THE ROBESON CASE.

THE LAW VINDICATED.

Dr. Norment Under.

(Special to the Journal.)

In the case of B. M. Norment and Neil McNeill vs. the Commissioners of Robeson county before Judge Settle of the Supreme Court, was heard to-day and dismissed.

GREENSBORO, Sept. 1.

Judge Settle to-day dismissed the Robeson county case, holding that he had no jurisdiction and that the Convention was the only body to judge of the qualifications of members.

WASHINGTON.

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Just before the adjournment of the Court of Claims several months ago, an effort was made by certain parties to prevent the payment of the sum of \$300,000 awarded in the Elgee cotton case claim. They represented by affidavit and otherwise, that the cotton captured by Federal soldiers on the plantation of Elgee was not his private property, but belonged to the Confederate Government. The Attorney-General has decided that the proof was insufficient to bar the payment of the award.

WISCONSIN.

Damage to Railroad.

MILWAUKEE, Sept. 1.—Several storms have washed away the track of the Milwaukee & St. Paul Railroad between St. Peter's Junction and Red Wing. No trains have got through since Sunday. The damage will be repaired to-day.

OHIO.

A Father Through Mistake Shoots His Son.

CINCINNATI, Sept. 1.—A man named Peterson entered a farmer's (Trusty) daughter to this city. Trusty finding her took her home. Peterson followed the pair, making threats against the old man, and last night he approached the house. Trusty took his shot gun and was about to shoot at Peterson when Peterson, mistaking the son for Peterson, shot him dead.

PENNSYLVANIA.

Canal Boat With Oil Burned.

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 1.—The canal boat J. S. Dinkley, with 300 barrels of coal oil, burned. The explosion injured several. The danger to shipping in the harbor was averted by promptness of the police boat in towing the Dinkley into the stream.

MASSACHUSETTS.

Wife Murder and Suicide.

BOSTON, Sept. 1.—Patrick Beardon, who had not lived with his wife for several years, shot her twice, and attempted to shoot the person who interfered. He ended by shooting himself.

CALIFORNIA.

Mexican Outlawry—Rumors of the Resumption of the California Bank—Ralston's Salding Denied.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 1.—A dispatch from Tucson, Arizona, says that a very wealthy merchant of Tucson, and a naturalized citizen of Arizona, went to Sonora to collect some bills, was arrested, charged with furnishing arms to the insurgents. He was allowed no trial, but was ordered to pay \$20,000, or be shot. His grave had been dug when the messenger arrived with the ransom. The roads are lined with refugees flying from the impending revolution. Nothing authentic has been learned concerning the resumption of the Bank of California. During the latter part of the evening many reports were heard about town, to the effect that the Bank will resume in a few days. That seven or eight millions have been subscribed for that purpose. All such statements must be received with due caution, as it has a tendency to induce feelings which certainly do not exist at present. Such assertions are only traced to street talk. That they have been to a great extent received as correct, and have produced additional feelings of

NEW YORK.

Government Suit—Drowning—Suicide.

New York, Sept. 1.—Suit was commenced yesterday in the United States District Court, against the sureties of Merrick, Prince & Co., to recover \$75,000 alleged to be due the Government for unpaid duties. They were large importers of silks, wools and ligors, and gave warehouse bonds in 1869 to secure the payment of duties. The firm has since discontinued business and the members cannot be found. Mary Moller attempted to save her daughter who had ventured beyond the safety line at Rockaway Beach, and was drowned.

A YOUNG ITALIAN NAMED VIANNI,

THE YOUNG MAN TOOK POSITION IN THE

center of the group, and began his recitation. His voice was clear and well controlled. His recitation highly dramatic, his limbs seemed to quiver with passion, while the expression of his face was startling. Once he interrupted himself, and turning to Senator John A. King, said, "You understand Italian."

THEN RESUMED, AND FINISHED WITH

the exclamation in Italian: "God who judges all, will judge this." Then taking a pistol from the outer pocket of his coat, he placed it to his temple and fired, falling perfectly motionless on his face. The spectators exclaimed: "Wonderful," and applause commenced when Dr. Doremus rushed forward, exclaiming: "Great God, gentlemen, he is killed!" Many at first thought this part of the entertainment, but on lifting the body, the horrible truth became manifest. Dr. Ellis probed the wound and pronounced the case hopeless. He lived half an hour, but never spoke. No cause was assigned for the terrible act.
