The Judge seems to have utterly forgotten sections 12 and 13 of "The Declaration of Rights" of 1776—which constitute a part of the Constitution, and are as follows:

SEC. 12. No freeman ought to be taken, imprisoned, or deprived of his freehold, liberties or privileges, or outlawed or exiled, or in any manner destroyed or deprived of his life, liberty or property, but by the laws of the land.

SEC. 13. Every freeman restrained of his liberty, is cutitled to a remedy to enquire into the lawfulness thereof, and to remove the same if unlawful, and that such remedy ought not to be denied or delayed. The Judge either forgot that these

provisions constituted a part of the Constitution, or was profoundly ignorant of the meaning and effect which every Judge in the State had at all times and under all circumstances giv en to them.
