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THE GEORGIA INSURRECTION.

One of two things is certain; the recent disturbances in Georgia grew out of a dual purpose on the part of the negroes in the insurrectionary district to kill the whites and establish a negro government, or they were the fruits of certain incendiary emissaries of the radical party, who desired to bring about a collision between the whites and the blacks, upon which to ring the changes before the people of the North in the coming election. It is needless to say that in either view the safety of the white people of Georgia is endangered. There is probably no man in this country more familiar with its true condition, than Senator Morton of Indiana—to one who knows better than he that all to peace at the South save where protection to life and property demand arms. And yet the burden of every speech he makes, is to induce the people of the North to believe the "bloody shirt" lie. Is anyone simple enough to suppose that Senator Morton would not rejoice in a first class "terrible outrage," and that he would not feast upon its bloody details as greedily as if he were rolling the sweetest of morsels under his tongue?

Are the people of North Carolina ready to say that the man who raised an army and declaring martial law inaugurated civil war is an innocent man? If not, it will be well for their delegates in Convention assembled, to pause and consider before they remove the disabilities of WILLIAM W. HOLDEN.

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
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
