TEXAS.

GALVESTON, July 26.—Millard Richardson, founder and editor-in-chief of the Galveston News, died this morning.

OHIO.  
CINCINNATI, July 26.—Owing to the failure of the fruit crop in this section, the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad have put on fast fruit cars.

ILLINOIS.  
CHICAGO, July 26.—Judge Blodgett has passed a decision protecting foreign holders of Rail Road bonds, as against a lessee.

WEST VIRGINIA.  
WHEELING, July 26.—Lovejoy McConney & Co., Glass manufacturers, failed. Liabilities \$150,000. They had in their employ 300 hands.

TENNESSEE.  
MEMPHIS, July 26.—The River stationery, fears of serious damage are abated. Twenty acres saved at Dr. Peter's plantation twenty miles below. Dr. Peter was compelled to move his residence and gin house. The crosses in old Teton has caused some damage.

GEORGIA.  
ATLANTA, Ga., July 26.—A man named Johnson, with his family wife and five children, in a wagon, drove into Coconawatch river in Gordon county, and got into deep water. The wagon bed floated off, and the children were drowned. The man and his wife escaped. The bodies of the five children were recovered.

SOUTH CAROLINA.  
CHARLESTON, July 27.—A mysterious suicide occurred during the trip to this port of the steamer South Carolina, which left New York on Wednesday. An unknown passenger who had registered under the name of J. Inognito, when off Hatteras on Friday, shot himself three times with a revolver while lying in his berth, and died almost instantly. He had carefully destroyed everything in his baggage by which his body could be identified. He left a letter to the Captain indicating that he took passage with the intention of suiciding.

MISSOURI.  
ANOTHER RAILROAD WAR.  
ST. LOUIS, July 26.—The cutting of passengers fare by the St. Louis and Southeastern Railroad between here and Nashville, Tenn., a few weeks ago in opposition to the Iron Mountain road and its Southern connections has been extended, and the former road announces that it will hereafter carry passengers from Nashville to Louisville for one third fare, and freight at correspondingly low rates. The route will be by the St. Louis and Southeastern to Northville, thence by Louisville and Paducah road to Louisville. Opposition was brought about by the Louisville and Nashville road, refusing St. Louis and Southeastern tickets at Montgomery Ala., and other points South.

SPAIN.  
MADRID, July 26.—The losses of the Carlists within the past three weeks of killed, wounded and missing are four thousand.

PARIS July 26.—Vicomp De Beaumont Yasey is dead.  
LONDON July 26.—The manager of direct U. S. Cable, in a communication to the Times referring to its remarks in its financial article of Thursday last says: "The stockholders here has been denied information." He also says, "a small portion of the Cable has been injured probably by ice. Constructors are now engaged in cutting out and repairing the injured parts." Thirty cotton mills closed at Oldham to-day, operatives having refused to accept the masters terms in regard to wages.

EUROPE.  
LONDON, July 26.—The working men's association, of Yorkshire, Lancashire, and Cheshire, resolved to support locked out and striking mill operatives. Standard reports that Mr. Sandeman, will retire from the British post office, and go to Turkey, to organize postal service there, in accordance with the Berne Convention.  
LONDON, July 26.—A special dispatch from Berlin, to Standard, says: Count Dzembeck, his mother and a chambermaid, have been arrested at Landrick District, of Breslau, charged with being concerned in a conspiracy to assassinate Prince Frederick William.

LONDON, July 26.—A Daily News special from Lisbon reports that drought in several districts of Province of Minho, has destroyed crops and pastures. A famine is threatened, and riots against grain exporters, are imminent. Civil authorities are trying to collect taxes in many places. An attempt to do so, they fear would cause insurrection. Accounts from Algarveshew, show similar state affairs in that province. Government is sending relief to afflicted sections. The Times understands that Mr. Pimmsoll has procured revival of his shipping bill, which he previously abandoned in favor of Ganis measure. That it will now be placed on the order book Thursday, Pimmsoll, will then apologize to the House, and consent to the passage of the bill as a provisional measure for one year only.

LONDON, July 26.—The Earl of Shaftesbury has written to Mr. Pimmsoll a sympathizing letter. He advised him to appear in the House of Commons, and to adhere to his views, but to express regret that excitement had led him to violate the rules of debate. The majority of prominent daily and weekly journals express similar views. The Onward line of steamships, Abesinia, and Williams, and Guion line steamship, Wyoming, both from New York, collided yesterday at Newbridgeport, near Liverpool, and both were considerably damaged in hulls, and have been docked.  
The Ragns or Herzegovina insurgents were attacked by the Turkish troops near Nevesina Sirova, and many were killed and wounded, and both sides, dispatching and reporting hotter times, and will give result on next Saturday. The Turks made a sortie from Stalaja, and attacked the insurgents near Dabra. Four companies made unsuccessful effort to flank the insurgents. Fighting lasted all day. Results are not known. The Turks have fired on Gariza.

BERLIN, July 26.—The Clerk of the Court at Landock, who originated the Crown Prince Assassination Story, proves to be insane.

WASHINGTON, July 24.—The commissioner heretofore designated to count the money in the Treasury this week, in accordance with the request of the Secretary, make close inquiry concerning the abstraction of the forty-seven thousand dollars some weeks ago. Before agent Spinner retired he expressed his confidence that the stolen money would be returned, because several other stolen sums had found their way back into the treasury and it was his opinion that the late theft was committed by a person, or persons holding place under him, and since that time no new discoveries have been made, although the treasury department has not lost sight of the matter. Warden Thornton has not left this city for a summer sojourn elsewhere, he being detained here to attend to a large number of claims before the United States and Mexican commission in the capacity of umpire.  
New York, July 26.—Geo. H. Mumford, Vice-President of the Western Union Telegraph Company, died in Paris, after a brief illness.  
Secretary Britton, has official advice of Chief Clerk Averys' indictment. Averys resignation has been demanded, and was promptly given. Successor not yet designated. Two indictments against Avery, singly, and another, in connection with Ex-Collector McDonald, and Ex-Revenue agent Joyce. Justice Fisher has resigned. He will vacate upon Gov. Welles return to Washington.

CENTRAL AMERICA.  
PANAMA, July 26.—In consequence of the Ultramontane riots in San Miguel in Salvador, the City of Panama, on last voyage from Central America, brought down from the port of Libertad, the Bishop of Santa Tecla and seven Priests, and landed them at Covinto, in Nicaragua, where they still remain. These Priests were suddenly arrested, hurried down to port under escort of soldiers, and put aboard of the steamer, Advices from Salvador of 4th inst., states that order has been restored at the scene of the Ultramontane riots, it was discovered that arrangements of similar kinds for outbreaks was prepared all over the Republic in the name of religion.  
The provincial Radeigner, Bishop of Casano, and canon, Ocellane, and Vechedi have been expelled from the country.
