THE FLOODS.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—The Ohio will rise slowly at Louisville, and will fall at and above Cincinnati. The Mississippi will continue to rise from Cairo to Vicksburg.

CINCINNATI, Aug. 7.—A special says a negro attempted to rob Mrs. Johnson Howard, of Athens, McMin county, Tenn., on the highway. The negro was captured, taken from the jail and killed. The citizens armed themselves, fearing the negroes would attack the town. Later reports state quiet restored.

EUROPE.

THE O'CONNELL CENTENARY.

CAN TEAM.

DUBLIN, August 7.—Grand banquet at the exhibition palace. The Mayor presided, no incident until the regular programme toast. The legislative independence of Ireland was read. The Mayor called on Chas. Garvin Duffy to respond. Duffy's rising created a tremendous uproar, which lasted twenty minutes, when the Mayor withdrew.

New York, August 7.—A Dublin special states that twenty-four home rule members of Parliament promised to attend the demonstration today, which is to consider the proceedings of Lord Mayor, yesterday.

A home dispatch states that there was an oration on O'Connell by professor Ariarte in the Church of St. Agatha yesterday. O'Connell was claimed as pioneer of the revival of Catholicism in England and the discourse was ultramontaine throughout.

The Fall Mill Gazette says that Parliament adjourns Tuesday until Friday, when it will be prorogued.

DUBLIN, August 7.—In the amnesty demonstration to-day, in Glanconnery cemetery, where O'Connell is buried, four thousand people were present, and resolutions were passed favoring home rule and amnesty for misprisoned felons.

MADRID, August 7.—It is reported that Gist intends contracting a loan of seven million dollars to indemnify owners.

LONDON, August 7.—The Secretary of the Universal Alliance, in a letter to the Times from Damascus dated under date of July 22d says: "The cholera is raging here. Four hundred cases are reported daily, but no real number is recorded. The Christian quarters have been deserted. The mission school has closed and the children have been dispersed."

LONDON, Aug. 7.—The American Squadron shortly sailed from Northampton to Gibraltar has arrived.

An American gentleman in Paris says too little interest is manifested in Europe in the Centennial. The reason is that the English and French manufacturers have not been sufficiently informed of the details. A movement is on foot in Paris to organize a bureau of information. Home people need stimulation to work in Europe while there is time.

PANAMA, Aug. 7.—The American Rifle-Team here was received last night by Victor Hugo. Hugo said he was proud of America, and was grateful for the recognition given him and his books.
