THE CONVENTION.

Ordinances Introduced.

Raleigh, Sept. 11.—The principal ordinances introduced in the Convention to day, were as follows:

Abolition of the office of Lieutenant-Governor.

Prepayment of poll tax as a qualification for suffrage.

Abolition of the township system.

Restoration of the Courts of Pleas and Quarter Sessions.

To prohibit intermarriage of the races.

Fixing a civil right and a social equality law from a Democratic standpoint.

The Republican side of the House introduced only two ordinances, one of which was that no Convention should hereafter be called unless the question was submitted to the people.

The calendar was then taken up.

A resolution to adjourn *sine die*, introduced by Republicans, was voted down.

A resolution of the same character, introduced by a Republican, was over, under the rules, but will come up on Monday.

WASHINGTON.

Grant Through Summerville—All Quiet in Mississippi—Customs, &c.

WILMINGTON, Sept. 10.—The Rio Bravo is repaired and will leave Galveston for the mouth of the Rio Grande as soon as she receives her anchors and chains.

The President and family are expected to return to Washington about the 15th inst.

Custom receipts for to day, \$413,030; for the month, \$4,682,653; for the fiscal year, \$35,763,062.

Internal revenue receipts for to day, \$354,761; for the month, \$3,598,641; for the year, \$22,693,529.

Senator Pease of Mississippi telegraphs to the Attorney-General that all excitement consequent upon the disturbance at Olmito, has subsided.

There has been no dispatch received from Gov. Ames.

The Attorney-General is not changed in his views that the whole trouble is completely at an end.

The reticence of Gov. Ames excites much comment. He has been officially asked upon what grounds he based his constitutional appeal for Federal aid, and also for a report of the present condition of affairs. The silence of the Governor is regarded as disrespectful, and the cautious course of the Attorney-General meets with general approval.

The report of the Registrar of Vital Statistics of the District of Columbia for the week ending Sept. 4th, shows the rate of mortality of the whites to be nearly 20 per 1,000, and of the colored nearly 50 per 1,000. The rate of increase of the white population by births over deaths, was 14 1/2 per 1,000, and the decrease of colored by deaths over births, 34 67/100 per 1,000. Such a marked difference in the mortality of whites and blacks has existed for some months past, that various meetings have been held by prominent colored men to discover a remedy for this decrease of their race, but without success.

LOUISVILLE, Sept. 11.—Thos. D. Worrell, Managing Director of the Mississippi Valley Transportation Co., who has been looking about Louisville for the establishment of American Headquarters, has gone to Georgia.

CINCINNATI, Sept. 11.—A freight train was derailed near Hillsboro, Indiana, yesterday, crushing to death three boys who were stealing a ride.

Tardy Assistance.

VICKSBURG, Sept. 11.—One hundred men, who did not know there was an insurrection in Hinds county until they saw Gov. Ames' telegram to Washington, have tendered their services to go to any part of the State to protect life and property.

ILLINOIS.

Marine Disaster.

CHICAGO, Sept. 11.—On Lake Michigan, early yesterday morning, the propeller EQUINOX, from Chicago to Bay City, with a cargo of salt, and towing the schooner Emma E. Wayes loaded with lumber, was overtaken by a storm about 2 o'clock yesterday morning, near Point A La Sable, 280 miles north of Chicago. Capt. Woodworth, of the EQUINOX, came to the stern of the propeller at that time and called out to cut the lines. This was done, and the propeller careened and sunk in a few minutes. He had on board a crew of 19 men, and Capt. Alight Scott, of Cleveland, a well known Lake captain, who was accompanied by his wife and granddaughter, making a total of 22 persons. The first intimation the schooner had of the disaster was the shrill cry of the drowning. The Wayes could render no assistance whatever in the terrible sea that was running and the entire crew of the EQUINOX went down. The schooner arrived here this morning.

LONDON, Sept. 11.—The Secretary of Hooper's Telegraph Works is a defaulter to the amount of \$30,000.

The Executive Committee on the foot and mouth disease have asked the Privy Council for an order to prevent the holding of market sales or fairs throughout Warwickshire. The disease prevails considerably in the county of Norfolk, the last returns showing three thousand cases recorded during the week. Cattle, sheep and pigs are all affected.
