THE UNIVERSITY.

ITS ORGANIZATION—ELECTION OF PROFESSORS.

[SPECIAL TO THE JOURNAL.]

Raleigh, June 16th.

The Board of Trustees of the University of North Carolina convened here to-day. Two Professors were elected, John B. Kimberly was elected Professor of Agriculture and Applied Sciences, and Ralph Graves, Jr., Professor of Civil Engineering. [Professor Kimberly is a Northern gentleman, who taught school for many years in the Eastern portion of the State, and succeeded Rev. Dr. Wheaton in the Faculty of the University, resigning after the close of the war. He resides now in Buncombe county. Eds. JOURNAL.]

HEADQUARTERS.

THE CORRUPTION CASE—IMPORTANT DECISION.

Washington, June 16—Night—There are no new developments in Hind's trial for corrupting United States officials. The point is raised that the persons bribed were temporary clerks, and not United States officials.

In view of the water-works throughout the South, the following is important; Judge Wylie, in the Equity Court, in the first of the Georgetown mill cases, that of Ray vs. the Chesapeake & Ohio Canal Company, decided that the contract of Mr. Ray entitled him to as much water as had been coming to his mill before the Canal Company undertook to make a change; and he made perpetual the injunction restricting the Canal Company from diminishing the supply of water to Ray's mill, and from interfering with the gauge.

GOTHAM.

RECEPTION OF THE WASHINGTON LIGHT INFANTRY.

CIVIL RIGHTS—NEGROES AND THREATS.

New York, June 16—Noon—At the breakfast given to the Charleston Washington Light Infantry yesterday, a letter was read from Gov. Tilden, expressing regret at his inability to be present and welcoming them to the State of New York. This was followed by brief addresses from Gen. Woodward, of the Governor's staff, and from Col. Marshall Lefferts, of the Veteran Corps of the Seventh Regiment.

New York, June 16—Night—Some three weeks ago W. W. Tillotson, treasurer of Booth's theatre was charged before Commissioner Davenport with having violated the Civil Rights bill, in refusing to sell a ticket to Davis, a colored man, and was warranted in a seat in the theatre elsewhere than in a portion of the upper part of the house set apart for colored persons. At the time of Tillotson's arrest his counsel claimed that he had not violated the law, inasmuch as his prohibition of discrimination as to color did not apply to theatres which were managed simply as private business speculations, subject to such regulations as to admission as their proprietors might deem proper to impose. Tillotson waived an examination and gave bail to await the action of the United States Grand Jury. During the sessions of the Grand Jury, Davis has been before it several times, but failed to impress the jurors that he had a case that they were warranted in entertaining and they therefore presented no bill against Tillotson. In view of the interest taken in this case, this action of the Grand Jury is important.

EUROPE.

DUBLIN, June 16—Noon—The American Rifle Team have arrived and were received with great enthusiasm.

Rome, June 16—Noon—The debate on the Public Safety bill continues.

LONDON, June 16—Noon—Alexander Collier & Co., commission merchants, have failed; also Shand & Co., East India merchants, of No. 23, Road Lane.

Berlin, June 16—Noon—The session of the Prussian Diet has formally closed.

Bismarck before leaving for the country received the foreign representatives and gave each one assurances of the peaceful disposition of Germany. Whatever result the present trial of Von Arnim may have it is sure to be ultimately referred to the Supreme Tribunal by appeal, either of defence or prosecution.

LONDON, June 16—Noon—It is reported that the liabilities of Alex. Collier & Co. are \$15,000,000.

VIENNA, June 16—Noon—The Provincial Council has acquitted Wiesinger of the charge of attempting to defraud his father, General Becked. In the course of the trial Wiesinger declared that he was an adherent of Prince Bismarck, and an enemy of the Ultramontanes. His sole intention was to allure the Jesuit to acquire in an offer to assassinate Bismarck, and thereby give the latter reason for more energetic proceedings against the Catholics. He hoped that Bismarck or Schwinitz, the German Ambassador, would reward him for his zeal.

THE GRASSHOPPERS.

LEAVENWORTH, June 16—The grasshoppers have disappeared from this region. The air for the past four days has been black with them going North. The farmers are preparing to replant.

THE PRESBYTERIANS.

MONTECAL, June 16—Night—The Union of the Presbyterian Church and the Church of Scotland has been consummated. The United Church is to be designated the Presbyterian Church of Canada.

INDIANA.

BANK ROBBERY.

INDIANAPOLIS, June 16—Night—During a heavy rain storm yesterday, two men and a woman drove to the Central Bank. The woman engaged one of the clerks in conversation at the carriage, and the two men entered the bank and began talking with the Cashier, who was presently set at work figuring out the interest on a large sum which they desired to loan. While the Cashier was thus engaged the men slipped into their pockets packages to the amount of from \$5,000 to \$7,000, and got off with it. No arrests yet.

THE RAILROAD WAR.

THE RAILROAD WAR COMPROMISED.

SPECULATIONS.

BALTIMORE, June 16—Night—A special meeting of the Board of Directors of the Baltimore & Ohio Road to consider the basis of settlement agreed upon by President Scott and Vice-President King, at the Fifth Avenue Hotel on Friday, June 11th, was held to-day and adjourned shortly after 12 o'clock, the session lasting about an hour. The proceedings were strictly private, and will not be given to the press, it is stated by officials, until after 3 o'clock to-day, if then. This may be to prevent speculation in stock by outside parties. A number of reporters representing the papers in Washington, New York and other cities, are about the building eagerly waiting for the publicity of the proceedings.

Official—The Directors of the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad Company, at a special meeting to-day, ratified the basis of settlement as agreed on by President Scott and Vice-President King, making a single amendment which it is expected will meet the approval of the Board of Pennsylvania Directors.

PHILADELPHIA, June 16—Night—It is understood that the agreement is for a period of ten years, the Company to agree upon a moderate rate between all competing points, which will be maintained by both. The contract can only be terminated by a resolution of the respective Boards. A special committee to be appointed by each Board, to whom shall be referred all matters of difficulty, if any that may arise, relative to the practical working of the management and with power to adjust all complaints between the two Companies. The Pennsylvania Company opens its lines between Philadelphia and New York and the B. & O. R. R. on the same terms that they give other connecting roads at Philadelphia. This agreement, it is believed, will be of a permanent character. It is understood that the details of agreement will not be published.

The Story of Trion—successful Cotton Manufacturing in the South.

If any argument were necessary to prove that the manufacture of cotton goods can be made very profitable in the South, Trion Factory furnishes the premises and conclusion of such argument. This factory was located midway between Rome, Ga., and Chattanooga, Tenn., and about forty-four miles from each place. These were its only markets, and they only accessible to it by railroad. From one or the other it drew its supplies of raw material and provisions, and then hauled back the manufactured goods to market. And Trion enriched its owners—was one of the most profitable manufacturing investments in the country.

When the old factory burned down, several months ago, the proprietors hardly allowed the ruins to cool till they were among them clearing away to make place for a larger and more extensive structure. The new factory will be ready for operation in September, equipped throughout with new and much improved machinery, and on a more extensive scale than of old. This looks like business; shows that Messrs Marsh & Allgood not only know how to conduct the business, but are possessed of that public spirit and enterprise necessary to combat obstacles and wrench victory from defeat. To induce them to rebuild on the old ground, the well-to-do farmers of the neighborhood, and others having small savings, invested in the new enterprise, and thus were these gentlemen enabled to stand the loss of one factory and build another without borrowing a dollar, and without going out of their own neighborhood for additional capital. This shows that they deserve to succeed; that they possess the entire confidence of those who know them best.

Now, there are, scattered all over East Tennessee, water powers equal to and better than the one utilized at Trion; dozens of them within two miles of railroads. And for that matter the difference between steam and water, as motors, in cost, is only nominal. There is no reason why a cotton factory at Chattanooga should not be more profitable than one forty-four miles away, which depends largely on Chattanooga for its market.—Chattanooga Commercial.
