RUSSIA WITHDRAWS FROM THE ALLIANCE.

LONDON, June 15-Noon-A despatch from Peris to the London Standard says; It is asserted that Russia has withdrawn from the Alliance of the three Emperors, and con-sequently a new Alliance will be formed between Germany and Sweden.

### HEADQUARTERS.

### COTTON STATEMENT.

ALBANY, June 15—Noon—In the Court of Appeals this morning, Judges Allen and Rapallo read opinions for the reversal of judgment of the Supreme Court in the Tweed case, and orders of Oyer and Terminer and for the prisoners discharge. All concur. Judge Miller concurs in the result. Judge Grover was absent.

New York, June 15—Noon—The 102; Louisiana 101; Texas 108; Arkan-zas 102, and Tennessee 99.
