THE FLOODS.

EAST ST. LOUIS UNDER WATER.

ST. LOUIS, July 8.—Noon.—The floods in the Clinton river have overflowed the streets of East St. Louis. Miles of the track of the North Missouri road are under water. Great damage by the flood, which far surpasses that of 1874.

CINCINNATI, July 8.—Noon.—The heavy rains have washed nine bridges on the Portsmouth Branch of the Marietta and Cincinnati Road.

WISCONSIN.

THE RADICALS RENOMINATE LUDINGTON FOR GOVERNOR.

MADISON, July 8.—Noon.—The Republican State Convention nominated for Governor Harrison Ludington, Lieutenant-Governor Geo. H. T. Eaton. The platform a gradual return to specie payment, no tariff reform, tariff for revenue so adjusted as to be the least oppressive to the people, the State to control the railroads within her borders and applauds the efforts to punish revenue frauds.

TEXAS.

CORTINA UNDER ESCORT FOR BAGDAD.

GALVESTON, July 8.—Night.—A dispatch from Brownsville says that a force of fifty cavalry and twenty Custom House guards, under command of Col. Parrot, escorted Cortina and the prisoners to Bagdad. They shot and hung a man at Rio Portegui who had threatened to shoot an officer of the Ninth Cavalry near Matamoros. The gunboat Juarez, with the prisoners, sailed yesterday. She had on board arms and ammunition. Permission was granted to discharge her at Brazos and Santiago and bring them through Brownsville. The Mexican papers claim that the removal of Cortina will permit the authorities of Matamoros to execute the law.

MINNESOTA.

THE DEMOCRATS IN COUNCIL AT ST. PAUL.

A PLATFORM FOR THE PEOPLE.

ST. PAUL, July 8.—Noon.—Democratic State Convention Platform: Constitutional Amendments must be accepted in good faith by all parties; the National Government is limited to delegated powers; the great bulk of the rights of the people must find their safeguard in the States and people themselves; a return to gold and silver as a basis of the currency of the country, with preparative and effective measures to secure resumption; tariff for revenue only, with honest administration; non protection; no resumption laws. The nominations are, for Governor, D. L. Buell, Lieutenant Governor, Edward Durant.

DORREGARAY REPULSED AND IN FULL RETREAT.

WILHELM'S PROPOSED VISIT TO EMANUEL.

THE LATEST FROM BUDA.

PARIS, July 8.—Night.—The Assembly debated the public power. A Radical moved an amendment making future Assemblies permanent. The amendment was rejected. An amendment was adopted in effect that should the President die while the Chambers are dissolved, the Senate shall convene and a new election be immediately ordered. The bill then passed to its third reading by a vote of 546 to 97. MADRID, July 8.—Noon.—Dorregaray has been repulsed at Barbastron and turned his retreat toward the Sierra Guara. The Alfonsists are in hot pursuit. Jovellar officially announces the capture by his command of Conde Velez with artillery and a garrison of 2,000 men.

LONDON, July 8.—Night.—The visit of Emperor Wilhelm to Victor Emanuel will not be postponed later than September.

The Times has a letter from Buda, Pesth, confirming the destructive character of the recent storm, but reducing the loss of life. The destruction of property on the mountain slopes is fearful.

Sir Douglas Forsyth was not instructed by the British Government to demand the passage of troops through Burmah. The King says that Burmah will protest against the expedition, and to Western China troops must not be sent.

HEADQUARTERS.

THE SARANAC LOST OFF VAN COUVER'S ISLAND.

WASHINGTON, July 8.—Night.—The following is the official report of Capt. Queen: At 7.20 a. m. the Saranac entered the discovery passage with the tide favorable and proceeded on her way. At 8.40 while passing through Seymour Narrows she caught in a whirlpool, caused by strong counter-currents, became unmanageable, refused to obey the rudder and was carried bodily on a sunken rock, striking with great force on her port side about abreast of the foremast, careening the ship and starting the decks forward; hung for a moment, then slipping off headed for the shore of Vancouver's Island. The ship filled rapidly and about the time the head struck the shore the fires were out. Both anchors

were let go and the hawser fastened to a large tree. Boats were lost except the steam launch, which took no time to get from its cradle. The vessel went down at 10.5, stern foremost, in 50 or 60 fathoms of water. The steam launch floated from the cradles and saved the documents and money.

ELECTRICISMS.

The troops from Mazatlan have driven the revolutionists at La Paz to the mountains. Loader and Price have been indicted, but Price will escape as State's evidence. Mrs. Tilton before the Grand Jury gave testimony denying the accusation of Loader and Price. Hon. Geo. Opdyke has accepted the Presidency of the New York Board of Trade at the solicitation of a majority of the members. Formal election next week.
