KENTUCKY.

LOUISVILLE, July 31.—The condition of crops are alarming—daily rains for six weeks, wheat, oats, rye, barley and hay are injured fifty per cent, and they are greatly injured. Tobacco crop is greatly injured.

TENNESSEE.

ANDREW JOHNSON DEAD.
BNAIRST, TN., July 31.—Ex-President Andy Johnson died this morning at his daughter's residence in Carter county at two o'clock. He was stricken Wednesday evening at four o'clock with paralysis and did not speak after he was attacked.

GOTHAM.

MORE FAILURES ON ACCOUNT OF DUNCAN & CO., ETC.

NEW YORK, July 31.—A report is circulated that several thousand people are heavy losers by the failure of Duncan, Sherman & Co., and without representation in many instances; and letters have been received from Jno. T. Raymond, John Brougham and William Wheatey, claiming that they are losers.

Sohmell & Fruehleiter, extensive lager beer brewers at Marion, N. J., failed about seventy-five thousand dollars.

C. G. Hollen and H. S. Bogert, two bankers who were short of stocks on account of Duncan, Sherman & Co.'s failure, and failed to cover in time, succeeded yesterday.

VIRGINIA.

DEATH OF GENERAL GEORGE E. PICKETT.

NORFOLK, July 31.—The remains of Gen. E. Pickett, were this afternoon laid in a vault until fall, when they will be removed to Hollywood cemetery at Richmond. The funeral was attended by a very large number of citizens, the masonic fraternity members of the city council, and military.

RICHMOND, July 31.—The most profound sorrow and regret prevails this community in consequence of the death of the gallant Virginia gentleman and soldier. Gen. Pickett, who died at Norfolk last night. Arrangements are being made to have a memorial meeting on Monday evening of his comrades in the late war, and the public generally, to give expression of their feelings on the sad occasion. The remains of Gen. Pickett will be temporarily deposited in a vault in Norfolk. They will ultimately be brought to Richmond for interment.

The announcement of the death of ex-President Johnson also excited regret and sympathy.

EUROPE.

DUEL BETWEEN HENRI ROCHE FORT AND PAUL DECASTAGNAG.

NAG—DUNCAN SHERMAN & CO.'S, LETTERS OF CREDIT.

LONDON, July 31.—The Times reports that Henri Roche Fort on the 10th inst., sent a letter to Paul DeCastagnag, calling on him to come to Geneva on Monday with his seconds. The cause of the challenge is said to be about certain articles in Lepays in 1872. DeCastagnag replied with an excessively abusive letter, giving Roche Fort the choice of weapons and appointing Prince Alexander DeWagman and Count Harrison his seconds. M. M. Perin and Ordinance having consented to act as Roche Fort's seconds have met those of DeCastagnag's in Paris to arrange the meeting.

LONDON, July 31.—Monday is a bank holiday, and the stock exchange and mining lane will be closed. The cotton market, and all other Liverpool markets, will also be closed. The Times this morning, in its financial article, says it believes arrangements are in contemplation which will result in the payment of Duncan, Sherman & Co.'s circular rates in the hands of travelers.
