THE EARTHQUAKE.

FURTHER PARTICULARS OF THE TERRIBLE EARTHQUAKE AT NEW GRENADA.

NEW YORK, June 24—Noon—The steamship Andes at this port from Maracaibo, brought further particulars concerning the recent terrible earthquake which destroyed the town of Cucuta in New Grenada. From a person who had reached Maracaibo from Cucuta shortly before the steamer sailed, it was learned that the loss of life and property was much greater than at first supposed. Cucuta and all the surrounding villages within a radius of 20 miles were completely destroyed by the severity of the shock. Many serious losses of life and property, also occasioned by rain and by bands of robbers who organized immediately after the shock had passed away, for the purpose of plundering houses prostrated. The Custom House and Coffee warehouses situated in Los Cochas, were first attacked by the band of these marauders, but they were driven off before any serious damage had been done by them, and forces have now been organized in most of the neighboring cities and towns and sent to the scene of disaster for the purpose of protecting lives and property of those who had escaped the effects of the shock.

THE INDIANS.

TROUBLE ANTICIPATED.

OMAHA, June 24—Noon—Prominent frontiersmen and army officers express the opinion that there will be great trouble with the Sioux, Cheyennes and Arapahoes this summer and fall. At least five large war parties have left the reservations during the last two weeks. The cavalry in this department are unable to keep them on the reservations. Through the limited numbers it will be impossible for the soldiers to guard the Black Hills and attend to the Indians.

WASHINGTON, June 24—Night—

The Indian Bureau does not credit the report that all the Sioux are on the war path. They believe that neither Spotted Tail or Red Cloud's men are engaged in any warlike demonstrations, and feel confident that if any Sioux are mixed up with the lawless movements that it is only a few roaming raiders, who are not under the control of their chiefs, and it would hardly be fair to hold the Sioux as a nation responsible for any raids or depredations committed by these lawless bands.

EUROPE.

ILLNESS OF LADY FRANKLIN.

ROYALTY TO VISIT US.

LONDON, June 24—Noon—Lady Franklin is hopelessly ill. She bade farewell yesterday to the commander of the Pandora, which went in search of relics of the Franklin expedition and on other voyages.

It is reported that the Marquis of Lorne and his wife, the Princess Louise, intend making a tour to the United States.

The revolutionists have closed their meetings in Liverpool. The expenses exceeded the contributions by 28,000.

PARIS, June 24—Noon—

The river Garonne continues to rise. Several persons were drowned by the inundation of the adjacent country.

BERLIN, June 24—Night—

The case of Count Von Armin, was decided by the Kammergericht to-day. He was convicted of abstracting, with intent, State papers of the character of public deeds entrusted to him, and sentenced to nine months' imprisonment, including one month that has already expired. The Court declares that there was no ground for the charge of embezzlement, or offences against public order.

LONDON, June 24—Night—

The Carlist Committee here announce that they have received information of victory by their forces over the Alfonsists, in Castile. Nine of the Alfonsist officers are said to have been captured.

TWEED'S BOND.

BEECHER.

THE JURY RETIRED.

NEW YORK, June 24—Night—Judge Donahue issued an order returnable on Monday for the reduction of Tweed's three million bond. The counsel claims that the bill is excessive and unconstitutional.

The Court decided not to open the Beecher case for more evidence.

Judge N. Wilson after instructing the jury upon the nature of evidence, concluded with a long resume of evidence and the jury retired.

An unknown man about forty years of age, with brown hair and having three fingers missing from his right hand, hired a boat at Batter, and accompanied by a woman who gave her name as Sophy Schelder, aged 24, rowed to the middle of the river on a small island, when not more than half way across, the man took a pistol from his pocket and fired three times at her, the balls entering the leg, abdomen and arm, he then shot himself in the breast and died immediately.

Rear Admiral John Decamp died at Philadelphia, yesterday, at the age of 64.

ELECTRICISMS.

The College at St. Theresa village, Quebec, together with about fifteen houses, were destroyed by fire this P. M. Loss not ascertained.

HEADQUARTERS.

BONDS CALLED IN—CHICAGO PUBLIC BUILDINGS—DEPARTMENT MATTERS.

WASHINGTON, June 24—Night—The Secretary of the Treasury has called in \$5,000,000 of bonds of the fourth series, dated May 1st, 1862, upon which the interests ceases on the 24th of September.

The Postmaster General returns to-morrow.

Work on the public buildings at Chicago has been stopped on account of the unfavorable report of the committee regarding the foundation and material.

The Attorney General and the Secretary of the Treasury have returned.

The mails from the Navy Department from the South Atlantic Station have not arrived, though they are hourly expected; therefore the Department has no official advice of the existence of yellow fever on board the United States vessels in those waters.

A private letter received here to-day by an officer of the navy, from a brother officer at Rio, dated May 23d, reports that the yellow fever was raging at that place, and that the number of deaths daily, was from 15 to 20. During the first half of March 1872 deaths were reported.

On the United States steamer Lancaster there were several cases. Fleet Surgeon Denby and Assistant Surgeon Fassig died, the former on the 3d of April at Bahia, Brazil, but the date of the death of the latter is not mentioned. There had been much sickness on board of that vessel.

On the Brooklyn several cases of fever were reported, and two sailors died in April. She arrived at Rio on the 20th of May, and was then reported by the Surgeon in good sanitary condition.

There were a few cases on the Monongahela, but no deaths mentioned. Then she left Rio. Several officers and women remained in the hospital on shore, but all had recovered except Assistant Surgeon Waugh. It is expected he would soon start for home.

In pursuance of Section 16 of "An Act to Repeal the Act of the 21st of February 1874, and Section II of an act known as the 'Gauchery Act,' ratified the 2nd day of March, 1875, the Board of County Commissioners of New Hanover county met to-day at the Court House, in the city of Wilmington, for the purpose named in said acts, and have taken a recess until

Monday, 25th day of June, 1875.

at which time the Commissioners will proceed to revise the tax list and valuation reported to them, and complete the lists by computing the tax payable by each person and affixing the same opposite his name. The session of the Board will continue for the space of

THREE WORKING DAYS.

The Board will hear all persons objecting to the valuation of their property or to the amount of tax charged against them. The Board has a right to raise valuations of property that may be unreasonably low, and for that purpose are empowered to summon and examine witnesses.

After the lists are made up and placed in the hands of the Sheriff, it will be almost impossible to make corrections. All faults must be considered the fault of the tax payers themselves, and notice is hereby given that no alterations will be made after the time expires, except in accordance with the strict letter of the law.

Quarantine Notice.

UNTIL FURTHER NOTICE ALL VESSELS from Ports South of Cape Fear will come to the Quaiting Station, near Deep Water Point, and await the inspection of the Quarantine Physician.

All vessels from Ports where Yellow Fever, or other infectious disease exists, will be required to undergo a rigid and prolonged Quarantine.

All vessels or boats of any character having sickness on board on arrival, or having had sickness any time during the voyage, are required to come to the Station for inspection without regard to the Port from whence they come. Vessels not included as above will proceed without detention.

Persons are especially enjoined to make careful enquiry relative to vessels, crew, &c., and if not satisfied with the statements of the Captain or commander, or if the vessel is in a filthy condition, they will bring the vessel to the Station for further examination.

Pilots are especially enjoined to make careful enquiry relative to vessels, crew, &c., and if not satisfied with the statements of the Captain or commander, or if the vessel is in a filthy condition, they will bring the vessel to the Station for further examination.

All vessels subject to quarantine under the laws are subject to forfeiture of their branch; Masters of vessels to a fine of two hundred dollars a day for every day they violate the Quarantine Law; and all other persons are liable for each and every offence.

All vessels subject to quarantine under above regulations, will set a flag in the main-rigging, port-side.
