THE GOVERNMENT AND THE TELEGRAPH.

ECHOES FROM BUNKER HILL.

WASHINGTON, June 21—Noon.—A naval force with steam launches will be ordered to proceed to the mouth of the Rio Grande to look after our interests there, and cooperate with the army in the suppression of Mexican bandits.

Soon after the arrival here of the Postmaster General will write the presidents of the principal telegraph companies to consult with him concerning the reduction of rates charged the Government, a modification of the present arrangement being desirable.

WASHINGTON, June 21—Night.—The Knights Templar at the banquet given by the De Molay Commandery on Saturday evening, the table was laid with the most expensive viands of the season. Eminent Commander Jno. M. Clark sat at the head of the table at which were seated 300 guests, and the presiding officer made a speech of hearty welcome. Gov. Walker also spoke, asking all present a hearty welcome in case they came to Richmond.

Alderman Clark extended a welcome to the city, and Commander Tamm on responding for the Richmond Commandery, gave an account of the courtesies received on the trip from Baltimore to Boston, and extended a hearty invitation to De Molay Commandery to visit Richmond very soon. This was seconded by all his Commandery with lusty cheers. Yesterday both Encampments went to Music Hall, where a sermon was preached by Rev. W. H. Murray, before an audience completely filling the hall, although a ticket was required for admission. A special ode was sung by the Masonic choir.

The Navy Department has advised that the United States steamer Barnaco ran upon a sunken rock in Beaufort, near Johnson Street, on Sunday morning about 9 o'clock. No one appears to have been lost. The news comes by telegraph from Victoria, where Lieut. Commander Sanden had arrived in one of the ship's boats for the purpose of chartering a steamer to go to the assistance of the shipwrecked marines.

ECHOES FROM BUNKER HILL.

MORE HOSPITALITY—MASSACHUSETTS AND VIRGINIA.

New York, June 21—Noon.—The Boston Dispatch of yesterday says: Only one of the visiting organizations from the South remains in Boston, and that is the Richmond Commandery of Knights Templars. They leave to-day (Monday). Their reception here has been the grandest of all the great demonstrations of welcome made during the past week. The appropriation for the entertainment of these seventy men was \$20,000, and a great deal more has been expended for the same object by private citizens. The collection given them by St. Andrew's Lodge, which has only thirty-eight members, cost \$3,000. They were treated to a carriage drive about the suburbs, resting from time to time at the elegant residences to which they were invited. They were also splendidly entertained in Newton. The guests are overpowered by all these and other evidences of hospitality, and they say that they will go home with revived affection for their sister Commonwealth and new interest in our common country.

EUROPE.

THE SHOOTING TOURNAMENT.

LONDON, June 21—Noon.—A contest took place Saturday at Edinburgh between the riflemen of England, Ireland and Scotland for the international challenge trophy. Scotland won by twenty points ahead of England, and 139 ahead of Ireland.

PARIS, June 21—Noon.—There is reason to believe that the government has decided that a general election shall be held this year, and there is no doubt that the Assembly will vote for a final dissolution, as the government assents to it.

LONDON, June 22—Night.—There is an uneasy feeling in the stock market in consequence of rumors of further failures.

The Carlist Commissioners of this city announce that they are in receipt of the intelligence that the Carlists have entered Basle in strong force and that they have been well received everywhere.

They were met by a battalion of marines with the marine band, the City Guard, fire department and a vast concourse of enthusiastic citizens. Speeches were made by Gen. Fitzhugh Lee, Col. Walter H. Taylor and others, testifying to the cordial and spontaneous ovation they received at the hands of the Boston people.

CABINET MOVEMENT.

SERIOUS DIFFICULTY LIKELY TO OCCUR OUT OF THE MEXICAN TROUBLES.

WASHINGTON, June 21—Night.—Robeson has gone to Annapolis to distribute diplomas.

Bristow has gone to New York. Surgeon James Simmons has been relieved from and Assistant Surgeon E. G. McClellan assigned to duty in the Department of the South.

It is reported that the steamer Saranack foundered off California.

Gentlemen in official position are apprehensive that unless prompt measures be taken with regard to the continued raid on the Texas border, the United States and Mexico may become involved in serious difficulties.

There is no doubt the Mexican government as it has repeatedly informed our own in reply to frequent protests, is anxious for the removal of all causes that could possibly produce a conflict of arms between the two countries, but the border being far from the capitol, it cannot exercise its desired control over the Northern States of that Republic.

Two years ago the Mexican government protested against the invasion of its soil by General McKenzie in pursuit of Mexican raiders, but our government could make no amends and did not censure that officer, considering that the pursuit was justified by the circumstances. The army will now act promptly in protecting American citizens assisted by such naval appliances, as necessity may demand. The steamer Plymouth, Capt. Russell, has been ordered to the mouth of the Rio Grande, whence the crew will proceed in armed launches to the points where their services will be required. The command on the border is entrusted to General Ord in whom the government has entire confidence, both as to discretion and efficiency.

SOUTH CAROLINA.

ARRIVAL OF POLITICAL REFUGEES.

CHARLESTON, June 21—Noon.—The Uruguayan bark Perig has arrived here. She brought sixteen refugees from the Uruguayan Republic, among whom are the four sons of General Flores, who was assassinated in 1868. On the 24th of February last, these persons, who live in Montevideo, were notified by the Government to leave the State within forty-eight hours, they being suspected of being engaged in a conspiracy to overthrow the Government. On the 26th of February they were sent on board the bark Perig, which was chartered by the Government for the occasion, and sent to Havana in charge of Col. Pedro, Riva Secuehelli and Col. Ceutrin. The bark reached Havana on the 30th of May, but the Spanish authorities refused to allow the refugees to land. The Perig accordingly sailed for this port. The refugees consist of journalists, deputies, one Senator, and several army officers. They will remain here two days, and then go to New York by rail, where they will remain for a month. They announce their intention of returning to Montevideo as soon as the political storm shall have blown over.

MARYLAND.

COMPROMISE OF THE R. R. WAR—ADVANCE IN RATES.

BALTIMORE, June 21—Noon.—It is learned on good authority that as the result of the conference on Saturday, in Philadelphia, between the Baltimore and Ohio and Pennsylvania Railroad, that ticket and freight agents rates on Western bound freights will be advanced to-day in Philadelphia and Baltimore and that rates will be further advanced in a few days. There will be no change in passenger rates for a day or two.

MARINE DISASTERS.

END OF THE STRIKE.

PHILADELPHIA, June 21—Noon.—The brig Ellen P. Stewart lost overboard May 20th, second mate Joseph Joyce, of New York, aged 27, also, no date, saw a steamer ashore inside the water quarter shoals. The bark National Eagle reports having seen a large quantity of wreck stuff on the banks, spars, petroleum bbls, timber, &c.

The stock of Herman & Exner, liquor dealers at Louisville has been seized, and the members of the firm were arrested.

Ex-Marshall Hinde, of Alabama, has been acquitted in the first indictment. Three more are pending.

The Eastern bound train on the Atlantic and Great Western which left Cincinnati Sunday night, was thrown from the track near Hamilton. The fireman was killed, and the engineer, Jas. Grey, was badly bruised.
