CHICAGO, August 23.—Jefferson Davis has received invitations from Des Moines, Iowa, Charleston, Ill., and other points in the West to deliver the annual address at the meetings of their several Agricultural Societies this fall.

MINNE-SOTA

KILLING FROST.

ST. PAUL, August 23.—Killing frosts last night and the night before are reported from several points along the line of Lake Superior Railroad, destroying corn and other unripe crops. If the frost extended throughout the State at large, the corn crop will be an entire failure.

GEORGIA.

THE NEGRO INSURRECTION.
August 23.—Several of the prominent negroes connected with the trouble in counties here have made confessions. Jake Mooreman first Lieutenant of a negro company certifies on oath that nineteen countesses were to be embraced in its insurrection last Friday and was appointed for whipping all white men and ugly white women were to be killed. Pretty white women were to be spared and land and spoils were to be divided among the negroes. All who have so far confessed testify substantially the same as Jake Mooreman. Gov. Smith arrived here this afternoon from Waynesboro. He is determined to preserve peace enforce laws and do justice to whites and blacks.

GOTHAM.

THE ARRIVAL OF THE AMERICAN RIFLE TEAM.
New York, August 24.—The appeals from orders in the \$6,000,000 suit of the people against Tweed, were argued to-day before the Supreme Court, general term, one being from an order refusing the bill of particulars; the second from an order refusing to direct the complaint to be made more definite, and the third from an order refusing to vacate the order of arrest or reduce to \$3,000,000. The decision was reserved on all three.
New York Aug 23.—Members of the Rifle team arrived at city Hall half past 2 o'clock where they were received by Mayor Wickham and a number of distinguished citizens. The Mayor in a brief but complimentary manner welcomed the team and complimented them on their successful competition with British workmen.

NEW YORK.

ROCHESTER, N. Y., August 23.—A shocking case of baby farming was brought to light in this city, in which a woman admitted that 3 out of 4 babies brought to her for board had died within 5 weeks. She says they are taken from their mothers so young they cannot be expected to live.
New York, August 23.—Abraham Symonds, probably insane, killed his daughter with an axe, and then killed himself.
Ex-Judge Shipman, assessor of Duncan, Sherman & Co., and N. A. Conroy, S. L. M. Barlow and W. V. McFarland his sureties were justified to-day before Judge Robeson in the Court of Common Pleas, in five hundred thousand dollars each.
Various Turner societies containing representatives from different States, number 3,000 men, marched through the city to Jones' woods, where a three days festival is in progress.

EUROPE.

LONDON, August 23.—A special to the Times from Constantinople says Ponto has accepted the proposition of friendly powers to counsel an submission of the insurgents to Turkish authority and represent them their utter hopelessness from foreign intervention. Server Pacha has been appointed special commissioner to examine into the grievances of the disaffected people. It is confidently expected that the insurrection will soon terminate.
A Berlin special dispatch to the Times says another ambassador at Constantinople suggested to the Turkish Government expediency, allowing Herzegovina a semi-independent administration. Had this suggestion been accepted, the three Northern powers would have been prepared to assist in its accomplishment. Ponto, however, rejected the proposition. The intervention of Austria is no longer considered altogether improbable. The Austrian Government seems to consider that change has become indispensable and that it had best be effected at a time when Austria may hope to exercise a leading influence.
LONDON, August 23.—The Times in a leading article says if any mode could be devised of giving Herzegovina and Bosnia an independence similar to that enjoyed by Serbia, it would be a great relief to the Ponto and an advantage to Europe. A writer points to the gradual and inevitable disruption of the Ottoman Empire. Protests against supposition that foreign policy of Eng-

land might be governed in interest of holders of Turkish bonds. The article concludes: "Whenever the moment arrives for a further step towards the liberation of the outlying provinces of Turkey we need not hesitate to assist the movement if that course should appear desirable."
LONDON, August 23.—Special despatch to Daily News from Rome says Pope has invited Archbishop Ledochowicz to Rome on the expiration of his term of improvements in February next to attend a special consistory at which he will receive insignia of Cardinalate.
LONDON, August 23.—Madrid dispatch reports that the Alphonse at Leo de Ugel have severed the connection between the citadel and an outlying fort which defends it, and have cut the aqueduct which furnished the besieged with their principal water.

VIENNA, August 23.—Official reports show that wheat crops in Austria and Hungary have fallen off in quantity and quality, and will not yield more than five and a half million quintals.

Quarantine Notice.
UNTIL FURTHER NOTICE ALL VESSELS from Ports South of Cape Fear will come to the Visiting Station, near Deep Water Point, and await the inspection of the Quarantine Physician.
All vessels from Ports where Yellow Fever, or other infectious disease exists, will be required to undergo a rigid and prolonged Quarantine.
All vessels of board of any character having sickness on board on arrival, or having had sickness any time during the voyage, are required to come to the Station for inspection without regard to the Port from whence they come. Vessels not included as above will proceed without detention.
Pilots are especially enjoined to make careful enquiry relative to vessels, crew, &c., and if not satisfied with the statements of the Captain or commander, or if the vessel is in a filthy condition, they will bring the vessel to the Station for further examination.
Pilots willfully violating the Quarantine Laws are subject to a forfeiture of their branch; Masters of vessels to a fine of two hundred dollars a day for every day they violate the Quarantine Laws; and all other persons are liable for each and every offence.
All vessels subject to visitation under above regulations, will set a flag in the main-rigging, port-side.
