GOTHAM.

RAILROAD RATES—BANK STATEMENT.

NEW YORK, Aug. 21st, 1875.—Several excursion parties visited John Island. One woman was crushed, and two men were drowned.

The Representatives of five great lines met in Erie Buildings yesterday, to arrange fares to the West. Rates were advanced on the basis of twenty dollars to Chicago, which is an advance of two dollars on the present rates. Goes into effect Monday. Participative rates adopted between Philadelphia and Baltimore by the West.

LOUISIANA.

CENSUS OF THE STATE AND OF NEW ORLEANS.

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 21st, 1875.—The State registers report the result of the census of Louisiana as follows:

City of New Orleans, Whites, 153,721; colored, 57,647. Total, 203,368, an increase of 11,966 over the census of 1870. Population of the whole State, Whites, 404,361; colored, 450,029. An excess of colored over whites of 45,668, a total increase of 128,115, over the census of 1870. These figures may be subjected to some slight modifications. The return of one or two remote parishes not being quite complete.

PENNSYLVANIA.

SAD DROWNING—EXCITEMENT IN A GRAVEYARD—LYNCH LAW THREATENED.

BRADING, Pa., August 21.—At the funeral of Mrs. Philip Berenger and her three children yesterday great excitement prevailed and an immense crowd was present.

She drowned herself and children under the following circumstances: Her husband had treated her unmercifully, and paid his attentions to a New York, a woman in the town. He proposed to pay his wife \$2,000 and separate, he taking the boy and she the two girls, saying he would kill her if she returned.

Greatly disturbed in mind at the forced separation from her child, yesterday she took the streets and rode to the canal, and at a point about two and a half miles from town she stopped. With the assistance of the children she filled a basket with stones, and fastening it securely to her waist, she took a child under each arm and one on her breast, and plunged in. Before assistance reached them all were dead. When her husband was found, he was with the woman who had caused all the trouble.

Much excitement has prevailed since, and a strong escort of police protected him from the infuriated mob. After the bodies were placed in the ground he was hooted and fired at. Even the women were armed. He was placed in a close carriage, and was fired at again at the gate. As he was lifted from the carriage it is supposed he was struck. Great indignation still prevails, and lynch law is freely talked of.

ELECTRICISM.

The Albion Mills at Conshohocken, Penn., have been burned. Loss quarter million dollars.

Mary Kellenherer, aged 106, died yesterday at Hudson N. Y.

Cutter and Bardley, the defaulting Baltimore tea dealers, have been arrested in Canada. They are held under an old English statute concerning unpaid foreign debtors.

J. F. Bower, painter, was killed and Betsy Cotter, tinner, injured at Chattanooga, by the falling of a scaffold.

Hon. J. Russell Jones of Chicago says in regard to the acceptance of the Secretaryship of Interior tendered to him, that matters are in such shape at present he cannot give definite answer.

Thurlow Weed, his daughter and three servants have had a narrow escape from poising by using a copper kettle, used for boiling water for tea and coffee, scoured with oxalic acid.

The official count of the vote in Texas on Constitutional Convention in one hundred and one counties shows the result to be: for Convocation 46, 253; against Convocation 25, 625.

Gov. Smith, of Georgia, was at Sandersville yesterday, apprehending an insurrection. The excitement has subsided, and peace and order are restored.

Lt. COMMANDING KEARS has succeeded in getting the Rio Grande afloat, and carried her into Sabine Pass.

EUROPE.

FOREIGN MISCELLANY.

CONSTANTINOPLE, August 21.—It is officially stated that the news published in foreign journals in regard to the Herzegovian insurrection is much exaggerated. The Turkish government will soon have 18,000 men concentrated in Herzegovina. It has been waiting until it is able to concentrate a sufficient force to be able to crush the insurgents with the least possible effusion of blood.

Dervick Pacha has now been ordered to take offensive steps.

Powers entirely friendly have requested facilities to communicate with

the insurgents for the purpose of their submission to the Ottoman government, and informing them that they have nothing to hope for from the intervention of foreign powers.

LONDON, August 21.—The Daily News special from Vienna says, Russian General Kaufman is organizing an exhibition against Khokand in revenge for an attack upon the Russian soldiers.

PARIS, August 21.—The Memorial Diplomatique says, all powers have agreed in urging Servia and Montenegro to remain partial in the present conflict, and that the advice will be backed if necessary by force.

LONDON, August 21.—The Times publishes a special from Berlin, saying that the Khokand rebels had attacked a Russian body guard. It is expected the Russian government will order the military occupation of Khokand.

Kouler's telegram from Vienna denies the truth of the special report in the Daily News of yesterday—but the Turks had forced the insurgents to raise the siege of Trabzon. The town is still surrounded by insurgents in large numbers, and the siege continues.

VIENNA, Aug. 21.—The 25,000 Turkish troops which were landed at Kick, marched in the interior yesterday.

LONDON, Aug. 21.—The investigation by Board of Trade into loss of Steamer Abbot Ford has resulted in verdict that her Capt. made error of judgement but his certificate is turned to him.

ROMA.—The Faunfa says late Emperor Ferdinand of Austria left by his will to the Pope six millions dollars which amount has already been paid.
