CHARLOTTE, June 26.

EUROPE.

PARIS, June 26—Night—Eighty persons were drowned in Verdun. Eight hundred houses have fallen in Toulouse. It is said that the loss of life will aggregate one thousand.

MADRID, June 26—Night—It is officially announced that Fortress Miravet, on the river Ebro, was stormed by the Alfanos after a siege of several days. Gen. Campos, thirty-nine officers, five hundred and fifty men, four cannon and a quantity of war material were captured.

GOTHAM.

BEECHER AND TILTON.

New York, June 26—Night—Neilson adjourned the Court to await the call of the Jury.

An afternoon paper says that complaint was made by a citizen to Judge Neilson last night concerning the outside communication of parties with the Tilton-Beecher Jury. The story is that certain advocates of the plaintiff have been seen to enter the Jury room personating waiters and carrying the food and liquors for the jurymen. The officers in charge of the door to the jury room indignantly deny this report as a base fabrication. The Judge has however directed the Sergeant to keep a more vigilant watch upon the Jurors. Another paper says that Mrs. Beecher dropped to the floor of her residence this morning with an attack of heart disease before she went to Court.

ELECTRICISMS.

Mortimer Thompson, better known as "Philander Dosticks," died in New York yesterday; aged 45 years.

The scaffolding at shaft No. 2, of the Susquehanna Coal Company, at East Nanticoke, fell this morning, instantly killing six men.

A miner was killed yesterday morning at Plymouth, Penn., by the falling of shaft No. 1, of the D. & H. Coal Company.

At a recent Plymouth Church Prayer Meeting, Beecher announced that he would continue to be Pastor of Plymouth Church, whatever the verdict might be.

Dr. Baud, of St. Catharine, near Memphis, was shot while sitting in his office, last Wednesday. The assassin is unknown.

Wm. M. Evans, of Pittsburg, has sued the Allegheny Mail, for saying he was living in luxury on money stolen from the Indians and the Government. He places damages at \$2,500.

It is stated that a flaw has been discovered in the direct U. S. cable about 300 miles from the American shore, and the Faraday has cut the cable and is now taking out the faulty portion.

NORTHERN KU-KLUX.

INDIANAPOLIS, June 26—Night—Wm. K. Cooper, colored, who was arrested in Rush county for attempting to commit a rape on a white lady, was removed from Rashville to Greenfield for fear of violence, was lynched last night by a mob at Greenfield.

CALAFORNIA.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 26—Noon—The Captain of the steamship Vasse DeGama, from Lower California, reports that a revolution at La Paz is in a full tide of success. Four hundred Federal troops were sent to quell the movement. The situation is very critical. The United States ship Narragansett is lying off La Paz. There is a serious revolution in Sonora. Gen. Davila, commanding the frontier, is said to be captured.

THE SARANAC.

RESCUE OF THE OFFICERS AND CREW.

NEW YORK, June 26—Night—A letter from Victoria B. C., says after landing from the Saranac, the officers and crew were put on short rations, and huts were built of boughs of trees, hammocks, and a few boats' sails saved from the wreck. At daylight on the fifth day after landing, her Majesty's steamer Myrmidon came in sight, and cheer after cheer went up from the worn out sufferers. Ten minutes later the Otter rounded the point, causing fresh excitement. Upon the appearance of the Myrmidon the assembly was sounded and orders issued to break up camp and transfer everything to that vessel. An hour later everything saved from the wreck, together with the officers and crew, were embarked on board the Myrmidon, and a portion of the officers and men were transferred to the other. The vessels left for Esquimaux and arrived there safely on the 23rd.

NEW HANOVER COUNTY.

WILMINGTON, N. C., June 26th, 1875.

In pursuance of Section 16 of "An Act to Raise Revenue," ratified February 14th, 1874, and Section 17 of an act known as the "Act to amend the Charter of the City of March, 1875," the Board of County Commissioners of New Hanover County met to-day at the Court House, in the city of Wilmington, for the purpose named in said act, and have taken a recess until

Monday, 29th day of June, 1875.

At which time the Commissioners will proceed to revise the tax lists and valuation reported to them, and complete the lists by computing the tax payable by each person and allying the same against his name, with the sanction of the Board will continue for the space of

THREE WORKING DAYS.

The Board will hear all persons objecting to the valuation of their property or to the amount of tax charged against them. The Board has a right in raise valuations of property that may be unreasonably low, and for that purpose are empowered to sur-nom and examine witnesses.

After the tax lists are made up and placed in the hands of the Sheriff, it will be almost impossible to make corrections. All faults must be corrected the first day of the session themselves, and notice is hereby given that no alterations will be made after the time aforesaid, except in accordance with the section of the law.

AN ORDINANCE

Concerning Cows and other cattle running at large.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Wilmington, N. C., as follows:

Section 1. That any cow or other cattle of any kind, found running at large within the corporate limits of this city, shall be impounded by the City Marshal, and the owner required to pay a fine of Ten (10) Dollars, before the same shall be released.

Section 2. Any ordinance or parts thereof conflicting herewith, are hereby repealed.

The above ordinance was adopted by the Board of Aldermen on the 24th day of June 1875, and will go into effect on after and Monday, June 29th instant.
