

YELLOW FEVER. A telegram from Gen. Brannan, at Fort Barrancos reports no new cases since the 23d. Assistant Surgeon H. E. Brown, has arrived. Dr. Steinberg reports 45 cases under treatment, 29 convalescent.

THE FLOOD. THE WATERS CONTINUE TO RISE—TERRIBLE FLOODS IN CALCUTTA—SPECIAL REPORT.

MEMPHIS, Aug. 5.—Heavy rains prevail the plantations, Islands No. 10 and 39 is submerged at New Madrid. The flood is running through the sunken land to St. Francis Valley. The river here is rising steadily and slowly, encroaching on exposed plantations. A despatch from Pine Bluff says the river has risen six inches this morning, and is within four feet of high water.

CALCUTTA, August 6.—Floods are from the northwestern Provinces, and many dwellings are swept away. Great loss of lives is feared. WASHINGTON, August 6.—The Lower Ohio river will continue to rise at stations below Cincinnati and fall rapidly at stations above Cincinnati. The floods will become more dangerous to lower Louisiana and Paducah. The Central Mississippi will rise at Cairo, Memphis, Helena and Vicksburg, and fall at St. Louis. The danger will increase in the lower Mississippi between Cairo and Vicksburg during to-day and to-morrow.

A special river report 7:30 p. m. says: During the past four hours the Ohio has risen 2 1/2 inches at Cincinnati, 2 feet at Louisville, 1 foot at Evansville, and 10 1/2 feet at Paducah, where it is now 4 feet and 3 inches below the danger line. It is from 2 to 5 feet above the danger line at stations between Evansville and Cincinnati. It has fallen, and is now below the danger line at Marietta and Piteboug. The Mississippi has risen 6 inches at Cairo, 2 inches at Memphis, and is rising at Vicksburg, but has fallen one foot at St. Louis, and five inches at Warsaw. It is now four feet and a half above the danger line at Cairo, and 10 inches above at Helena. It is one foot below the danger line at Memphis and one foot and ten inches below it at Vicksburg. The Missouri has fallen 1 1/2 inches at St. Louis. The Cumberland has risen six inches at Nashville. The floods will increase in the lower Ohio and central Mississippi during Friday and Saturday. Heavy local rains reported from the Western portions of Tennessee and Kentucky and Southern Indiana.

SPECIAL BREVES. 7:30 P. M.—During the past 24 hours, Ohio has risen 11 inches at Cincinnati, 22 inches at Louisville, 9 at Evansville, and 5 at Paducah. Has fallen six feet and a half at Marietta and 4 at Piteboug. In now above the danger line from Cincinnati to Greenville, and 3 feet and 10 inches below the danger line at Paducah, where it will continue to rise. The river has reached its maximum height at Cincinnati, and will fall slowly during Saturday. The Mississippi has risen slowly at Station to Cairo, to Vicksburg, and is 5 feet above the danger line at Cairo, and 11 inches above it at Helena. It is one foot and 8 inches above the danger line at Vicksburg, and 9 inches below at Memphis. The river will continue slowly to rise during Saturday and Sunday at St. Louis. The rivers of Pennsylvania have fallen rapidly. The Cumberland has risen 21 inches at Nashville. The Missouri has changed but slightly. The red river has risen four inches at Shreveport. Light rains have prevailed in the lower Mississippi and lower Ohio valleys, and heavy rains will probably prevail in the Ohio Valley to-night.

MEMPHIS, Aug. 6.—The river is rising steadily, two inches in twenty-four hours. Leaves far down as Friars Point is good, the only break being at a cut in the old town levee, through which water poured, threatening plantations below. The St. Francis, at Madison, has risen four feet. This water comes from the Mississippi, near Madrid, and threatens fine cotton lands above. Helena, in Arkansas, cotton men predict a loss of 80,000 bales in Memphis district alone.

GOTHAM. DUNCAN, SHERMAN & CO'S, LETTERS OF CREDIT—THE O'CONNELL CENTENARY. NEW YORK, August 6.—Drexel, Morgan & Co., make a formal announcement that traveling credits and circular notes accompanied by a letter of identification issued by Duncan, Sherman & Co., on the Union Bank of London will be cashed or exchanged for new credits on presentation at the office of Messrs. J. S. Morgan & Co., of London, or Drexel, Morgan & Co., prior to Nov. 1st, 1875.

NEW YORK, August 6.—Solemn, pontifical high mass in honor of O'Connell celebrated this morning in St. Stephens church by Bishop Carrigan of Newark assisted by their clergymen. Masses celebrated in numbers of other Churches.

NEW YORK, August 6.—In an interview last evening Mr. Deuce said he believed that arrangements would be completed to-day in London whereby Morgan & Co. will protect travelers drafts issued by Duncan, Sherman & Co.

Ignacio Maciel, a Mexican minister, through counsel made a demand on Judge Shipman for nearly seventeen thousand dollars on deposit for the Mexican government. Shipman refused to deliver it. Suit was accordingly brought before the United States Supreme Court to obtain that sum, on the ground that by international comity as such money is protected by the same immunity as persons of foreign ministers.

HEADQUARTERS. CABINET AFFAIRS—THE TREASURY THEFT & C.

WASHINGTON, August 6.—The President signed the commissions of H. P. Wells District Attorney Vice Fish-er. Maj. Wm. H. Johnson, Paymaster, was relieved from duty in the Department of the Gulf. The Bay of Tunis will collect three and a half centimes per ton on mercantile vessels entering the port of Regency, to defray the expenses of the Light House at Cape Bon. The Revenue Department has advised of the arrest of C. B. Wilkinson, Collector of the Sixth District of Missouri, charged, embezzlement and signing false certificates and conspiring to defraud the Government. He has been suspended. Bail 15,000.

Mr. Bristol has returned, and the committee appointed by him to examine the accounts, and count the money have reported total deficit, \$47,818, including \$47,097 stolen from cash room July 2d, to which the committee furnish no clue.

ELECTRICISMS. One child is dead and ten others are sick from cholera—state sausage in Philadelphia. A dog also had some, is dead, and the man that made them arrested.

The boiler of a steam threshing machine, on Mr. Ben. Hardin's farm, in Maury county, Tennessee, exploded, killing Mr. Hardin, his engineer and a colored man. Seven others are wounded, two of them probably fatally.

Attorney General Pierpont is a guest of the President, at Long Branch. Henry Smith, of Rochester, was killed by a stray bullet at a picnic target shooting yesterday.

EUROPE. DUBLIN, August 6.—The city is brilliantly illuminated and the streets are crowded by gay throngs. Everything passed off peacefully. The banquet last night, given by the Lord Mayor of Dublin in honor of the memory of O'Connell, was a brilliant affair. A despatch has been received from the Pope giving blessings to all the persons assisting at the Centenary celebrations. The health of the Pope was proposed first and the Queen's health was proposed next. The toast was received with loud cheers.

The toast to the memory of O'Connell was responded to by Ginderson of Lubator and by Archbishop Mitchell, who said that England was once under the Government of France and yearned for deliverance from that yoke; it was not strange, therefore, that Ireland should now yearn for home Government as did England of old.

In consequence of the illness of his daughter, Lord O'Hagan's address will be read to the people by the Lord Mayor of Dublin, after the procession goes through the streets, from a platform erected on the site intended for the monument to the memory of the liberator.

LONDON, August 6.—Weather unsettled. Stock exchange to be closed to-morrow to allow repairs to building.

PARIS, August 6.—The suit brought by publishers against N. Spoleonius for the non-completion of the life of Cezar, was dismissed on payment of cost.

ROME, August 6.—Opinions says, foreign ecclesiastical establishments are preparing necessary deeds for a conversion of their real property into Italian rents in conformity with the law of 1873. Sale of property of the Irish College will begin on the 11th inst.

LONDON, August 6.—Numerous Amendments have been made in the committee to the shipping bill, introduced in the House by Sir Charles.
