted. They have appeared in immense swarms at Plymouth, N.J., and are destroying everything before them. They are flying northward.

ALEXANDRIA BAY, June 14—Noon.—The editorial excursionists are still here. They will go on a picnic excursion among the Thousand Islands to-day and attend a hop at the Thousand Islands House this evening.

SYRACUSE, June 14—Night.—On Saturday at Lafayette, in Onondaga county, a negro named Wm. Henry Mason outraged a young married white woman of the highest respectability, the wife of Newton O. Hoyt of that place. He threatened her life if she revealed his act, but she made the fact known to her husband, who caused Mason's arrest. Great popular excitement followed and the negro was near being lynched while being conveyed to the penitentiary, where he is now securely lodged.
