FAILURES IN BALTIMORE.

Baltimore, August 27.—The liabilities of the Ahron Company are to and a half millions, of which one million is due in Baltimore to merchants, bankers and private bankers. Employed 350 men. Immediate cause of the failure was shrinkage in molasses.

THE PROPOSED FINANCE CONVENTION.

New York, Aug. 27th, 1875.—The dispatch sent here yesterday about the meeting of the New York delegation, including Messrs Ottinger, F. A. Cocking, Henry Kemp and others, to the proposed financial convention at Cincinnati, inadvertently termed the latter an inflation convention when it should have been designated as a hard money convention. Just as the speakers at the meeting readers this correction necessary, although the mistake is obvious, and could be easily corrected.

EUROPE.

EUROPEAN POWERS STILL UNABLE TO INDUCE TURKEY TO SUSPEND HOSTILITIES.

Bombay Aug 27.—The Gazette of this city publishes a statement that a British Minister at Peking has been thwarted and insulted in negotiations with Chinese Government and has telegraphed to London for instructions and for the reinforcement of British troops in China.

London Aug 27.—The Manchester Guardian and Birmingham Post published in their special despatches from London information which corroborates the report of the Bombay Gazette and purports to be derived from Foreign Office here.

London Aug 27.—The Times special from Berlin says European Powers are unable to induce Turkey to suspend hostilities on pending mediation.

A refusal however is a matter of indifference as the Turkish reinforcements are unable to penetrate mountain defiles. Telegrams that they had penetrated are premature. If the Herzegovinian reject proffered mediation, Austria who has assembled a whole army in Dalmatia will be in position to offer the Sultan her good offices.

London Aug 27.—The Daily Telegraph in its financial column to-day says private telegrams from Montevideo state that the dissatisfaction with the President and his ministry is such that no doubt is entertained that another revolution is imminent in Uruguay.

CALIFORNIA.

FAILURE OF THE BANK OF CALIFORNIA—THE PANIC IN SAN FRANCISCO—THE DEPARTMENT AT WASHINGTON SENDS GOLD TO RELIEVE THE BANK.

San Francisco, August 27.—The general feeling about the town is rather blue. The Cashier of the National California Bank and Trust Company stated to a gentleman during the interview this evening that the bank would open in the morning but might have to suspend during the day. This bank paid all its gold in this afternoon and a good deal of its silver. If it can make arrangements to-night for coin, it may be able to ride over to-morrow. A run is expected on the San Francisco and Merchants' Exchange Bank to-morrow. A meeting of the Bank Presidents was called this evening to concert measures for relief. The Board of Brokers has also called a meeting.

San Francisco, August 28, midnight.

The National Gold Bank and Trust Company have sent in the following notice for publication in the morning papers:

In consequence of the panic and the impossibility of obtaining coin, the National Gold Bank and Trust Company will close until further notice. The Bank has \$1,300,000 over and above all its liabilities. As soon as coin can be obtained it will resume business as usual. In the meantime any creditor so desiring, can have good assets of the Bank of the amount of his claim.

Chicago.—Aug. 27. The opinion of the bankers in this city is that the failure of the bank in California, will produce little if any effect in Chicago.

San Francisco, Aug. 27. President Rankin has no doubt that the bank of California will be able to meet all obligations.

\$1,400,000 in gold was paid out on yesterday. Aid was asked of the other banks without response. Rankin does not expect the bank will resume business. All the banks have been telegraphed to close.

Washington.—Aug. 27. Heavy transfers of goods to California are being made by the Treasury to lay in support of the banks in that section upon official notification being received at the department that all of the banks have deposited gold with the assistant treasury at New York. Telegraphic instructions were sent to the assistant treasury, at San Francisco, placing creditors to the respective banks making such deposits in New York. Thus far over a million dollars have been transferred.

San Francisco, Aug. 27.—The Mer-

chants' Exchange Bank is closed. Officers claim that the only trouble is the scarcity of coin, of which they have a hundred thousand dollars, but eight hundred thousand is liable to draft. The managers in London and San Francisco say the bank is able to meet any run.

London, August 27.—A communication has been received from the British Minister at Peking, complaining of the manner in which he has been treated by the Chinese Government since the Basmah affair, and desiring to have his hands strengthened in case of need. He has, however, not been insulted, and reports of the affair have been highly colored.

ELECTRICISMS.

Mr. Merchant Noe, who was arrested in his store in New York by a burglar a few days ago, is dead. Mrs. J. P. Conner of Nashville, committed suicide yesterday after her third attempt.

Post Master General Jewell has returned to Washington.

TENNESSEE.

REPORT OF THE MEMPHIS COTTON EXCHANGE ON THE TENNESSEE AND ALABAMA COTTON CROPS.

Memphis Aug 27.—The cotton exchange crops report for Memphis district and North Alabama says notwithstanding the excessive wet and cold weather that prevailed since the report of June the 26th, general prospects are indicated of the most gratifying character. The indications are that a larger or better crop never was made in this section of the country. Abundant crops of wheat, oats and millet. In most of the regions good crops of small grain are made and all harvested and protected, save corn.

The latter has in instances matured, and only awaits convenience of the planter to harvest, 112 responses report excessive rains, 54 balance of the time cloudy, 60 generally cold, 64 cold nights, 2 very dry, 46 favorable, weather 130 report extra part fruiting well; 3 not well; 13 report plant retaining fruit; 67 shedding seriously; 154 report crops well cultivated; 6 not; 133 report better crop than 1874; 21 equal one not so good, estimated average, 28 per cent better; 21 report bottom growth only good; 67 bottom and middle growth good; 89 report top growth light—making too much wood; 21 report bottom growth rotting seriously; 7 serious rot; 74 report perfect crops; 8 report picking commenced—all report it will not become general until the average time, September 13th. Its luxuriant growth will require an exceedingly late frost, and unless dry and warm weather succeed, there is great danger of bottom growth rotting in the low lands where the growth is already so dense as to exclude both sun and air. In regard to the damage by the overflow, we have been unable to arrive at any definite information. In most cases our correspondents in overland districts have been so overwhelmed with their own cases that they were unprepared, and some were unwilling to make definite responses; that very great damage of plantations subject to the influence of floods by the Mississippi river has occurred; with no admittance of doubt when the totally destroyed and particularly by back water in connection with the damage by rise and standing rain water, is considered, we are constrained to believe, from such information as we have, that the damage within that portion of the cotton region allotted to this change, will not fall short of 30,000 bales.

The above report is based on 174 responses received by the cotton exchange. The aggregate for North Alabama is 20 responses, 17 report excessive rains, 8 balance of the line cloudy, 5 generally cold, 9 cold nights, 3 favorable weather, 17 report fruiting well, 3 not, 15 retaining fruit, 5 shedding seriously. All report the crops well cultivated and better than in 1874, or an average of 32 per cent, on bottom crops good; 12 top; crops making too much wood; all report no picking will commence before the 14th; all report the condition of the crops the same as the Memphis district as regards early frost; no loss sustained by overflow.
