VIRGINIA.

SAMBO IN CONVENTION—WOOL AND WORDS.

RICHMOND, Aug. 21.—Nothing of importance has yet been done in the Convention of colored people in session here. Any amount of wrangling or trifling things indulged in. The chair vainly attempting to keep order. The committee were appointed on Editorial as the Pres. on organizations and labor, other members on rules, on Conference on resolutions and on finance. A delegation attempted to read series of resolutions which from the tone of the first few lines were violent and denunciatory in the extreme. ## EUROPE.

PARS, August 20.—The Catholic Congress convened at Poitiers to-day. The Archbishop, of New Orleans, preached the opening sermon.

ST. PETERSBURG, August 20.—Three hundred houses were burned by fire.

BERLIN, August 20.—It is said that Austria has offered, under a guarantee of the Northern European Empires, to intervene for the pacification of the Herzegovinians, upon a basis of reform in the administration of the Christian Provinces of Turkey, but that the port has refused the offer.

MOSCOW, August 20.—Durregary was repulsed while endeavoring to penetrate Arragon and forced to retreat to the mountains near Treny.

BRUSSELS, August 21.—Le Noit, the Russian organ, in discussing the Turkish insurrection says, Russia, Germany and Austria are in accord on the point that the Eastern question shall not be raised. The peace has been temporarily disturbed, but the general peace is secure beyond attack.

France and Italy will doubtless be invited to join these three powers.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 21st, 1875.—Later intelligence from the scene of insurrection in Herzegovina is satisfactory. The Governor of Province announced that there was no movement among the people and he anticipates prompt pacification. Russian, Austrian and German Ambassadors had a protracted conference with General Vizier yesterday.

It's understood that they advised the suspension of hostilities with a view to afford an opportunity for ascertaining the grievances of the insurgents. Turkey declined to accede to this proposition. The Russian Ambassador had an interview with the Sultan, and afterwards Grand Vizier was summoned to the Palace by foreign ambassadors. The ministers will meet at the Russian Embassy Saturday.

## GEORGIA.

THE LINES DRAWN—A NEGRO INSURRECTION—THE INSURGENTS ARRESTED.

AUGUSTA, Ga., August 19.—Arrests of alleged negro insurrectionists in Johnson, Washington and Jefferson counties were continued to-day. Thirty armed negroes came into Wrightsville and surrounded themselves.

In Burke county a collision between the whites and blacks seems hourly imminent. Both races are under arms and the negroes are reported massed a few miles from Waynesboro. White scouts were fired on by negroes this morning. The Burke county people sent here to-day for troops, but Gov. Smith declined to let any of the companies go. A number of volunteers left for Waynesboro to-night, and it is feared a fight will soon take place. About one hundred arrests have been made in the different counties.

A dispatch from Washington county reports affairs quiete to-day than yesterday. About fifty arrests have been made there. Confessions implicating those arrested have been made.

Ex-Governor Herschel V. Johnson, who is judge of the middle circuit, has ordered a special term of the Superior Court to commence Monday week to try the offenders.

AUGUSTA, Ga., August 19.—A dispatch from Sandersville, Washington county, reports the arrest of Caudis Harris, one of the leaders in the plot. He made confession implicating Prince Rivers, major general of the South Carolina militia. Rivers emphatically denies the charge. There are seventy negroes in jail at Sandersville. Governor Smith is expected there to-night.

AUGUSTA, Ga., August 21.—All quiet in the county level; arrests still continue. Morris and Harris, ring-leaders in the contemplated insurrection, are still at large. It is believed there will be no trouble; the negroes have dispersed and returned to their homes.

TO THE VISITING STATION, near Deep Water Point, and await the inspection of the Quarantine Physician.

All vessels from Ports where Yellow Fever

or other infectious disease exists, will be re-

quired to undergo a rigid and prolonged Quar-

antine.

All vessels or boats of any character having

sickness on board on arrival, or having had

sickness any time during the voyage, are re-

quired to come to the Station for inspection

without regard to the Port from whence they

came. Vessels not included as above will pro-

ceed without detention.

Plots wilfully violating the Quarantine

Laws are subject to forfeiture of their moneys

Masters of vessels to a fine of two hundred dollars a day for every day they violate the Quarantine Laws and all other persons re-

sponsible for the same.

All vessels subject to visitation under above

regulations, will set a flag in the main rigging

(foremast).
