WASHINGTON.

Fraudulent Pensions—Depositors Disappointed—Bullion Transferred

WASHINGTON, Sept. 2.—The Pension Agent here, who pays a large number of pensioners in the South, states that the officers in that section are in the habit of past dating vouchers. It may be of interest to persons preparing papers, to know the penalty for the offense is five years imprisonment.

Yesterday and to-day a large number of depositors of the Freeman's Savings Bank crowded the doors of that institution, expecting to receive the dividend of 25 per cent., having been misled by unauthorized newspaper statements. They were informed by some of the clerks, that no dividend would be declared before Christmas.

The U. S. Treasurer has to-day transferred \$200,000 in gold to San Francisco, on application of the National Gold Bank of that city.

CALIFORNIA.

Conflicting Accounts Concerning the Defunct Bank—The Elections.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 2.—A man in confidential relations with the Directors of the Bank of California, stated this evening, with reference to the rumored meeting of the stockholders to-morrow, that he has no knowledge of such a meeting having been called, also that the examination of the accounts had not sufficiently progressed to enable the Directors to make a definite statement as to the condition of the bank.

The Directors are in session to-night, but nothing is known of their proceedings.

The election returns are coming in slowly from the interior, and there is nothing as yet to indicate the result of the State ticket.

In this city it is thought that Claton is in the majority for Mayor.

There is reason to believe that the Directors of the Bank of California are endeavoring to effect an arrangement with the Oriental Bank of London, looking to assistance from that quarter.

245 A. M.—The election returns to date are meagre, but indicate that the Democrats have elected their State ticket by a large majority.

Houghton, republican, and Luther, democrat, candidates for Congress, are probably elected in their respective districts.

No returns have yet been received from the city precincts.

The U. S. Branch Mint in this city will issue about \$2,000,000 in coin in a few days.

There is good prospects that the depositors in the Bank of California will not incur any loss.

Reports of a meeting of the stockholders are unfound'd.

OHIO.

Brutal Murder and Attempt at Lynch Law.

DAYTON, Sept. 2.—Yesterday, Wm. Dawson, ex-Colonel of an Indiana regiment, while attending a wedding party at Barlow's Hill, having refused admission to six roughs, was stabbed in the abdomen by Joe Murphy, and died in a few minutes. Three hundred persons gathered around the jail last night, with the avowed purpose of lynching Murphy, but were prevented by the entire police force of the city.

KENTUCKY.

Bank Robbery.

LOUISVILLE, Sept. 2.—The Planters' National Bank of this city was robbed of a large amount this morning. The robber was discovered near the bank on his way to the police station. He could hardly speak at first, but after a while informed the detectives that he had been taken from his bed during the night, carried to the bank and forced to deliver up the keys, with which they opened the safe and absconded with the money. There is a slight wound in his side. The bank officers refuse to give information regarding the affair, further than that the depositors will lose nothing. The amount stolen is believed to be nearly one hundred thousand dollars.

NEW YORK.

Steam Navigation Board in Session Negotiations Between the W. U. and A. & P. Telegraph Companies at an End.

NEW YORK, Sept. 2.—The National Board of Steam Navigation is in session, with a small attendance.

After numerous consultations the committee appointed by the Western Union and the Atlantic and Pacific Telegraphic Companies, to effect terms of consolidation, no plans have been accepted by either side, consequently the negotiations have been terminated.

Resolved, That the President and Directors of the Calvert Sugar Refining Company be requested to make an assignment of all their property and effects to B. F. Morton & Co., for the benefit of all the creditors, in accordance with the report of the committee.
