VIRGINIA.

TERRIBLE ACCIDENT TO A PLEASURE PARTY.

NOFOLK, July 6—Non.—The steaming lumberman, which returned last night from Fortress Monroe, with a pleasure party of 18 on board, was run into off Sewell's Point by the steamer Isaac Bell and sunk immediately in 50 feet of water. Boats were lowered from the Bell and several of the survivors were picked up. The following is a list of the lost: Mrs. Elizabeth Hudgens, a widow lady and her colored servant, Geo. Wilson, Mrs. Jesse Frederici, Mrs. G. W. Baker, Capt. Edward Cook, James C. Borum, Harry Borum, of Norfolk, Miss M. Borum, of Matthews county and the engineer of the lumberman. Capt. Brown of the lumberman was struck on the head and severely injured by the wheel of the Bell but he had strength enough left to rescue his wife who had to crawl out through a window of the pilot house to avoid being carried down by the fast sinking boat. Mrs. Brown was severely injured internally and it is feared she will not survive. Boats have been sent down to drag for the bodies.

ELECTRICISMS.

One death, and a few new cases of fever, at Key West on the Fourth. Two passenger trains on the South Side Railroad, near Fort Rock, collided. Twelve persons were killed and twenty-six wounded.

There was a row at a negro celebration near Vicksburg, when several were wounded, and three whose names are unknown, fatally. John Hill, white, was mortally wounded.

Sammel Sweet, of Halifax, who failed for a quarter of a million, has gone into bankruptcy.

Passenger rates West, via Baltimore, are now within a fraction of the old rates.

Jard has turned over the Atlanta postoffice under written and verbal protests. It is not true that his bondman had given him up.

The Centennial of Washington's assuming command, was celebrated at Cambridge, on Monday, with great brilliancy.

The race horse Lexington is dead. At Boston, Worth Spates, a lawyer and member of the Maryland Fifth Regiment, delivered a lecture at Music Hall, on a Southerner's impressions of Boston. The hall was crowded. The lecture was much applauded and received a vote of thanks at the conclusion.

The number of emigrants arriving in New York last month, was 14,000 against 2,600 for June, 1874.

The trial of Ex-Treasurer Parker, charged with fraud against the State, was begun yesterday at Columbia.

SOUTH AMERICA.

LATER ADVICES IN REGARD TO THE EARTHQUAKE HORRORS.

New York, July 6—Non.—The latest mail advices from different places in Colombia were so gloomy as to confirm the horrors by the earthquake in May. A letter from Salaza dated May 28th, says: Oeneta is in a pitiful sight. Everything is in ruins; not a house has been left standing. Thieves and robbers from the surrounding country have swooped down on the ill-fated city and hardy a single safe has been saved from the Custom House. Four hundred mules were killed in the streets and as there is no one to remove them the stench is becoming frightful. The villages of San Cristobal, Parana, Grissimo, Capacha, San Antonio, Lobatera, San Juan de Urena, Rosario and San Cayetano are completely destroyed. The storehouse at Puerto de Loe Cebos was sacked and burned by bandits.

A letter from Oeneta, May 30, says: Ten thousand people were killed at Oeneta in addition to other thousands who were seriously wounded and bruised. Death and destruction reigned everywhere. Great numbers of the haciendas have been destroyed and hundreds of houses in the country overturned, leaving the people consigned to poverty. Many of the trees were torn up from the roots and small hills were opened like a melon. The cause of the great catastrophe is unknown and the precise place of the first manifestation. Some suppose that the volcano at Sabatera, which was in action in 1848, is again breaking out, while others say that a new volcano has appeared in the hills of Giracha.

A private letter from Buenaventura, of May 24 says in Piedecuesta the town hall is destroyed, and in Panepona the Cathedral is in ruins.

A telegram from Hon. Aquilo Parra to President Perez, dated Buenaventura, May 24, says the earthquakes continue. Last night the Cathedral in Panepona fell, causing great alarm. There is great devastation throughout the valley of Oeneta.

A dispatch to President Perez, from Chinacoa, May 24, says the population of San Jose, Rosario, and Cayetano have disappeared. The rest of the depot is in ruins. There are more than 4,000 victims.

A dispatch from Cocororo, dated May 24, says the situation is assuming a grave aspect, and sickness and starvation in Panepona are increasing.

A telegram from Chiquiquiro, of May 22, says the shocks are repeating. There were two last night and one today, and there is great alarm among the people. Appeals for help were being circulated through all the cities of Colombia, and the most liberal responses were being made.

EUROPE.

GAMBETTA REFUSES TO FIGHT.

MADRID, July 6—Night—General Loma has effected a junction with Quesada.

PARIS, July 6—Night—Gambetta has declined to accept the challenge of Granier de Cassagnac to fight a duel on account of articles published in the Republic Francaise. He says he cannot hold himself at the disposal of the first comer among his political adversaries, as he has other duties and responsibilities to fulfill towards his party, France and the Republic.

LONDON, July 6—Night—It is denied that Moody and Sankey intend opening meetings in Paris. There is no falling off in the number of attendees at their meetings here. Large numbers of persons continue to visit the "inquiry rooms."

Quarantine Notice.

UNTIL FURTHER NOTICE ALL VESSELS FROM PORTS SOUTH OF CAPE FEAR WILL COME TO THE QUARANTINE STATION, near Deep Water Point, and await the inspection of the Quarantine Physician.

All vessels from Ports where Yellow Fever, or other infectious disease exists, will be required to undergo a rigid and prolonged Quarantine.

All vessels or boats of any character having sickness on board on arrival, or having had sickness any time during the voyage, are required to come to the Station for inspection without regard to the Port from whence they come.

Photographers especially enjoined to make careful enquiry relative to the crew, &c., and if not satisfied with the statements of the Captain or commander, or if the vessel is in a filthy condition, they will bring the vessel to the Station for further examination.
