#### OHIO.

A STRONG COMMENT ON HON-EST RADICAL OFFICIALS.

CINCINNATI, July 9-Noon—A meeting of the distillers, rectifiers and liquor dealers of Ohio, Indiana, Illinois and Kentucky convened here. They request prompt release of goods seized upon insufficient grounds, and that officers be held to a more strict accountability pledging themselves to assist the government in collecting the taxes and in the suppression of frauds.

CINCINNATI, July 9-Night-A des perate attempt was made to rob Express Messenger Burke at Longpoint, Ill., on the Vandalia Road. The engine was cut loose and the Engineer killed. Burke barricaded the doors and kept the robbers out till help ar-

The robbers boarded the engine, one from each side, and ordered Engineer Milo Ames to start the engine who, after a moment's hesitation did so, when one of the robbers saying, "Abe, we'll run the thing our-selves," shot the Engineer. Both fired, killing him instantly. The fireman hearing this ran to the rear of the train to slarm the train men. While this was going on one of the confederates de-tached the Express car and engine. The robbers ran the train two miles, when they demanded admission to the Express car, which Messenger Burke refused, saying that "he was ready for them and if they entered they were

dead men." The robbers commenced firing into the car. The Messenger thinks that there were a dozen of them. The train men came up and the robbers fied.
