

### OHIO.

**THREATENED UPRISING OF THE NEGROES AT EAST FELICIA.**  
CINCINNATI, July 27.—The Board of Education have elected Pendleton by acclamation as a member of the board of managers of the public library.  
A dispatch from New Orleans states that a riot is apprehended at East Felicia, and that negroes have assumed the offensive and are collecting and arming themselves throughout the Parish for the supposed purpose of capturing the town of Clarion. Great excitement prevails throughout Parish. Numbers of white men have armed themselves and congregated to patrol the town. A bad feeling has existed between the races in that Parish for some months.

### EUROPE.

**WRECK OF THE SHIP STUART HAKNEMAN.**  
LONDON, July 27.—The ship Stuart Hakneman, from Bombay, is wrecked, five of the crew have arrived at St. Helena. Of the remaining thirty-eight were drowned. The survivors were fifteen days at sea, and in an open boat when rescued.  
London, July 27.—Right Rev. Conroy Threlkeld, Bishop of the St. David's, is dead.  
The Manchester Guardian says an alarming state of things prevails at Oldham, only six out of 162 mills belonging to the tax-payers association are working.  
London, July 27.—The Galic announces some official authority that the Government has not abandoned its idea of having a session of Conference on usages of war at St. Petersburg. It says all powers except England, have accepted an invitation to participate, and the Conference will meet in the Spring of 1875.  
Madrid, July 27.—The Constitutional Committee have approved a whole draft of new sub-committees which will discuss with ministers to-day the question of the rocks of the West Indian colonies the right of representation in the Assembly when the war in Cuba terminates.

### GOTHAM.

**FAILURE OF DUNCAN SHERMAN & CO.—DESTRUCTIVE ICE STORM—STROCK BY LIGHTNING.**  
New York, July 27.—Duncan, Sherman & Co., suspended this morning. The suspension caused great excitement in Wall Street.  
A Geneva letter states that the storm of the 7th inst. was literally an ice storm accompanied by a cyclone which lasted not over fifteen minutes, and during which the rocks of the West Indian colonies were largely smashed and did incalculable damage. The suburbs suffered terribly also. All crops are destroyed where the ice fell in masses.  
During the fearful thunder storm yesterday evening, lightning struck the carriage of Capt Johnson, knocking the driver from the box and fatal wounding him, also throwing Miss Drew, and other members of the family into the road, but without serious damage. The doors of Sherman, Duncan & Co., were closed at 11:25 o'clock. Only in a general way can the cause of the suspension be ascertained. It is admitted that the house has lost very largely on cotton, in fact that is the principle source of loss involvements, with various railroad enterprises. Liabilities understood to be between five and six millions of dollars. Mr. Duncan returned from Europe about two weeks ago, and has since been making careful examination of his assets, and finds they are largely inadequate. He resolved to endeavor to get new cash capital and having failed to do so determined that it was the best to suspend and make general assignment for the benefit of all creditors. Their indebtedness is distributed all over this country and Europe, considerable amount being in form of letters of credit held by travelers. The house was founded in 1850 by Alexander Duncan, Walter Sherman and Butler Duncan, the latter of whom is the head of the present house. The present firm has been in operation about ten years. General sympathy has been expressed for Mr. W. B. Duncan. The credit of the house was good up to the hour of suspension, and had Mr. Duncan chosen to avail himself of a his his house need not have suspended. The greatest excitement prevailed in the lower part of the city, as soon as the rumor of suspension began to be circulated. Large crowds of people assembled. Many attempts were made to gain admission to the building but the doors remained obstinately closed. Even a telegraph messenger boy was unable to gain admittance until he sought himself, of the back entrance on Pine street, and even then he was compelled to hand in his dispatch through an iron grating. Inside the numerous clerks could be seen at their desks busily engaged with their books but entrance was denied to all. At one o'clock there was still much excitement in the neighborhood of this banking house, but no new developments of importance had occurred. It is understood that a full statement of the affairs of the house is in course of preparation.  
An extract from Sherman, Duncan & Co., statement says: "Through losses and misstatements our available assets are so reduced that we are compelled to go into liquidation."

### HEADQUARTERS.

**YELLOW FEVER AT THE PENNSACOLA NAVY YARD.**  
Washington, July 27.—Commander Cooper telegraphs the navy department that he fears there is some local cause for the fever at Bananas. Surgeon General Beall received the following dispatch from Key West:  
One death from fever yesterday, and release among convalescence, only one new case reported during the last twelve days. Thermometer 89.  
Jas. Gillien, present cashier of the treasury, was appointed chief clerk of the treasury department.  
The reports received by Surgeon General Barnes, of the United States Army, from Brest Major General Brannan, commanding Fort Barrancas, Florida and Geo. W. Sternberg, post surgeon on there, show that the fever is raging at that place. On the 21st inst. there were six cases, and on the morning of the 22d a fifteen. The commanding officer on that day asked authority to hire as many nurses as might be necessary for the fever patients, and expressed the opinion that every one of them would have the fever who have not had it before. The Surgeon-General, in reply telegraphed him: "Hire as many nurses as you may need; any assistance this office can give you is at your disposal."  
On the 21st, the command was removed from Fort Barrancas to Fort Pickens, and six new cases were reported from the latter place on the 22d, making in all, twenty-six. There was one with the black vomit. On the 23d, seven new cases and one death were reported from Fort Pickens. On the morning of the 24th, thirty-nine cases were reported at Fort Barrancas; one very low, and two dangerously sick. The sick were well cared for, and there was no panic. One of the assistant surgeons from New Orleans arrived on that day, and two more had been ordered to the post by the department.  
Late in the day forty-six cases were reported, but no officers were among them. The wife of Lieutenant Ingalls was attacked that day, but there were no deaths. Forty-three cases were reported up to six p.m. of the 26th instant, and four deaths. No officers had then been attacked. Mrs. Bannan, the wife of the Commanding Officer, was taken sick on that day. The patients were having all they needed. Three additional physicians and a hospital steward arrived from New Orleans on the evening of the 25th. No cases had been reported from Fort Pickens since the morning of the 24th. This morning the Surgeon General received the following telegram from Post Surgeon Sternberg:  
FORT BARRANCAS, July 27, 1875.—Taken sick one officer, Lieutenant Asher, two children, and five enlisted men; died, three enlisted men and one child; remaining under treatment, one officer, twenty-seven enlisted men, one child, and one servant and thirteen children.  
There is a growing trouble between Secretary Brinlow and treasurer New, regarding the employers in the office of the treasurer.  
Professor Janney telegraphs the Secretary of the Interior that he has found gold in paying quantities in the Biscay Hills. Good head of water, amply sufficient for washing purposes, he reports passing into the Hills from all directions.
