WASHINGTON NEWS.

MARINE DISASTER.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26.—Signal of five reports that Charles W. Holt from Georgetown D. C. arrived at Norfolk last evening in distress. She encountered a heavy northeast gale on the 23d and 24th. E. S. F. of Chapman lost head stay from rigging gaff and everything moveable about the decks, also split foremast. Officers of old Dominion Steamship Co report brig with forecastle gone 14 miles E. of Cape Henry. Tug gave assistance.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26.—No information has yet been received here in regard to the action taken by the United States steamers Congress and Hartford which recently arrived at Tripoli to demand reparation for the insult offered to the American Consul and his wife in that city, a short time ago. Though the officials here have no doubt but that the whole matter will soon be arranged to the satisfaction of our government.

The Congress and Hartford arrived at Tripoli last Saturday, and it is not probable that any intercourse was held with the Tripolitan authorities before Monday. The negotiations were being conducted by Capt. Earl English, of the Congress. Sincere the Tripolitan authorities refuse to make reparation upon his demands, Rear Admiral Worden, commanding the European station will be directed to proceed to Tripoli with all his force and there await instructions of the department.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26, 1875.—Orders will soon be issued changing stations of all vessels of Marine revenue service. The change is necessary for iron vessels from salt to fresh water.

A telegram was received at the Naval depot this morning from Capt. Edward Simpson, commanding the United States Steamer Omaha, dated August 26th, announcing that the State of Oansas has declared war against the Government of Columbia. The Department immediately issued orders to Rear Admiral Mullany commanding the North Atlantic station to hold all of his available force in readiness to proceed without delay to the Isthmus if necessary for protection of American interests there.

MEETING OF THE MISSISSIPPI VALLEY TRADING COMPANY.

Saint Louis, Mo.—The American Board of directors of the Miss. Valley Trading Co., held a meeting here last night that which Mr. Worrell the managing director was instructed to visit Louisville, Ky., with some men to establish a central office of the Co., at that point. He was further instructed to visit all the seaports from Norfolk to Galveston to see and report on their adaptability as ports of entry for ships of the Co. He was requested to visit all the railroads in the Miss. Valley and Gulf States, and report upon the facilities afforded by each for transmission for merchandise and products, and also upon the most durable centers of the Co., and report upon the agricultural materials and other resources of the country, through which several of the railroads could pass, so as to enable the Co. to decide which one is the most inviting field for examination. Last of the English deputations left last night for England. The directors on this side of the water are Dr. R. Shirkland of Dubuque, Ind.; Judge J. P. Jones, Barior; A. J. T. Bonner, of N. Y.; Dudley W. Adams, of Iowa; Col. D. A. Alton, of St. Louis; and J. T. Smith of Ga.; the other ones are to be appointed.

HEAVY SHIPMENTS OF PEACHES.

PHILADELPHIA Aug. 26.—The steamship Ohio which sailed to-day for Liverpool has included in her cargo 2400 barrels of Delaware peaches. The steaming of the ship has been turned into a refrigerator lined with ice and provided with fans for keeping up a constant current of cold air. This being the first venture of the kind its success is looked to with much interest.

EUROPE.

THE EGYPTIAN TROUBLES.

LONDON, August 26.—The Times has the following announcement:

ALEXANDRIA, Egypt, August 18.—Three men of war, with a force of troops and marines aboard, have been despatched with hostility to that portion of the Egyptian coast bordering on Abyssinia, to punish a body of blacks invading the Egyptian territory. Four thousand infantry are held in readiness for emergency at Suez. The Khedive is determined to exact full satisfaction for infringement upon his soil.
