Probabilities.—WASHINGTON, July 14.—For the South Atlantic and Gulf States, Tennessee and Ohio valley stationary to falling barometer, stationary to rising temperature, southwest to southeast winds and clear or partly cloudy weather will prevail, except, possibly, light rains in the two last sections and the Carolinas. Middle and eastern states stationary to falling barometer, southeast to southwest winds, warmer, clear or partly cloudy weather, the lower Ohio river and Mississippi, at and below Cairo, will continue slowly rising.

THE INDIAN FRAUDS—SUSPICION IN REGARD TO A CABINET OFFICER.

WASHINGTON, July 14.—Professor Marsh, in a letter to the President regarding Indian bonds, wherein he gives full details. He declares he has no confidence in the severity of the Secretary of the Interior or the commissioner on Indian affairs in the prosecution of the investigation into these frauds, and that the evidence in his possession reflected unfavorably on both.

ELECTRICISMS.

In the great International Collegiate Race at Saratoga, Cornell was first, Columbia second, Harvard third, Dartmouth fourth, Yale fifth. Others straggling, Cornell's time was 16 minutes 38 1/2 seconds. There was great enthusiasm, and the Cornell crew was carried back and forth before the Grand Stand.

The rear portion of the City Hotel at Lynchburg, fell yesterday with a great crash. Fortunately five or six of the rooms were not fully occupied. Mrs. L. Brown was killed, T. E. Harris, commission banker, body injured.

Tom Wells, formerly a commission merchant of Atlanta, suicided in that city on account of financial difficulties. Cardinal McCloskey sails for Rome on the 11th of August.

The Japanese Commissioners to the Centennial, have arrived in Philadelphia, and are preparing to put up Centennial buildings.

Agricultural Congress.

RALEIGH, July 14.—The Agricultural Congress is in full operation. Judge Jones, of Arkansas, addressed the Congress to-day upon the subject of establishing agricultural bureaus, in the several States. He read a telegram from the agent at New Orleans of Rockdale co-operation Company of England asking a committee of conference: Maxwell of Ga., Jones of Ark., Jones of Ga., Edwin Butler of Ga., compose the committee.

Col. Holt of North Carolina introduced resolution requesting delegates to Congress to urge the legislature of their respective States to follow procedure so wisely established by Georgia, in establishing State departments of agriculture. Dr. Jones of Georgia, spoke, advocating the resolution and explaining the great good that had been accomplished in that State by this department. He claims that two million dollars would be saved to farmers of Georgia this year by its workings. The resolution was adopted.

The affairs of a direct trade union were discussed. It was stated that when its workings had not been altogether satisfactory it had been established, the fact that it could be productive of great good to the Southern States.

An essay was read from Dr. E. M. Penikese of Georgia, pertaining to agricultural colleges and department of agriculture. Col. Johnson of North Carolina reported from a special committee, advocating the reestablishment of a State banking system as peculiarly advantageous to the whole country and asking Congress to relieve the tax upon State banks as a matter of justice and right.

Constitution and by-laws were adopted, making the election of officers biennial. Col. D. E. Butler, of Ga.; re-elected President; Col. J. D. Whitford, of North Carolina, Secretary; R. M. Sims of South Carolina Treasurer; Nashville was selected as the next place of meeting.

A resolution was adopted, urging the importance and the absolute propriety of producing an abundance of all articles of prime necessity. The committee of proper bases to unite the commercial interests of Southern and Western States, said these States should be more closely united together as strongest ties of commercial interest existed, by reason of their diversity of climate and soil, each producing the prime articles of domestic necessities required by the other.

A resolution was adopted, requesting Congress to afford such aid as will insure the construction of three great trunk lines of railway from Chicago to Memphis Tenn., from St. Louis through Cumberland Gap to Knoxville, and from Memphis to or near Atlanta Georgia.

The question of co-operation with the Rockdale society of England was referred to the National Grange.
