WASHINGTON, August 6.—The Low-er Ohio river will continue to rise at stations below Cincinnati and fall rapidly at stations above Cincinnati. The Central Mississippi will rise at Cairo, Memphis, Helena and Vicksburg, and fall at St. Louis.
