**MASSACHUSETTS.**  
RESUMPTION OF THE ANTI COTTON MILLS.

LAWRENCE MASS Aug 24.—The anti-cotton mill which suspended work on the 10th of July last will resume with full force on Monday next. They give employment to 1250 operatives. Sale of stock on hand has been large. prospect is regarded encouraging for fall business.

**NEW YORK.**  
**SARATOGA BOAT RACING.**  
SARATOGA N. Y. Aug. 24.—The Third Annual International Regatta of Amateur Oarsmen took place to-day. Lovely weather and perfect water. Two races on programme for the State championship for single sculls won by C. E. Courtney of Union Springs and Junior single scull race won by Jas Riley of Keplau boat club.

**AUSTRALIA.**  
MELBOURNE, August 24.—Commander Jas. G. Goodenough, commanding the British Squadron on Australian waters, died on the 20th inst. He had been attacked by poisoned arrows in an attack made on his flagship, Corvette Pearl, by the natives of Carls Bay, and although every effort was made to counteract its effects, the poison proved fatal. One seaman was killed and three wounded by savages.

**MARYLAND.**  
BALTIMORE, August 24.—Father Jeggel was arrested for assault and battery for ejecting Vincent Hagerman from the Catholic Church, of which Hagerman was a member. The Rev. Society, called Knights of St. George, had a picnic and allowed dancing. Father Jeggel attempted to prevent dancing, protesting against such amusements as irreligious. A heated discussion on the right of the priest to interfere, and the Society by a vote of 32 majority, declared the body independent of the control of Hagerman voted with the majority. Jeggel was held under \$200 bail, and will have a hearing this evening.

**ELECTRICISMS.**

Killing frost in 13 counties in Wisconsin on Sunday morning. Corn greatly injured, and tobacco killed. On Monday morning, heavy frost in Iowa and Illinois. Small vines, corn, and potatoes injured. A net cattle driver, was killed by cattle thieves. John Taylor, grandson of the Ex-President, was held liable on charge of robbing registered letters. He was on Sherman's staff—and that's what he got for being there. A Northeast storm is prevailing at Fortress Monroe. The roads are full of shipping. Twelve houses, the property of Thomas O'Leary, were burned at Newark, yesterday. The work of an incendiary. Willis Werry, Bishop of the British Methodist Episcopal Church, died at Toronto on Sunday last.

**GOTHAM.**

New York, August 24.—Three burglars attempted to break into the residence of Dr. Wm. A. Hammond, 43 West 54th street at 1 o'clock A. M. They set off the electric alarm while prying open a window. Dr. Hammond was aroused and, seizing a pistol, fired four shots at the burglars, wounding one. The burglars returned one shot and fled. No arrests are made yet.

New York, August 24.—In consequence of an error in the transmission by cable, Mark Lane's Express Crop Hewer was made to say of wheat in England, new samples look well in comparison with those of last year. The correction of the passage has been received from the Cable Company to-day, making it read, new samples look poor in comparison with those of last year.

**HEADQUARTERS.**

WASHINGTON, August 24.—The secretary of the Treasury has made decision in reference to the five twenties of 1865, May and November, and the five twenties of 1865, January and July. The books and records of the department show that the five twenties of May and November, known as old 65's, were the first of these two loans issued, the date of the issue being October 21st, 1865, while those of 1865, January and July, are known as new 65's, although the bonds bear on their face the date of July 1st 1869, were not issued until Oct 6th 1866. Therefore, it follows that the five twenties in 1865, May and November, known as the old 65's, being first issued under the law must be first called. The date given on the face of the bond is not to be taken on the date of the issue, but the fact as established by records of the department in the affiliation of the law. **EUROPE.**  
**ATTACK ON COMMODORE GOODENOUGH BY THE SAVAGES—DISTEMPER IN ENGLAND—THE LATEST WAR NEWS.**

LONDON, August 24.—The colonial office has the following details of the attack on Commodore Goodenough and a portion of the crew of the Pearl. The Commodore and party on the 12th had just landed in Carls Bay to open Cruise Island, who attacked the Sand Fly in the same place last year. After remaining about an hour ashore and making apparently satisfactory progress in the object of their mission, were preparing to return to the ship, when suddenly the natives, who were only a few yards off, shot at Commodore Goodenough. A poisoned arrow penetrated his left side. The boat was thrown up under a flight of arrows. Seven men were wounded, including Lieut. Hawker. Two of the wounded died from the effects of the poison. The others are improving. Soon as the boat returned the Pearl was shelled and burned. The natives of the village then returned to Nelson Bay.

MADRID, August 24.—The garrison of the citadel Seo de Urgel, hoisted the flag of truce, hostilities being suspended. Gen. Lizzaraga, the Carlist commander, offers to surrender on conditions, which Gen. Martinez Campos rejects. Negotiations continue and probably capitulation will be signed to-day.

VIENNA, August 24.—A dispatch to the New Full Press says the insurgents besieging Trebigne, have been reinforced and resolved to attack the city to-day.
