WASHINGTON.

Counterfeiters Captured—Transfers of

Bullion—Cemetery Regulations.
WASHINGTON, Sept. 3.—The police
has advised of the arrest in St. Louis
of Habard, of St. Louis; Malone, of
North Carolina; Duff, of Virginia;
and Flint, of Tennessee; alleged
dealers in counterfeit money. Malone,
Duff and Flint went to St. Louis to
purchase "green" from Habard.

Dr. Linderman, the Director of the
Mint, who is now in San Francisco,
has sent the following telegram from
that city to the Secretary of the Treasury:
"An additional half million of gold
coin may be transferred from the
bullion fund of the San Francisco Mint
to the Treasury of the United States
without interfering with the prompt
payment of bullion deposits and pur-
chases by the mint, which is refining
and coining on a large scale. The
business outlook is improving, and
matters will soon move forward on a
more solid basis."

The Secretary of the Treasury has
gone to New York.
Rear Admiral Goldsboro is seriously
ill.

The War Department has issued the
following general order in relation to
National cemeteries: Picnics are for-
bidden; no admittance between sunset
and sunrise; driving faster than a
walk and refreshments in the cemeteries
are forbidden.

CALIFORNIA.

The Elections—Democratic Victory—

Renewed Confidence in the Bank
of California, &c.
SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 3.—Incom-
plete returns indicate the election of
Irwin (Dem.) for Governor, and the
entire Democratic ticket by a large
plurality.

Three Democratic Congressmen
elected from the Fourth. The Democrats
have a plurality in the Legislature.
The vote of the State so far as heard
gives Irwin, (Dem.) 21,694; Bidwell,
(Ind.) 9,633.

In the Second Congressional
District Page, (Rep.) 4,891; Larkin, (Dem.)
4,361; Tuttle, (Ind.) 1,267.

In the Third Congressional District,
Littell, (Dem.) 5,641; Dennis,
(Rep.) 2,666; Reid, (Ind.) 2,165.

In the Fourth Congressional District
Wigginton, (Dem.) 6,442; Houghton,
(Rep.) 4,909; Thompson, (Ind.) 1,675.

In this city Piper, (Dem.) for Con-
gress, is undoubtedly elected, but the
other offices are still undecided.

The opening of the Merchants Ex-
change Bank, and prospect of immedi-
ate resumption of the Bank of Califor-
nia, causes the best possible feeling in
business circles. With the exception of
the closing of the stock boards, business
has practically settled down to the
old routine.

This morning the Board of Brokers
will hold a meeting, and possibly may
conclude to resume business on Mon-
day, though more cautious members
advise waiting until the Bank of Califor-
nia resumes.

The time has not yet been fixed for
opening the Bank, as much work re-
mains to be done in the examination of
the accounts. Ralston's successor has
not yet been named. C. O. Mills, at
present, is at the head of affairs. The
amount of new capital subscribed to
date is \$4,800,000.

Private assurance is given, on indis-
putable authority, that the business of
the Bank will be closed up as it affects
all creditors and stockholders in the
most advantageous way. Time will be
given to debtors who are unable to
meet their bills, but an effort will be
made to collect the amounts as soon as
circumstances permit. Just as fast as
the cash is available, the indebtedness
of the Bank will be paid off.

GEORGIA.

Rioter Discharged.
AUGUSTA, Sept. 3.—The jury in the
Corry Harris case returned a verdict
of not guilty, and the prisoner was
discharged from custody. Other in-
surrectionary cases have been con-
tinued to the regular term of court.
The prisoners arrested in Johnson
county will be tried at the special term
on Monday next.

FOREIGN.

The Porte Determined to Crush the
Rebellion—Turkish Victory—The
Austrian Government Demand-
ing Servia's Neutrality.

LONDON, Sept. 3.—An article in a
semi-official paper of Constantinople
recounts foreign interference, and declares
that Turkey is able to cope with any
rebellion, and will not cede an inch of
territory in deference to idle demon-
strations.

Caldwell & Watson, East India mer-
chants, have failed. Liabilities foot
up \$400,000.

A Vienna dispatch to the Daily
News says it is confidently asserted
that the representative of Austria at
Belgrade has notified Serbia that the
willful aggression on the part of the
latter against Turkey may render it
necessary for Austria to send troops
into Serbia, in order to ensure neutral-
ity.

It is expected that Serbia will issue
a circular note showing her action was
necessary to protect her own territory
against Turkish aggression, by force
of arms.

The Telegraph publishes a special
dispatch from Berlin, announcing that
the report has been received there
that the Russian General Kaufmann
has entered the city of Khokand.

A dispatch to the Times from Thera-
pia, a suburb of Constantinople, in
which the foreign ministers reside,
says, "The Turks in Herzegovina
have gained a victory. Ten thousand
insurgents were driven across the
frontier into Dalmatia where they were
disarmed by the Austrian authorities.
Communication by the way of Klisk
is re-established."

A special to the same paper states
that Server Pascha has been instructed
to issue a proclamation on his arrival
at Mostar, giving assurances that
henceforth no vexatious or illegal acts
will be permitted in the name of the
Government.

He has also been instructed to dis-
miss and punish officials guilty of op-
pressing the people; to institute a
special tribunal which shall examine
and satisfy the demands of those who
have been objects of arbitrary treat-
ment; to recall any person exiled with-
out justice, and expel agitators. He
is authorized to employ all necessary
means to execute these instructions.

The Porte, while determined to sup-
press the insurrection at all costs, in-
tends to tolerate the absence of Italy
to its resolution.

A Standard dispatch from Constani-
nople, represents that the insurrec-
tion in Herzegovina is now main-
tained by bands of robbers. Not a
single insurgent is to be seen around
Lisak.

The fugitive insurgents have arrived
1800 head of cattle into Dalmatia for
security.

A semi-official journal of Athens
vindicating the neutral attitude of Greece.
Another Grecian journal strongly
advocates an alliance with Turkey.

The strike in Judea is ended. The
mills re-opened to-day, the operators
consenting to work at a reduction of 8
per cent.

ROME, Sept. 3.—It is reported that
Monsignor Bonetti is to be appointed
to a high ecclesiastical dignity in the
United States.
