OHIO.
CINCINNATI, July 23.—A. J. Cochran and Thomas E. Edmonds were committed at Greensburg, Ill., for murdering engineer Ames in the late attempted express robbery.

IOWA.
EXPLOSION OF A PAPER MILL.
IOWA CITY, July 23. The bookbinding tanks of Close & Sons paper mill exploded, killing five men, and blew two houses over across the street. Loss, quarter of a million.

PHILADELPHIA, July 23.—The Abbottsford was fully insured in the English and French Companies. The freight was insured in this country. The City of Limerick takes Abbottsford place in the American line, and leaves Liverpool next Wednesday.

FIRE FIEND.
FIRE AT NEWARK, OHIO.
NEWARK, July 23.—A building which was erected for the purpose of testing a fine extinguisher while being a treated with oil, exploded from pressure, taking fire and terribly burning Mayor D. C. Winegardner, Hon. J. B. Jones and Chas. Hamilton, Street Commissioners and A. Bridge contractor, and fifteen or twenty others. Some thought fatally.

CHICAGO.
FAILURES AMONG THE WHEAT MERCHANTS.
CHICAGO, July 23.—The rapid rise in wheat for the past few days resulted in much excitement among commission dealers, and a few cases of minor importation have been reported to-day. Baldwin & Stone, who do an extensive commission business, both here and in Milwaukee, have suspended. The members of the firm state that the suspension is only temporary, and due entirely to the failure of country dealers to meet their liabilities.

GOVERNMENT CONTRACTS—THE INDIANS.
WASHINGTON, July 23.—Postmaster General has advertised routes 300,93 between New Orleans and Vicksburg, 300,94 between St. Francisville and Vicksburg, bids close September 2 and to be opened September 4. Contracts run from October 1st 1875, to June 30, '78.

Information has been received at the Indian bureau from Fort Marion that Lean Bear, one of the Chippewa prisoners confined at that post has become insane and an application has been made to have him sent to the Government Insane Asylum near this city. This is the same Indian who attempted suicide on the route to Florida. Under the recent order to send the families of those prisoners to them, directions have been given that one wife to each prisoner, and the children under twelve years of age be forwarded.

NEW ORLEANS, July 23.—Auditor Clinton has resigned, to take effect Dec. 10th, 1875. Kellog, in accepting his resignation, declares that he never for a moment believed Clinton to be dishonest.

VIRGINIA.
THE NATIONAL COITON EXCHANGE—ELECTION OF OFFICERS &c.
WHITE SULPHUR SPRINGS, July 23.—A full attendance. Quite an audience, including ladies. Minutes read and approved. Regular business nominations for President, Vice President and seven Directors were called for: John Phelps was elected President without a dissenting voice. Applause. Nomination for Vice President: Stephen Harrison, of New York; A. E. Herring, Augusta, Georgia; Chas. A. Wesson, New York and Wm. Harrison, was elected on first ballot. After some balloting the following were elected Directors: E. C. Stone, Galveston; W. L. Ironhill, Charleston; Henry Hall, Mobile; J. W. Lathrop, Savannah; W. A. Goodman, Memphis; J. F. Wheeler, Nashville; W. C. Reynolds, Norfolk; addresses of thanks were made by each successful candidate present. A resolution of the President, to appoint a committee of three on the bills of lading was adopted. The President named Wheeler, Nashville; Whitehorn, New York and Pinckney, Charleston.

Mr. Eaton, of New Orleans, announced that the Convention has recommended to Congress an early completion of the Texas and Pacific Railroad, and of an acceptance and proposition made by Col. T. A. Scott was adopted without dissent.

Mr. Pinckney, of Charleston, moved that two grades be established in addition to those appointed at the last Convention, to be known as middling fair, and that the committee on classification in New York warranted to put up the same and forward to other exchanges.
