**GOTHAM.**  
DUNCAN, SHERMAN & CO'S  
GREAT FAILURE—A MILLION AND A QUARTER  
IN REAL ESTATE  
STILL SAFE.

New York, July 29.—The Tribune says a responsible officer of one of the largest banks in the city stated to a reporter yesterday that Duncan, Sherman & Co. had nearly seven hundred thousand dollars tied up in securities of the Mobile & Ohio Railroad, of which Mr. Duncan was President and the firm the fiscal agent, and a small amount in Selma & Gulf Railroad—an incomplete scheme that was abandoned after the panic of 1873. It was understood, also, says the Tribune, that in one of their settlements Duncan Sherman & Co. have been obliged to take their hundred thousand dollars in Alabama State bonds which are now quoted at thirty-five cents on the dollar.

It appears that transfers of real estate have been recorded at the Register's office this week on the part of Wm. Butler Duncan and another member of the firm of Duncan Sherman & Co., to the amount of a million and a quarter dollars.

The deeds just recorded date from 1868 to 1874. The name of Grant is freshly inserted in a different handwriting from that of the deed.

**EUROPE.**  
THE LORD MAYOR OF LONDON  
GIVES A BANQUET.

LONDON, July 29.—A grand banquet will be given this evening at Guildhall by the Lord Mayor of London, to various municipal heads of British and foreign cities and towns, who have assembled here in response to the Lord Mayor's invitation. Preparations for the banquet are very elaborate.

It is said the decorations alone cost \$5,000 a hall. Honor of the occasion will take place in Guildhall to-morrow night.

The grand jury at Cradon found a true bill for misdemeanor against Col. Valentine Baker of the 10th Hussars, who is charged by a young lady with assaulting her in a carriage on the southwestern railway.

PARRIS, July 29.—In the Assembly to-day Mr. Reaoul Duval asked the Government why the United States had not paid the French citizens the indemnities due to them for losses sustained during civil wars, while claims of other foreign countries had been settled, and Luke DeCazes, minister of foreign affairs, in reply said the indemnity due other foreigners was otherwise unpaid. President Grant, in his last message to Congress recommended it to take legislative action on this matter. Congress, however, had not moved yet. In conclusion, Duke DeCazes said he had full confidence in the American Government. The permanent committee of the National Assembly, consists of 12 deputies of the right, 2 of the Left-wing group, and 11 of the left.
