DOINGS IN THE FRENCH ASSEMBLY.

THE CANADA COPYRIGHT BILL.

A SERIOUS REVERSE FOR THE CARLISTS.

HEAVY FAILURES IN GREAT BRITAIN.

SOME MORE SHOOTING IN IRELAND.

PARIS, July 3—Noon—An important meeting of three groups of the Left was held last night; three hundred and thirty deputies were present. A resolution was unanimously passed agreeing to abstain from unnecessary discussion, so that all necessary bills may be passed by the middle of August. A provision was made for the committee to negotiate with the ministry. Duke D'André Pasquier and the leader of other parliamentary groups, with the object of fixing the day for the dissolution of the Assembly.

LONDON, July 3—Noon—The Lords have passed the Canada Copyright Bill.

The steamship Fernox for Quebec, takes off five hundred and sixty Menomonic emigrants.

The Times' special dispatch from Madrid says: Gen. Jovellari reports the defeat of the united band of Dorregary, Cueta and Villalán between the Vistavilla and Vico Frances.

The Vistavilla and Vico Frances Carlists suffered heavy losses and fled in disorder towards Yglesonta. The chief Vistavilla was killed. Gen. Camors reports a success in Catalonia. Gen. Loza has donated(?) to the Carlists who attacked Gadedelo and Bexbers.

The Madrid government is showing great vigor towards the Carlist sympathizers, several of whom have been banished.

Dispatches from Madrid confirm the report of Gen. Jovellari's victory over the united Carlist bands of Dorregary, Cueta and Villalán. Gen. Marton Campas, with the army of Catalonia effected a junction with Gen. Jovellari yesterday and the combined forces are now making preparations to attack Cantavieses.

LONDON, July 3—Night—There are heavy failures in several parts of the country caused by the suspension of Alexander Collier & Co.

DUBLIN, July 3—Night—The match for the fireman's cup to-day resulted in a tie between Maj. Fulton of the American team and Mr. Doyle of the Irish Association. The tie will be decided by shooting off at ordinary.

The shooting for all Ireland for a challenge shield took place at Dollymount to-day. The competitors were from members each of the Dublin, Belfast and New York Clubs. The ranges were 1,000 and 1,100 yards, in each of which every participant had twenty shots. The shield was won by the Dublin marksmen, the score standing Dublin 569; Amateur New York 658; Belfast 628.

GOTHAM.

BEECHER AND HIS W-OMEN.

ONE OF THE LEADER CONSPIRATORS ON TRIAL.

New York, July 3—Noon—Plymouth Lecture Room was crowded to excess to-day. Beecher's entrance provoked loud ovations. Shearman led in prayer, and hoped that Plymouth would join him in pledging their support to Beecher, and God helping, they would never leave him. No verdict uttered from the press or public would make them leave him and ten thousand juries could not make them doubt his word. Beecher then gave out a hymn, pronounced the benediction, and the audience dispersed. Mr. Beecher's address was confined wholly to church matters, including the mining history of Plymouth.

New York, July 3—Night—The Congar will case, so long pending before the Surrogate, has been decided by the rejection of the will upon the ground that the testator was of unsound mind when he executed the testament. She willed most of her property to religious organizations, including \$250,000 to foreign missions.

The Marine Bank recently lost a mail bag containing \$4,000 worth of drafts. The missing mail contained remittances from several Eastern cities and Baltimore.

Edward Connors, one of the witnesses for Leader, in the conspiracy trial, and who was arrested on the charge of bigamy, was brought up to-day on a writ of habeas corpus, when the bail was fixed at \$3,000, which the prisoner endeavored to find.

BANK STATEMENT.

Loans have decreased 21 millions; specie has increased 2 million; legal tenders have increased 24 million; deposits have increased 10 million; reserve has increased 4 million.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 3—Noon—The Democratic Convention adjourned this evening. The ticket is received throughout the State with a fair degree of satisfaction, but excites very little enthusiasm.

The Democratic Congressional Convention of the Fourth District to-day nominated P. D. Wiggeston for Congress.

New York, July 3—Night—A dispatch from New Orleans says that a private dispatch from Brownsville reports General Christo's ability and intention to protect the American citizens. The military forces at Brownsville have received orders to cross and support Christo in preserving the peace in case such a measure becomes necessary.

NORTH CAROLINA.

THE COTTON STATES CONGRESS.

A YOUNG LADY KILLED BY LIGHTNING.

RALPH, July 3—Night—The second annual session of the Cotton States Congress convenes in this city on the 13th inst. A large attendance is expected and every arrangement is being made for the entertainment of the guests.

A Miss Todd, near this place, was killed yesterday by lightning. Her neck was broken and shoulder dislocated.

ELECTRICISMS.

The German Commissioner to the Philadelphia Centennial Exhibition is preparing to get consent to affix the price to goods sent there.

Despatches from China say that several foreigners have been assaulted in Peking. The native soldiers who insulted the American Consul and his wife, and made hostile demonstrations against the British Consulate at Chin Kiang, have been punished and the affair is now settled.

Lee's box and lumber company, at New York, have been burned—loss \$100,000.

The Nashville committee on information and statistics give most favorable accounts of the crops.

The South Carolina Bank and Trust Company, at Columbia, has suspended. The bank had \$200,000 in the suspended bank.

Robert Dale Owen, the celebrated spiritualist, is insane.

Boat No. 5, of the wrecked steamer Vicksburg, was picked up in latitude 47, bottom up. She had two life preservers and a cask of water in her.
