THE ALLEN PENDLETON PLAT-FORM ON THE CURRENCY QUESTION.

### MARYLAND.

STATE DEMOCRATIC CONVEN-TION.

BALTIMORE, July 22.—The committee adjourned at 4 o'clock this morning to 10:30. The majority report of the committee on credentials was adopted by a vote of 159 to 48.

LATER. -The committee continued in session all night, until 4:30 this morning, when it adjourned to 10:30 A. M. without having reached a vote on any

nomination. About one o'clock a, m., Thomas J. Keating, of Queen Annes county, was installed as permanent chairman of the Convention. Filibustering continued. Motions to adjourn were constantly made, but voted down. No rule baying been adopted by the Convention, discussions on dilatory and other matters took wid range, and as the hours moved on, the debate waxed hotter and hotter. Mr. Kramer, of Washington county, a leader of the Hamiltoo party, openly charged that bribes of one thousand dollars in one case, and five hundred dollars in another, and an office in another had been offered two delegates to vote for Carroll, which was reportel by Mr. Ferlong, Carroll deleegate, saying a Baltimore city delegate had been offered a bribe in money to vote for Hamilton, which was opened by the delegate. No one supposed this bribe was offered with the knowledge of Mr. Hamilton, nor was any candidate or his advocates responsible for what was done by outsiders. At times the greatest confusion prevailed, and discussion became so excited that Hon. John Richie, recogized leader of Hamilton's friends, threatened withdraw from the Convention if the majority insisted. At 4:30 o'clock a. m., Hon. Stephenson Archer announced that if the Hamilton men would agree to adopt the rules of the last House of Delegates of Maryland as far as applicable to the Convention, the Carroll menwould agred an adjournmen

#### HEADQUARTERS.

THE REPORT OF THE DEPART. MENT OF AGRICULTURE ON THE TOBACCO CROP.

Washington, July 22 .- The July returns to the Department of Agricul-ture, show that the acresge of tobacco is greater than that of last year, the increase being in the great tobacco producing States. Maryland has increased her acreage 4 per cent.; Vir-ginia 30; North Carolina 33; Sonth Carolina 7; Florida 23; Mississippi 16; Arkansas 10; Tenuessee 203; Kentucky 223; Ohio 25; Indiana 49; Illinois 56; Missouri 60; New York, Pennsylvania and Texas report the same acreage as last year, New Hampshire has reduced her small acreage 30 per cent.

SHOOTING OF A REVENUE OF FICER.
