THE NATIONAL EDUCATIONAL ASSOCIATION.

MINNEAPOLIS, August 4.—The National Educational Association yesterday afternoon resolved itself into three separate departments. Normal schools, elementary and higher education. A number of Secretaries and Treasurers of the Association were appointed a committee on nominations.

MISSISSIPPI.

THE DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION—THE LARGEST SINCE 1871.

JACKSON, July 4.—The Democratic Convention in the largest since 1861. Lamar addressed the meeting at length. H. C. Hemingway was nominated for Treasurer. The platform was mainly composed of State officers who recognize to the fullest extent civil and political unity of all men, and asks aid and assistance of voters of all parties and of both races in the establishment of a good government. After the appointment of an Executive Committee the Convention adjourned.

THE FLOODS.

NABEVILLE, August 4.—The Ohio has risen four feet at Pittsburg and Louisville. The Mississippi has risen nine inches at St. Louis, four at Cairo, where it is 1 1/2 feet above danger line. Probabilities—clear, or fair weather for Tennessee and Ohio valley, the Ohio will rise at stations below Marietta central Mississippi, and will continue to rise and flow, probably between Memphis Thursday and Thursday night. SPECIAL RIVER REPORT.—The Ohio has risen during the past twenty-four hours thirty-eight inches at Cincinnati and twelve inches at Louisville. It is above the danger line at Cincinnati, Marietta, Louisville and Evansville, but is now falling at stations above Marietta, and is fourteen inches above the danger line at Pittsburg. The Mississippi river is four and a half feet above the danger line at Cairo, where it has risen nine inches. It has risen one inch at Memphis and two at Vicksburg, and is reported eight inches above the danger line at Helena. It has fallen eleven inches at St. Louis, and eight at Teokuk. The floods will continue on the lower Ohio during Thursday, and the danger will increase on the Mississippi, between Cairo and Memphis, during Thursday and Friday. The upper Ohio and the rivers in Pennsylvania have fallen rapidly. The Cumberland, Missouri and Red rivers have changed but slightly. Rain has prevailed during the day in the regions of the upper Mississippi and lower Missouri valleys.

GOTHAM.

BEECHER'S NEW TRIAL. New York, August 4.—It is stated that the notice of trial served on Beecher's lawyers by Tilton's attorney, is purely formal. The notice, it is said, does not indicate, necessarily, that a new trial will be pressed. It is a formal document drawn up and signed because the last trial did not result in a verdict.

THE BLACK HILLS.

THE MINERS' TROUBLES. New York, August 4.—A dispatch from the Black Hills country says Gen. Crook, in his order directing miners to leave by the 15th of August, suggests that they assemble at military post, about to be established at Camp Harvey, on French creek, on or before August 10, and there hold a meeting, and take such steps as may seem best to them by organization and the drafting of proper resolutions to secure to each, when this country shall have been opened the benefit of his discoveries and labor he has already expended.

TENNESSEE.

MEMPHIS, August 4.—Appals operation of nine hundred acres opposite Friars Point is submerged. Crassava made at Decatur Front, 21 miles below here on the Mississippi side. Planters are endeavoring to stop it. All planters are at work strengthening levees.

ALABAMA.

A CONVENTION CALLED BY FIFTEEN THOUSAND MAJORITY—A GOOD EXAMPLE FOR NORTH CAROLINA.

MONTEVIDEO, August 4.—Returns come in slowly, but enough is known to render it reasonably certain that a Constitutional Convention has been called by ten thousand majority. Detus E. Coory, who issued an address to the people favoring Congressman White's force bill, received but seven votes in his own city, out of twenty-four hundred polled, eighteen hundred of which were Republican. Many leading Republicans supported the call and several Republican counties have given majorities for the Convention.

LATER.—The Convention has carried the State by fifteen thousand majority.

EUROPE.

COPENHAGEN, August 4.—Hans Christian Anderson, the poet, and novelist, died to-day—aged 70 years.

LONDON, August 4.—It has been decided that no session of the International Prison Congress will be held in 76. A prominent prison commission,

composed of Dr. E. C. Wines, of the United States, Baron Holzendorf, of Germany, M. Stevens, of Belgium, M. Pots of Holland, and others will meet at Frankfurt to receive reports for the consideration of a Congress which will be held later probably in Zenith.
