

HARD TIMES AND HOW TO MEND THEM-A HINT FOR fresh laurels will be added to the DROANS.

We read that a young man, recently a clerk in New Orleans, is now making a crop of cotton, largely by his own idividual exertions, in the parish of Concordia, La. He has a partner, also an ex-clerk presumably, and they expect to gather 35 bales this season. Writing to a friend in the Crescent City, this industrious youth says: "I wish I had a lot of corner loafers up here for a week or so. I think I could employ them very profitably for about ten hours daily cutting out cotton." His dress at present, says the New Orleans Times, consists of a black felt bat, hickory shirt, jean pants, and yellow russets. Mounted on his bay mule, wending his way to the field, thus apparelled, he thinks his old friends would not be able to recognize him.

When we consider how many thousands of robust young men are this day idlers, says the Augusta Constitutionalist, and when there is so much land to be had for a mere song or the asking, the mind turns with admiration to the intrepid Louisians youth and with something like disgust to the drones in the hive. It may be that, at the first glance, the friends of the ex-clerk might not recognize him in his working apparel; but when the identification came, how must the noble-minded among men and women admire the coarse garments of the true laborer more than the purple and fine linen of the idler. Last year, we gave some signal examples of what white boys, some of them at school during five days of the week, could do for themeelves in the way of planting. We should be plessed to hear, this season, of other experiments of that character, for the purpose of giving public honor to the deserving, and, if possible, to shame those who are making no effort to help themselves or anybody else. The idler, unless he has money of his own or is encouraged in sloth by his indulgent parents, must prey upon society, and thus become a deadly and mortal nuferior to those who live laborious lives. In the city and country, the charges are that men do nothing cred.
