## EDITORIAL NOTES.

LOUISIANA'S last orange crop amounted to 16,250,000, and realized a net profit of \$810,000. The custom there is to sell the fruit on the trees at ten dollars a thousand, and let the shipper do the picking.

While Gov. Chamberlain, of South Carolina, was absent from the state, the negro lieutenant-governor Gleaves, committed the death sentence of Joseph Gibbs to imprisonment for twenty years. Chamberlain holds that this action is null and void, and asks Judge Reed of the Charleston circuit to enforce the sentence of his court. This raises a very interesting question. If a lieutenant-governor cannot grant pardons what is to become of the eighty-four criminals that Lieutenant-Governor Davis, of Mississippi, set free for \$1,200 a head? If they are to be recaptured how are they to get their money's worth?

So far only twenty-seven deaths are reported as the result of the Wilmington county, Illinois, "Vandette," but there are several back townships yet to hear from and full returns may show some fifty slain, for the work of murder is not yet over. Had such bloody work occurred in Louisiana Sheridan would have been sent down there to help the Government preserve the peace, and we should have heard a great hue and cry about the Ku-Klux and all that. But Illinois being a loyal State these "outrages" do not count.

The Turks are hastening troops to the Herzegovina, where the hardy mountaineers are holding their own, and moving the Ottoman forces pay dearly for any advantage they may gain. The insurrection is now nearly a month old and seems as far from being suppressed as ever, delay being more favorable to the insurgents than to the Turks.

In eight years there have been eleven burials of whites in Wimberly, S. C., and one hundred and fifty seven of negroes. In a small section Southeast of Wimberly, where there were seven hundred and fifty negroes there are now only two hundred and fifty. The negroes are dying of consumption, a disease formerly almost unknown among them. Idleness and bad living seem to be the chief causes of the mortality.

It has been given out quite generally that a formidable telegraph company is organizing in San Francisco. The new company say it is their intention to extend wires between all the leading cities of the country, and to make a reduction from the present rates. The capital stock is said to be \$25,000,000, of which \$7,500,000 has been subscribed and ten per cent. paid in. The first board of directors are reported to be wealthy men, with an aggregate capital of some forty millions. The tariff rates of the new company are stated as twenty-five cents per ten words within 250 miles, fifty cents within 500, seventy-five within 1,000, and our dollar beyond, a system of second-class rates is also proposed, as a material reduction from those just given. Work will soon begin at Chicago, New York and Omaha, and the new company will probably be fully at work before another year closes.

A correspondent of the New York World, writing from Augusta, Maine, says all the political change going on in that State is in the right direction. Not a single case can be found of a Democrat going over to Republicanism, but scores and hundreds are reported the other way. If the majority to be overcome were smaller, the State could not easily set down for General Roberts should the tide continue strongly on for the next six weeks as it has for the last two. A recent and hasty tour of the State found hundreds of prominent Democrats sanguine of success. They say Maine can do as well as Massachusetts, her old mother, did last year. But wouldn't that astonish the natives?

## GOVERNOR BROGDEN AND THE VACANCY IN THE ORANGE DELEGATION.

Suffice it to say just now, that we regard this action of Governor Brogdan as a deliberate fraud and swindle that will and ought to forever damn him in the opinions of all honest minded men. We regret most exceedingly to be compelled to express such an opinion of one of whom we have, in spite of his political affiliations, thought so well and kindly.

## THE ROBESON COUNTY COMMISSIONERS.

The public attention throughout the State is now directed to the Commissioners of Robeson county. That they know their rights and the rights of the people, and that they dare maintain them we doubt not. The responsibility thrust upon them is a very grave one, but we are assured they will meet it like men. A more desperate attempt to win political power, by force, and fraud, was never witnessed, and it is fortunate for us that the men in whose hands lies the power to defeat it, are neither to be coaxed nor frightened.

A friend writing to us from Lumberton under date of the 18th says: The County Commissioners never had any idea of reconsidering their action in the matter, could not if they wished, and I am certain they do not desire to do so. Simler and McEachin have certificates of election and will be in Raleigh on the 6th, of September, and the only recourse the Radicals have will be before the Convention, when they will contest. Normal has gone to Charlotte, he says to employ counsel &c.

Cassidy's visit was for the purpose of frightening the Commissioners and others into a reconsideration, but they did not succeed, and in fact he did not approach any conservatives on the subject; but threats were made by Radicals here that a number would be arrested in a short time, all of which no one believed.
