WASHINGTON.

Schooner in Distress—Billion Notes.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 4.—The Signal observer at Norfolk furnishes the following: An unknown schooner anchored off York Spit, with her head gear entirely carried away. The injury is supposed to be received in a collision. Assistance has been sent out.

There were no transfers of gold to San Francisco made by the Treasury Department to-day, but it is probable that on Monday additional transfers, amounting to half a million, will be made from the billion fund of the Mint. The aggregate amount of gold transfers already made is \$2,501,000. The transfer made yesterday in favor of the National Gold Bank of San Francisco, was requested for the purpose of aiding the institution in a retirement of a portion of its circulation.

CALIFORNIA.

Ralston's Defalcation—Over Issue of Bank Stock—Marine Disaster.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 4.—D. Q. Miller has authorized the statement that the defalcation of Ralston, the late President of the Bank of California, will amount to between three and four million dollars, and that an over issue of stock has been discovered. It is not supposed that this will in any way prejudice the arrangement now being made to re-establish the Bank.

There is nothing new to report in financial or commercial circles this morning. Quiet and confidence prevail, and business is moving along in the usual manner.

An official Montenegro journal avows that Montenegro will remain neutral only in case circumstances should prevent action.

The Pall Mall Gazette publishes a special telegraph from Berlin, stating that the Slavonic papers announce that the leaders of the insurrection against Turkey have agreed upon a manifesto demanding the independence of Bosnia and Herzegovina under a Christian Prince, to be chosen from one of the European dynasties. They are willing to pay tribute to Turkey, and a proportion of national debt, but refuse to participate in a conference at Mostar, fearing Turkish influences.

OHIO.

Murdered by a Tramp.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 4.—A former named Skinner was killed by a tramp, whom he discovered in his barn.

PENNSYLVANIA.

Outlawry—Fast Mail Route Established.

POTTSVILLE, Sept. 4.—Two young men while driving in a buggy were accosted by two special policemen whom they mistook for outlaws, and one fired wounding a policeman. The police condemned the fire killing one of the occupants of the buggy. The other escaped in the woods.

Vigilance committees have been organized to suppress outlawry.

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 4.—The Post-office Department has perfected arrangements for a fast mail train from New York, Philadelphia, Washington and Baltimore, via Pittsburgh to Chicago, St. Louis, Cincinnati, and all points in the Southwest. This train will commence running Monday, Sept. 13th, over the Pennsylvania Railroad and its connecting lines, making extraordinary fast time, so as to fully accommodate the immense postal business of the cities designated, as well as the limited number of through passengers. The schedule of the train will be arranged and announced in a few days.

WEST VIRGINIA.

Hotels Burned.

CHARLESTON, Sept. 4.—The Gibson and Henry Houses, the two principal hotels, burned. No lives lost.

GEORGIA.

Discharge of Alleged Rioters.

AUGUSTA, Sept. 4.—The Grand Jury of Washington county, before whom the alleged insurrectionists were tried, made a report recommending the discharge of the remaining prisoners.

All the prisoners not indicted have been discharged.

NEW YORK.

Catholic Priests Refusing to officiate at a Suicide's Grave—Imports—Bank Statement—Destructive Fire.

NEW YORK, Sept. 4.—Pietro Vaino, the young Italian who committed suicide at Congresswoman O'leary's clam bake, was buried yesterday at City Island, where he committed suicide Tuesday last. The deceased having been a Catholic, it was desired to have the funeral services performed by a priest. But although several Catholic priests were applied to, none could be induced to officiate at the grave of the suicide. Rev. Mr. Monseigni, a Protestant Episcopal minister, performed the duty.

The imports of merchandise for the week amount to \$5,770,723, including \$2,681,638 in dry goods. Specific shipments amount to \$453,175.

The presiding Bishop of the Protestant Episcopal Church has called a special meeting of the house Bishops at Grace Church, on the 28th October, to elect a missionary bishop for Asia and China, and to receive the report of the Mexican Commission.

Bank statement—Loans increased half a million; specific decreased one seven-eighth million; legal tenders increased \$97,000; deposits decreased two and seven-eighth million; revenue decreased one million; specific shipments to-day, \$250,000—all Mexican dollars.

CUBA, Sept. 4.—The Cuba House, a man, twenty-four horses and three barns burned.

ARKANSAS.

Retroactive Murder.

FOR SWITZERLAND, Sept. 4.—Martin W. Haines, acquitted by the United States Court of murder, which he subsequently confessed, was afterwards killed by Jim Barley in a bawdy house.

VIRGINIA.

Sailing Master Drowned.

FOR MONROE, Sept. 4.—Capt. E. Smith, sailing master of the schooner yacht Eva, of the New York Yacht Club, was lost on Thursday, Sept. 2d, at 2:30 A. M., about 40 miles south of Cape Henlopen. There was a gale of wind at the time with a heavy sea. The yacht was running before the wind, Capt. Smith sitting on the rail lost his balance and fell overboard. The yacht was immediately hoisted to, and a boat lowered, out in the darkness and heavy sea it was impossible to save him.

FOREIGN.

ENGLAND.

Serbia's Neutrality—Bosnia and Herzegovina Issuing Manifestoes—A Christian Prince Wanted.

LONDON, Sept. 4.—An article in the Moscow Gazette says the mediations between the consul at Ragusa has failed. They cannot guarantee Turkish concessions, and the insurgents have no common chief who can pledge for them.

A correspondent of the *Allegemeine Zeitung* writes from Belgrade that Prince Milan is not likely to prevent Serbia from helping the insurgents.

A special telegram to the *News* asserts that Serbia intends to call out twenty thousand men.

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SPAIN.

Carlist General Defeated.

MADRID, Sept. 4.—It is officially announced that the Carlist General Díaz, in attempting to force his way into Aragon, was twice repulsed, with a loss of 400 men.

He has escaped into Navarre.
